SWAS: High Junior School – Developing Learning



As we conceive of the 'discourse of personal development' as a guide to our teaching, our teachers need to consider how our students' thinking skills can be developed. One useful five-level rubric comes from *Dimensions of Learning*.

Developing learning begins with establishing positive attitudes towards and perceptions about learning. When acquiring and integrating knowledge (level 2) students need scaffolding to help them relate new knowledge to what they already know. At level 3, students need further guidance to extend and refine their knowledge by analysis, formulating and testing hypotheses, clarifying understanding, making distinctions and reaching conclusions. At level 4 learning is embedded through the performance of relevant and personally meaningful tasks. In the junior school there is great scope for this kind of personalised learning. Students can make choices from assessment tasks, assignments or projects that involve: decision making, problem solving, invention, investigation, experimental inquiry and systems analysis. At the highest level of learning, students have developed habits of mind that allow them to be independent and autonomous learners. They become self-managing. They organise and regulate their learning behaviour. They can think creatively, analytically and critically. By the end of Year 9 we hope our students are at the highest level of this learning rubric and can enter High Senior School with confidence.

High Notes

We have reduced our print run of High Notes to 200. Phillip Day Trust

Staff, parents, Old Boys and students are invited to contribute to the Phillip Day Trust. A trust account has been opened and people are donating to Phil's memory. By the end of term we will be forming a committee to plan a suitable memorial, in the form of a physical tribute, the establishment of a prize or trust or a combination of these.

Year 9 Class Submission

A submission to the Minister for Education and Training has been sent via the School Education Director. The submission argues the case for twenty places extra to be offered in Year 9 each year. The rationale in summary was as follows:

Why is there a need for change? We think that the school would be more effective in reaching its targets and desired outcomes, enhancing its ethos and building a more cohesive student body, if incoming students had more time to adapt to our culture and to access our programs. We also believe there are educational, social and personal development advantages for students who enrol in High before Year 11. We believe that this adjustment to our enrolment policy is highly desirable because:

- our middle school initiative was implemented this year, dividing the school into High Junior 7-9 and High Senior 10-12 and incoming students need time to adapt to a different learning culture in Year 9 before commencing in the Senior School
- elective choices are remade at the end of Year 9 allowing students to access acceleration or to focus on favoured electives and incoming Year 9 students would have access to this process
- incoming students in Year 11 miss out on the opportunity to access structured

- acceleration programs that are offered in Year 10
- late access to our best practice Student Awards Scheme reduces incoming students to two years of participation, whereas four years would allow them to reach the higher levels of the awards
- students entering in Year 11 have difficulty in qualifying for leadership and building a reputation among teachers and peers such that they can be elected as School Prefects for their final year at school and having an extra two years to do so would increase their prospects of accessing leadership positions significantly
- Peer Support and Peer Mediation training takes place in Years 9 and 10. Year 11 entering students are disadvantaged by not having access to these personal development courses
- the smaller class sizes produced by forming a seventh class in Year 9 would benefit incoming and existing students under a banding arrangement where at least two classes in each year would have no more than 27 students instead of 30
- High has an enviable reputation for producing scholar-sportsmen and accomplished all-rounders and providing incoming students with an extra two years of access to skilled sports coaching, high level competition and heavily resourced co-curricular activities (such as debating, music, chess and cadets) must benefit both them and the cohorts they join
- students entering in Year 11 are disadvantaged when trying to access summer sports teams and co-curricular groups as these are selected in Term 4 in the previous year and some sports have term 4 – term 1 competitions in the senior school
- High runs a 7-9 Outdoor Education program leading in to Duke of Edinburgh Awards in Years 10-12 and incoming students have difficulty accessing that scheme without previous experience
- High relies heavily on parents and Old Boys to be involved in school governance, fund raising and delivering programs and earlier engagement with the school will promote and sustain that engagement
- Year 9 applications have a high proportion from non-state schools and any future increases in enrolment in public education (potentially up to 40) would serve to enhance its standing in the local community
- past experience in processing applications for all years 8-12 has shown a great deal of interest from students from non-government schools and the number of successful applicants in recent years has increased from that sector.
- this adjustment has minimal staffing impact but major benefits for the school, for cohorts and for individuals
- this proposal does not set a precedent as other selective schools already have Year 9 intake programs.

P & C - Goals for 2007

At Monday night's P & C Executive meeting, we discussed areas in which the P & C wants to provide funds for the school this year.

Our priorities are :

- **\$10,000** towards repaying the loan for building the new **tennis courts**
- **\$12,000** to buy **data projectors** for up to 16 rooms by the end of 2008. (Installation costs will be met by SBHS Building Fund)
- **\$18,127** for the deposit, transport & installation costs for a **demountable** Yr 9 classroom for 2008
- **\$8,600** to complete School Signs and Cutler Gates **uplighting**.
- **\$15,000** to replace **pianos** in Rooms 101 and 201.

New Library & Performing Arts Centre

We also discussed the vital importance of the **monthly giving program** if the school is to see its bold vision for a two stage Library & Performing Arts Centre become a reality.


Guest Speakers



Sydney Boys High School Tennis Program



In June 2006, Sydney Boys High School had new tennis courts installed. At the same time, Tennis-Wise Tennis School were invited to take on the role of

coaching the GPS Tennis Players. A program was created in order to develop players right through from Year 7 to 1st Grade.

Letters Re Absence/Lateness/ Early Leave

Fitness Assessment February 2007



The PDHPE Department has again assessed the physical fitness levels of our junior students. The most important health-related test is the 1.6 km run for cardiovascular endurance. Our standard Moore Park West course was used for the assessment.

An assessment of 90% or better required a student to run the 1.6 km in a time of 6 mins 30 secs, approximately, depending on the age of the student. An assessment of 50% or better, required a time of between 7 and 8 minutes, depending on age. A result of 10% or less means the 1.6 km run was completed in a time greater than 9 mins 30 seconds.

Each student in Years 7-9 should have a copy of their assessment schedule and results for February 2007 in their PDHPE theory books. Parents are encouraged to review their son's results with them.






