The Education Tax Refund

Under the new Education Tax Refund, parents who are eligible can claim 50% of their education expenses up to \$1500 for secondary students. To be eligible you must have received Family Tax Benefit Part A for each child whose education expenses you wish to claim. You can claim for purchase, lease, hire or hire purchase costs of: laptops and PCs (with associated running costs), educational software, stationery and art supplies, school textbooks and associate learning materials. You cannot claim for school fees, uniforms, excursions or travel, musical instruments, sporting equipment, footwear. clothing or See www.educationtaxrefund.gov.au for а comprehensive list.

Each year the student body of Sydney Boys High School are given the opportunity to apply to an important leadership position on the school Student Representative Council. Applications involve students vowing that they will commit to the position and work hard throughout the year to represent their peers. Names of applicants from each year are submitted to an online voting site on the SBHS SRC website. Voting is preferential and not compulsory.

As a result, six students are elected each year to represent their peer/year group. These students are required to join committees on the council and attend regular Friday lunchtime meetings. If students fulfil their role satisfactorily with the committees they are part of throughout the year, they are honoured with a badge and may purchase an SRC tie. In the first meeting of the new SRC, the new council elect an executive (President, Vice President and Secretary) to run the meetings and give direction.

This year, with the help of Mr Walker (Head of Welfare), Mr Coan (Leadership Co-ordinator) and Mrs Collignon (SRC teacher facilitator), the elected SRC of 2009 will be part of a training day held at the Outterside centre March 2nd and lead by a group named *Rising Generations*.

The SRC gives students the opportunity to learn about group work, running meetings, working on committees, responsibility, commitment and leadership. SRC members get the opportunity to go to regional and state SRC meetings as well as a range of leadership development and motivational seminars.

ENGLISH REPORT

An important focus of our English program is to encourage the boys to read for enjoyment, to read often and to read widely. Apart from the positive effect this will undoubtedly have on literacy skills, reading widely enriches our understanding of the world we live in. Here in English we see ourselves as a community of readers. On a daily basis we share ideas and opinions about books we are reading and our students reap the rewards of this on-going conversation. *'Reading Torque'*, an initiative we introduced in High Notes in 2007, is a further means of promoting the value of reading and extending our reading community. *'Reading Torque'* is a vehicle for us to share our thoughts about books we have recently read and so with this in mind....parents, students and staff are invited to express their opinion by putting pen to paper in a short review.

However, film and televison and print journalism are all important too, and should form part of every student's regular experience beyond the classroom. Through consuming television and films, and reading newspapers and magazines students develop their understanding of how these texts work and further their understanding of values and attitudes and conventions approriate to these forms. A recent **Dr Who** episode was an





outstanding example of the shift from Gothic to SF and an excellent primer for Year 11 Extension genre.

Be selective, but look around. Students need to have a deep and a broad experience of the sorts of texts they will ultimately be expected to analyse under exam conditions, and to use as pieces of Other Related Material in Years 11 and 12.

Congratulations on work well done – Mr Devlin- History

Historical Question:

How typical were Private William Gellatly's experiences of the war?

Note, in case of disagreements over details between sources, records of the 11th battalion or the 3rd Brigade were used.



Number 1770 was one of the 8,500,000 casualties of the 'Great War'. He was one of the 26,111 Australian casualties and 8,200 soldiers who died at Gallipoli. He was one of the 421,809 men who enlisted in the A.I.F. and one of the 331,781 Australian men who fought overseas. As historians, we deal in statistics which give us the big picture but brushes over the smaller stories. However, we must remember that history is made up of many no bodies.

WWI was a very real war fought by very real men. And each of the eight and a half million casualties had a life. Each had a name. Each loved and was loved. Each had a home and a family. Some had children, some had religions, and each had their own opinions, beliefs and a unique identity.

1770 had a name. William Gellatly was born in the parish of Grieff in Perthshire but later moved to Narrogin in Western Australia where he worked as a laborer. He was single and lived with his mum Elizabeth Ann Gellatly. He was 5 foot 5, weighed 145 pounds, and had a tanned complexion; the typical outback Australian. He was also a dedicated Presbyterian.

When Britain declared war and Australia followed her into it, the Australian Imperial Forces was raised for service overseas. The 11th Australian Infantry Battalion AIF which was raised at Black Boy Hill Camp and was the first battalion to be raised in Western Australia. Along with the 9th, 10th, and 12th battalions which were recruited in Queensland, South Australia and Tasmania, it made up the 3rd infantry brigade. The 11th embarked for overseas after just two weeks of preliminary training. It arrived in Egypt to continue its training in early December. It was at this time that Gellatly enlisted on the 16th of February 1915 at 32 years of age and he too was transferred to Egypt. The 11th then left Egypt many weeks before the rest of the Gallipoli force and landed on Lemnos Island where they practiced amphibious landings. Mid-April, most of the Australian and New Zealand troops from Egypt followed, and had been just a fortnight in Lemnos when they sailed for Gallipoli. Gellatly's AWM Embarkation Roll number was 23.28.2 and he embarked on HMAT Argyllshire.

