United Nations Day

United Nations Day is observed in Australia on 24 October each year to commemorate the coming into force of the United Nations Charter in 1945. The Charter was signed on the 26 June 1945 at the conclusion of the United Nations Conference on International Organization and came into force on 24 October, 1945. The statute of the International Court of Justice (now centred at The Hague) was an integral component of the

Charter. The gathered nations determined: to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war...; to reaffirm faith in fundamental

human rights...; to establish conditions under which justice and respect for obligations...can be maintained; and to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom

As we celebrate the vision of those who wanted to eradicate World War, establish international justice and help humanity to live a better life, we need to recognise that for all its flaws, this regulatory body has maintained world peace for 72 years and avoided a catastrophic nuclear imbroglio. Wars between nations have occurred of course, but the United Nations has played a significant role in keeping democracy safe in the world.

Summer Sport Co-payments: Term 4

The rolls for summer sports and activities have now been finalised. In many activities co-



payments are levied for the season – in this case Term 4 2017 and term 1, 2018. Other sports have a policy of fixing co-payments on a term-by-term basis.

In either case, invoices have now been posted. For years 7-10 this means that the summer invoice will be included on individual *Clearance Forms*. These will need to be cleared prior to boys receiving their reports. The base co-payment for sport for a season is \$156 for 2017-18, as adjusted for on costs. Higher charges are levied by individual sports as a result of resolutions passed by the Associations or P & C Sub-Committees responsible for supporting particular sports. Year 11 boys have been invoiced very recently for term 4 or their full summer sport, too. It would help the MICs for these sports greatly if families could pay for their sports in the next 21 days.

Reports

From early next week, Year 11 boys will be discussing their progress with me. They will have to have their *Clearance Forms* signed off if they require one. They will also be finalising their course selections for the for HSC year. Some decisions are dependent upon qualification for a particular course, for example – mathematics extension 2, English extension 1 & 2 or physics and chemistry. Others,

like for subject accelerants, might depend on the strength of their HSC results. As a consequence, not everyone will be ready for HSC study in all courses. Students are advised not to discontinue their attendance, nor to stop completing set work in courses until they are certain that their planned suite of courses has actually been approved. Students acting on assumptions may well be disappointed and then have to catch up on missed work.

Year 10 Camp 2017

Year 10 Camp is happening!!! What a fantastic way to finish the year on a HIGH and make some lifelong memories!

Students attending camp will work in small groups of their choice to successfully complete a 5-day, journey based program. Students will be working together to navigate their way to each campsite, completing challenges along the way, under the guidance of an OEG leader and SBHS teacher.

This is a once in a lifetime experience that the boys should not miss. They won't have another opportunity to spend a week with their mates, in the bush, developing life skills and creating memories they will be talking about long after school has finished.

For those students completing the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, this program meets the requirements for the **Silver Practice Expedition** and the **Silver Qualifying Expedition**. This means that boys will not need to go on any additional expeditions to meet the requirements for the Silver Award.

The cost of the program includes transport to and from camp, use of tents, backpacks, sleeping mats, wet weather gear (if needed), cooking equipment, all food (and heaps of it), a qualified OEG leader per group and specialist support leaders working behind the scene.

Those students who choose to remain at school, normal classes will not be scheduled. Instead, they will attend a variety of alternative activities. These include work experience, completion of elective projects, MOOCs or a "Project Based Learning task" under the guidance of their classroom teachers.

Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development (VALID) Test.

The *Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development* (VALID) test for Year 8 students will be held on **Thursday 2 November 2017** in Periods 1 and 2. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The **VALID Science 8** test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer.

VALID Science 8 contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW *Science Years K–10 Syllabus*. Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values about science.

Since students complete *VALID Science 8* on a computer, each student needs to bring **headphones or earbuds** that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an iPod or portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2018. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test.

The principal of your child's school is able to provide you with more details about the VALID program if you require additional information.
