#### From the Principal

#### End of Year

As this is the final edition of High Notes for the year, I would like to thank the students, staff, parents, Old Boys and friends of High for their efforts in so many areas of school life. Much has been accomplished in 2007. Great support was shown by the High community, financially and personally. We hope the school has been successful, innovative, responsive and inclusive in its activities. I would like to wish all families my compliments for the festive season. After the frantic building and grounds activity of 2005-07, next year should be a year of consolidation, to ease our tight cash flow situation. During our pause for breath we will celebrate our 125th year of operation as a secondary school preparing gifted boys for life and university.

#### School Certificate Tests

The School Certificate Test results were



not good overall this year. The 'z' scores in English, history and geography were the lowest since the 2003

reporting began. The mathematics results were the lowest since 2003. The science results were better than last year on the 'z' score benchmark. Computing Skills were lower than the inaugural results last year. In terms of band 6 results, the school percentages were: in mathematics, the lowest since 2003, in English, the lowest since 2002, in science, the highest since 2005, in history and geography, the lowest since 2002. In combined bands 5/6 the results were: in English, the lowest since 1999, in mathematics, the third highest since 1998, in science, the best since 2003, in history and geography, the worst on record. Even though our focus is firmly on developing students for the HSC, these results are disquieting. The Executive will be discussing possible reasons for the slump and suggested interventions to improve them.

#### Cadet Dinner

The inaugural Cadets Dinner last week was well attended and demonstrated the goodwill surrounding the cadet movement among Old Boys as well as the strength of our school unit. The Dining President was CUO Weiping Lu who conducted proceedings very well. The formal dress, ceremonial sword, trophies on display and volunteer waiters, added to the ambience of the evening. Our guests were LTCOL Fomiatti (UNSWR) and LTCOL Major (AAC), with special quest CMNDR Littlewood (ret), an Old Boy. LTCOL Fomiatti presented the 'University of New South Wales Regiment Award for Leadership' to WO Anthony Ho. LTCOL Major presented the 'Major General Jim Norrie Memorial Award for Military Skills' to CPL Johan Santoso. LTCOL Major Knowles (AAC) presented Cadet Isaac Eveleigh (Year 8) with 'Officer Commanding's Award for Contribution to the Unit'. It was an enjoyable evening and I hope the start of a tradition of cadet functions to build the culture of service at our school.

#### Music Awards Dinner

Seniors playing instruments serve as terrific role models for juniors but also add maturity and virtuosity to the musical offerings. Ms May captured the many award winners in photographs. The highlight of the evening was the award of Musician of the Year. Unfortunately, the very worthy recipient Muhamed Mehmedbasic (Year 11), was engaged playing for the Sydney Youth Orchestra and could not attend to collect his prize, which was accepted on his behalf by his brother, Ennes.

#### Letters Re Absence/Lateness/ Early Leave

When your son returns to school from being absent he



is required to provide a letter of explanation signed by a parent or guardian. If your son is going to be late for school a note is also required.

If your son has an early leave note he is required to have his note signed by either Mr Beringer, Mr Dowdell or Mr Prorellis **before 8:55 am** and handed in to the Main Office immediately after. Each letter should be signed by a parent or guardian with the <u>name date</u> and <u>roll class</u> of your son <u>printed clearly</u>. Your son needs to pick up a leave pass from the Main Office before he leaves the school.

#### Leave

If you require leave for your son please, apply in writing and address your application to the Principal, Dr Jaggar, stating the reason and length of time of the leave. Your son must then present this application to Dr Jaggar for permission for the leave. **Please remember to apply before the leave and not after.** 

The Principal must approve all leave applications.

#### Taiwan International Youth Culture Conference

Between the 1<sup>st</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> of December 2007, three Year 11 students travelled to Changhua Senior High School in Taiwan to



attend the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Youth Culture Conference. This conference was also attended by delegates from six other nations; USA, Russia, Taiwan, Ireland, Finland and Japan. The first 4 days saw us billeted with local students, followed by the remaining 3 days in a hotel on the outskirts of Taipei.

The first two days of the trip were dedicated to the economic discussion of brands and presentations of each nations' cultural, social and commercial aspects. Kiril Mickovski (11), presented a paper on Fosters Group, whilst Nic Lochner (11) discussed Qantas and Ishan Nadkarni completed the trio with an in depth look into Billabong Clothing. Mr Storey, being the dedicated economics teacher that he is, made it his duty to instigate a lengthy discussion on globalisation and Taiwan's political marketing. While Nic and Ishan were afforded the opportunity to mingle with the other nations, Kiril spent most of his time eating and attempting to converse with the local girls.

Following the formal nature of the conference, each night, everyone took part in festivities. A party on the first evening featured performances from local and international students. A Taiwanese Avril Lavigne, a tour of Buffalo, NY, Aussie standup, Russian folk dancing, a lesson on how to speak Finnish, Japanese martial arts and traditional Irish singing were amongst the acts.

The second night starred a bizarre Taiwanese banquet, as the food was endless and different, but highly enjoyable as it expressed an opportunity to further our understanding of the Taiwanese culture, as well as allowing us to chat with the other internationals. It was here that Mr Storey presented the CSHS principal with the school plaque and the history of Sydney High.

The rest of the trip was then packed with sight seeing and touring Taiwan: Visits to the Giant Buddha, various corporations and factories, Hospital and famous orchids. We also enjoyed spending time at the night markets where anything and everything was on sale. As we left Changhua for Taipei, we encountered several other Taiwanese landmarks. The world's tallest building, longest intra-mountain tunnel, President's office, the National Palace Museum and rocky beaches were amongst the itinerary. Since everything was over a half hour drive from one another, the time enabled us to communicate and create friendships with the other international students.

Not only was the trip highly enjoyable but also highly educational. The relationships that we forged during the tour are ones that will remain forever with us. As the other teams departed early in the morning, goodbyes were marred with tears and mutual sadness. All three students were especially thankful for this opportunity, that very few students ever get to undertake, and would like to sincerely thank Mr Storey, Mr Beringer and Dr Jaggar for support and assistance in making the trip possible, and our billets; Annie, Tony and Winston and their families who were kind enough to house us during our stay.


