From the Principal

High Talent

Congratulations to Vinh Pham for his selection in the Australian Team for the International Mathematical Olympiad to be held in Ljubljana, Slovenia July 10-18. As one of the finest half dozen young competition mathematicians in the country, Vinh is in elite company. Senior High Fencing earned a bronze in the AJRae Invitational Shield. Well done to Amadeus Klocker, Patrick Duffy, Yu Lin and Jeffrey Chan. In the recent Chinese Eisteddfod, High was second in the group award for 13-15 years. In individual competition prize winners were: Tom Sun (1st), Jacob Cao (2nd), Shorson Zhang (3rd). In the 16-18 years group, Jeffrey Xie and Leo Cheng were awarded equal second prize. The Eisteddfod is an important cultural event and our school has improved its standing in the contest over recent years, thanks to Willa Zhang and our committed Chinese students. Well done to you all. A special thanks to Will Clegg (2005) for his tremendous leadership and involvement on Sir Roden Cutler Day for the charity. Without him the day could not have been the success that it was. Thank you to the music staff and their tutors for organising and running a successful music camp and Cabaret Night. Your efforts are appreciated by students, parents and the school administration.

Jumped on at Joeys

It was chilly and a stiff breeze swept across the fields at St Joseph's last Saturday as High tackled the Joeys physical and psychological machine. In third grade football there was a lot of ball movement but indifferent finishing as both teams struggled for ascendancy. A nil all draw was a fair result. In second grade the pattern of High's play was disrupted by a goal against the run of play and the loss of a player. The side never gave up and played the game hard to match Joeys 'rugball' style. They snatched one back to draw the game at the death - a strong effort. In first grade High started brightly and often had the Joeys defence in confusion with some well constructed raids. However, after twenty minutes the momentum of the game gradually swung back to Joeys and they scored from a neat header over the late advancing keeper. The second half was all Joeys as High's sharpness and communication fell away. Only brilliant goalkeeping from Lachlan Street saved us from embarrassment.

In rugby, I saw some spirited attempts by our boys, who , never gave against bigger, stronger and faster opponents. A lack of

technique when tackling and a loss of shape in defence, allowed Joeys to break our line by running wide or switching to an inside ball to forwards running at opposing angles to the drifting defence. When in rolling mauls or 'pick and drive' plays, our boys worked well together and were effective when using their numbers intelligently. However, at Joeys, you need to be patient and to control the ball for as long as you can. We were unable to do that except in the 2nds v 6th match where the play was more even and the score line very respectable. In first grade our boys gave a courageous display and never gave up trying, even when the game was unnecessarily extended by five minutes. Honour in defeat against Joeys is a rite of passage for High boys - we have been enduring it for all but a handful of the last 100 years. I was proud of the character they all displayed.

A New School Library – How much do we really want one?

Do we want our school to have the best and most modern research and pleasure reading facilities, break out spaces and conference rooms? Do we want a showcase building on a par with our private school competitors? Do we want the latest in information and communication technology for our boys? Do we want to enhance the appeal of our school as a destination for gifted all rounders? If the widely agreed answer to these questions is 'yes' then how far are we willing to go to make our vision a reality? Can we make a

communal commitment to speed up the process of raising funds to implement our desired outcome? We have \$325, 000 but we need \$2,000,000. At the rate of \$150,000 per annum we will get there in a decade. How can we speed up this rate of fund raising? The answer is to broaden the base and increase the financial commitment of our donor list.

We have it within our power as a school community to fund this project. We will need to change our culture to do so. If we wait for the 'government' to fund a new library we will be repeating the history of the six generations of High communities who have wanted a new library before and who expected the 'government' would build them one. Some of our GPS competitors raise twice our total target in one year. We have the numbers and community resources to get what we want.



We have a Sydney High School Development Committee operating. It is chaired by Year 9 parent, Assoc.Prof. Tailoi Chan-Ling. Its purpose is primarily to raise funds for school purposes –

principally a new school library. The committee is comprised of the Principal, the president of the OBU, the President and Vice-President of the P & C, School Council representatives and our Fundraising Officer, Valda Roser. The committee has as one of its goals to encourage our majority Asian background school community to engage with the ethos of the school and to broaden their support for school objectives. To be effective, this committee will need parents who can communicate to our majority community to raise awareness of our purposes and projects. We will also need fresh ideas about how we can reach out effectively to sell our self-help message to them. The next step will be to find ways of brining them together to generate communal commitment to the cause. We have called upon each Year Group Committee to provide the communication mechanism to achieve that objective. We need people who believe in the self-help principle to assist us to make a difference. If you are such a person, please email me or contact your Year Group representative. Let this be the last 6-year generation of High parents and students that just dreams of a new library!