The 3rd brigade of about 4000 men provided the covering force for Australia during the ANZAC landing on the 25th of April 1915. The Australians were to lead the Allied assault on the peninsula, with the 11th landing at 4:20. The landing was to be completed before dawn, and was to be covered by the guns of the Royal Navy.

The 3rd Brigade were transported onboard a flotilla of transports and battleships in absolute silence, with the 11th battalion on the extreme north until they were within sight of the high Turkish coastline. They then got onto an assortment of boats and were towed as far as possible by steamboats. They were to row the final stretch to shore. The 11th landed along the northern face of Ari Burnu along with some stragglers from the 9th and had the toughest landing of all the battalions. They were 400 yards out when Turkish sentries ashore fired the first shots and broke the silence. Many men were killed or wounded in the boats and as they sunk, drowned and splashed ashore in disarray, amongst orders amplified through leather megaphones, the tremendous bombardment of the navy, shots clanging of the ships and general pandemonium, along with the odd lighthearted joke like the 11th claiming that being shot at sounded like birds overhead. They soon realized that had been landed about a mile to the north of the intended beach. The reason for this has never been explained.

To force the soldiers to charge, they had no ammo in their weapons. So despite waterlogged uniforms, thick scrub, steep slopes, unfamiliar terrain, confusion, the mixing of units and enemy fire, the 3rd Brigade stormed and took the first slopes, defeating the Turks with their bayonets. Within 45 minutes, the 3rd brigade extended past three ridges and continued to sweep through the Turkish lines. As they fought their way inland and to the crucial peaks, the sun rose and the 2nd, and 1st, Australian Infantry Brigades landed behind them.

The exhausted Turks rested for an hour, giving the 3rd brigade a change to entrench and the main body was able to land in relative calm. By the time the first part of the main body was forming up, the main Turkish force lead by Kemal arrived and a fierce battle erupted, lasting all day. The Anzacs managed to stop the Turkish from pushing them back, waiting for dark for a chance to dig in properly.

By day's end the Turks everywhere held the high ground, but the Australians, now reinforced by members of the New Zealand and Australian Division, were determined to hold what they had captured. The Turks were equally determined that the Anzacs would advance no further and both sides began digging trenches. It is estimated that 16,000 ANZAC troops were landed on that first day and all told, more than 620 Australians died that day, 57 of them from the 11th Battalion. Ten days after the landing,

a company from the 11th Battalion mounted the AIF's first raid of the war against Turkish positions at Gaba Tepe in an attempt to capture the Turks main vantage point. The attack failed but Gellatly survived.

The 11th was then mainly involved in defending the front line of the ANZAC beachhead. In August, it made preparatory attacks at the southern end of the ANZAC position before the battle of Lone Pine.

Private William Gellatly was on of 2,666 men killed in August; the month with the highest death toll. He was killed in the battle of Lone Pine at Leane's trench on the 6th; the first day of fighting. It was a diversion for the attack on the Sari Bair ridge: the last attempt to capture Gallipoli before the evacuation in December. There was also another new landing at Sulva Bay. The Turks knew an attack was coming but didn't know where. At 5:30pm, the 1st attacked. Half went in a charge and the other half through a series of pre prepared tunnels. Near the end of the day, the 2nd and 3rd poured in to reinforce the gains made by the 1st and Gellatly was killed in the Turkish trenches by a grenade. The attack at Lone Pine was a success but the overall 3-pronged operation failed and Gallipoli was evacuated in December.

He was buried in Plot II, Row I, Grave No. 39 of the Shell Green cemetery in Gallipoli; about 1,150 yards from ANZAC cove, along with 106 other men of the 11th Battalion, 36 of them were killed in action at Leane's Trench. His name is located on Panel number 62 on the Roll of Honor. The Gallipoli campaign ended with 5,582 killed in action, 2,012 died of wounds and 665 died of disease.

After the withdrawal from Gallipoli, the 11th Battalion returned to Egypt. It was split to help form the 51st Battalion, and then bought up to strength with reinforcements. They then served in France and Belgium. From their formation to disbandment on the 5th of February 1919, a total of 1115 men were killed and 2249 were wounded including gassed.

News of his death was sent by cable to Alexandria on cable 12701 and officially confirmed on the 25th of August 1915 but did not reach his mother until the 28th of February 1916. William had left three fifths of his pay to him mother as well as two pounds per fortnight from his pension. He had been caught seriously drunk on the 4th of August but died before he could be reprimanded. His will left all his money and effects to his mother Elizabeth Ann Gellatly. Over his 110 days of active field service plus all allowances, he was due \$13,210 and played on the 10th of January 1916. He was awarded the 1914-15 star, British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

Overall, Gellatly's war career was highly typical and he didn't experience anything out of the ordinary. At the time of enlistment, he was an older man in a sea of young men. But he was as fit and loyal as any of the young recruits.


1st Grade Tennis (HIGH vs SHORE) *Simon Hoang*

FITNESS ASSESSMENT FEBRUARY 2009

The PDHPE Department has again assessed the physical fitness levels of our students, Years 7 – 10. The most important health-related test is the 1.6km run for cardiovascular endurance. Our standard Moore Park West course was used for the assessment.

An assessment of 90% or better required a student to run the 1.6km in a time of 6 mins 30 secs, approximately, depending on the age of the student. An assessment of 50% or better, required a time of between 7 and 8 minutes, depending on age. A result of 10% or less means the 1.6km run was completed in a time greater than 9 mins 30 seconds. Each student in Years 7 – 9 should have a copy of their assessment schedule and results for February 2009 in their PDHPE theory books. Parents are encouraged to review their son's results with them.

There were some outstanding performances again this semester including:

Ned Anson (7F) 6m 20s, Sida Wang (7M) 6m 34s, Oliver Kirk (8.1) 5m 37s, Arjun Punekar (8.2) 5m 56s, Lloyd Perris (9.7) 5m 36s, Anton Brokman (9.1) 5m 41s, Sam Lane (10.6) 5m 25s, Jeremy Dobrowolski (10.7) 5m 33s.

After lunch we headed out once again onto the Yarra this time to race the gruelling 4km course to the Princess Bridge. Another dominant performance from the 1st eight ensured another victory and a strong performance from the 2nd eight gave a clean sweep to Sydney. After another successful day of rowing on the Yarra we headed home with our billets to rest up for the next days races.

SBHS Basketball Committee Meeting



Report From Last Week's P & C Meeting

Our warmest thanks again, to Mr Ayre, for his wideranging and very informative talk about Sport at SBHS. We discussed issues such as participation, training, employment of coaches, opportunities for boys to improve their fitness, and funding of programs.

The P&C then moved to fund the following projects within the School:

- 1. Ongoing digital and sound system installation into classrooms \$15 000
- 2. Solar panels and electrical infrastructure \$10 000
- 3. Purchase of Social Sciences textbooks due to syllabus changes \$10 000
- 4. Second last annual repayment of tennis court loan \$10 000
- 5. An increase in the parking levy applied by the School to P&C parking events, from 35% to 38%, after the first \$500.

Ms Christina Chow, head of the Canteen subcommittee, presented the P&C with \$30,000, as part distribution of Canteen earnings for 2008/2009. This is a tremendous contribution from the Canteen, which turned over \$420,000 in 2008. The P&C warmly thanks our Canteen staff, and welcomes and supports the efforts of the many volunteers. These results could not be achieved without the dedication of both staff and volunteers. It was noted that there is still some need for volunteers on the roster mid-week - Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Dr Jaggar outlined the science lab project that was reported in last week's *High Notes.* It is hoped that the Hall kitchen project will be undertaken around the same time. Dr Jaggar then reported on the Government initiative to issue all Year 9 students with laptops later this year. Other technology developments include improvements to the start-up time at the beginning of lessons for teachers using computer-based learning, as well as increased bandwidth for net services.

Dr Jaggar reported on the successful operation of the new Senior Library, with many senior students taking

the opportunity to use the space for study. The Junior Library is also operating to the great benefit of junior school students.

Ms Barbara Taylor has arranged with Sydney City Council to have bins delivered for recycling glass and plastic bottles. Please look out for them and use them wisely !!!!

High Rugby

There was a reference in the media this week to changes that have occurred to High and Sydney Grammar School's participation in the GPS rugby competition. High and Grammar will share rugby fixtures this year, with Grammar competing in First XV and A-team fixtures and High in Third XV and B-team fixtures. The High v Grammar first grade match will take place as usual in the last round of the 2009 competition.

These changes have been temporarily introduced as part of our process of building the participation rates, skills, strength and success of rugby at High. There has been a resurgence of rugby in High's junior years. In 2008 we fielded four 13s teams for the first time in at least 10 years. Last year's 16As defeated Newington to record High's first win in an A v A match for many years.

As any long term follower of school boy sports will have observed, there are often cycles in popularity of the different sports offered at school.

Just as a couple of examples, Sydney High currently fields 18 cricket teams, unmatched by any other school in the GPS competition. Our basketball teams throughout many age groups are earning successes in the GPS competition, culminating in our basketball Firsts and Seconds posting historic wins over Riverview, the strongest basketball school in the GPS competition. Over 85% of our students participated in Saturday sport last year.