1. A general opening statement in the first paragraph

- This statement tells the audience what the text is going to be about.
- This can include a short description of the subject.
- This can include a short definition of the subject.
- 2. A series of paragraphs about the subject
- Each paragraph usually begins with a topic sentence.
- The topic sentence at the beginning of each paragraph previews the information contained in the rest of the paragraph.
- The sentences after this preview give more details.
- Each paragraph should give information about one feature of the subject.
- These paragraphs build a description of the subject of the report.
- These paragraphs may include technical language that is related to the subject.
- 3. A concluding paragraph
- The concluding paragraph signals the end of the text.
- This paragraph can provide a brief summary of the report.

Is it bad for children?

Puberty provides a great window of opportunity for boys to develop strength through training because of high testosterone levels. If regular training is maintained, the large possible gains at this time last into adulthood.



Many coaches and parents believe that strength training is bad for children and even potentially dangerous. For instance, a myth

exists that heavy weight lifting too young will stunt growth. There is little research to suggest that weight training for pubescent boys is unsafe – in fact, most of it confirms that weight training is one of the safest exercises they can do. A child is more likely to be injured on the football pitch, tennis court or running track than in the gym.

We have a great strength training facility on site, at very reasonable rates, under the coordination of Jason Tassell, a highly experienced and qualified strength and conditioning coach. I would recommend that every student at some time during their school life get undertake a strength development program, the sooner the better. You will be amazed at the benefits you will gain.

FENCING NEWS FIRST MEDAL FOR SBHS THIS YEAR!



On Saturday the SBHS-A team consisting of Amadeus Klocker, Jeffrey Chan, Yu Lin and Patrick Duffy won the Bronze Medal in the invitational AJ Rae Shield.

We arrived as the outsiders (ranked 15th), but leading for the entire match we quickly and convincingly defeated Barker-A (ranked 7th). The fencer of this match was clearly Jeffrey with his fantastic footwork.

Our next opponent was Grammar-A (ranked 3rd). The bout was fairly evenly matched, even though we led most of the time, by time out Grammar had drawn even. The coin was flipped, and I managed to keep my nerve and deliver the finishing blow - 39:38. This was a very satisfying victory after our crushing defeat by them in the Schools Championships three weeks ago.

In the semi finals we were up against Hills Grammar (ranked 2^{nd}). Solid fencing on both sides, but they were clearly the better team, defeating us 30:45.

After a short break we went into a playoff for 3^{rd} place and convincingly defeated the Newington-A team (ranked 4^{th}). The bronze medal was ours!

U/17 STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

In the preliminary round of the U/17 State Championships on Sunday, Patrick, Yu, and I fenced in three different poules, each achieving two wins and suffering three losses. Since we were on equal points Patrick who had the most favourable hits given/hits

taken ratio was placed 11^{th} , followed by Yu 12^{th} and myself 14^{th} .

The format then changed to direct elimination, fenced first to 15 instead of first to 5. Patrick was up against the 6th ranked fencer. Whilst Patrick fenced very well and managed to recover some lost ground, it was not enough and he was eliminated 6:15.

Yu Lin was up against the 5th ranked fencer, who I had narrowly defeated in the preliminary round, giving us hope Yu might win too, but it was not to be. He fought hard but his opponent's fencing style did not suit Yu at all, resulting in a defeat of 2:15.

In my bout against the 3^{rd} ranked fencer I led for eight and a half of the nine minutes, before losing it, allowing my opponent to score two quick hits, resulting in a draw at time out. The coin was flipped and he delivered the coup de grace. I was defeated 12:13. He went on to win the bronze medal and I remained in 14^{th} position.

We were all defeated in direct elimination, and thus our rankings from the preliminary round became our final rankings - Patrick 11th, Yu 12th and myself 14th.


