The HSC is over again for another year. Year 12 students are now completing their Clearance Forms and picking up their portfolios. I have completed 152 references. There are still quite a few incomplete ones where teacher reference sheets have not been returned or students have not emailed their personal paragraphs outlining their achievements. I urge parents to encourage their sons to complete the reference process. I occasionally get calls and emails from Old boys wanting information that is stored electronically in our reference files

Monthly Giving Scheme

Thank you to the 52 people who are members of the monthly giving scheme. Total monthly donations are now \$1,590. Our target for 2008 is to have 150 donors generating \$4,500 per month towards our new library / performing arts centre 125th anniversary project. If you are looking for an easy, relatively painless way of supporting High, do as I do and commit to a monthly credit card payment for a great cause – public education.

Exciting new research tool – JStor

The *Library Fund* has subscribed to a very powerful research tool – JStor. This service is used extensively in universities and consists of electronic access to journal articles in a large number of academic journals. I believe that teachers and students will find JStor gives them an edge when responding to current issues in their courses.

Data Projection and sound system roll out.



Our policy is to have our teaching spaces data projection capable, mounted on the ceilings in security cages. In addition, we see sound system support for video streaming and WAN downloads as essential, given the quality of PC and laptop generated sound. Consequently, our roll out is expensive at up to \$4k per room. In 2006, using *Centenary Building Fund* capital maintenance funds and a grant from the P & C, we set up eight rooms. In 2007 first semester, another seven rooms were equipped. This month we are establishing another five rooms. We have spent nearly \$50k this year alone to bring the world to our classrooms – yet another good reason for parents to support the *Centenary Building Fund*.

Behaviour on trains

Embarrassingly, I have received another complaint from a regular commuter on the Strathfield line. Apparently, a group of five

or six boys are abusing rail pass privileges. Boys are once again reminded that they are to give up their seats willingly to adult paying passengers. Not only does non-compliance constitute grounds for cancellation of a train pass, but also the actions of a few tarnish the reputation of the whole school. Sydney Boys High is judged widely as a lighthouse school. Our students bear a heavy burden to set a good example for others in public education. Let us make sure that at all times our behaviour justifies our elite status.

Willkommen im Klassenzimmer!!!!



Being allowed to do a work experience at Sydney Boys High School is a great and valuable experience. Since the end of October I have had the great opportunity to spend some time at this school and get a deeper and more practical insight into teaching. I am currently an exchange student from Germany studying English and Philosophy at the University of Sydney. Australian Studies and Australian Literature are my focus in my studies this year.

Although I only spent just a short period of time at Sydney Boys High School, I would like to report on my impressions and experiences. One of many reasons why I applied for this school is the fact that students are able to choose from a wide range of languages. Besides classical languages such as Latin and Classical Greek, French, Chinese and German are also being taught. It is amazing to see that many students at Sydney High are

willing to learn another language. In our global world it is most important to be open to different cultures and societies. The best and probably most interesting way to achieve this is by learning a new language.

I talked to many Sydney High students who learn German. They do very well and I would like to motivate them to continue with German. Moreover, I am impressed by the engagement and energetic effort the teachers put into their work. Ms Matsos', Latin class 8, for example, is ahead in covering their topics and they have already begun with Year 9 topics.

Furthermore, it astonished me how many different sport and music activities are made available to every student. This surely means a welcome and challenging change for all of them. Besides that, it also strengthens the sense of school community and identity.

All in all, I am very grateful that I have been allowed to spend some time at this school and I would like to say thank you to the pupils and to the staff, especially Ms Matsos and Mr Walker, for their continuous support and for their warm welcome.

Chris Herting berichtet über sein Praktikum



Es ist eine besondere und wohl auch einmalige Erfahrung, an der Sydney Boys High School ein Praktikum machen zu dürfen. Für mich ergab sich diese ausgezeichnete Gelegenheit im Rahmen meines Auslandssemesters, das ich hier an der University of Sydney verbringe. Ich komme aus Deutschland, studiere Englisch und Philosophie und konzentriere mich zurzeit in meinem Studium auf Australian Studies.

Obwohl ich nur für kurze Zeit an der Sydney Boys High gewesen bin, möchte ich von meinen Eindrücken und Erfahrungen, die ich hier in dieser Zeit gesammelt habe, berichten.

Ein Grund von vielen, warum ich mich bei der Sydney Boys High School beworben habe, ist die Tatsache, dass an dieser Schule, viele verschiedene Sprachen unterrichtet werden. Neben den klassischen Sprachen wie Latein und Griechisch werden auch moderne Sprachen wie Französisch, Chinesisch oder Deutsch angeboten. In unserer globalisierten Welt gehört es zu den wichtigen Schlüsselqualifikationen, mit Menschen aus der ganzen Welt kommunizieren zu können und deren Kultur zu verstehen. Es ist daher sehr erfreulich, dass so viele Schüler von dem Angebot der Schule Gebrauch machen, und eine Sprache erlernen und sich damit höher qualifizieren.

Darüber hinaus beeindruckt mich das Engagement der Lehrerschaft, die mit Ideenreichtum und realitätsnahe Unterricht die Schüler in ihren Leistungen motivieren.

Das Ergebnis kann sich sehen lassen. Die 8er Lateinklasse von Frau Matsos ist dem eigentlichen Unterrichtsplan weit voraus und hat bereits mit dem Stoff aus der 9. Klasse begonnen. Neben den geistigen werden auch sportliche Fähigkeiten gefördert. Die Schüler können von einem großen Angebot der verschiedensten Sportarten wählen. Dies bietet einen guten Ausgleich zu dem fordernden Schulalltag. Im Übrigen stärken die sportlichen Aktivitäten nicht nur das Selbstbewusstsein der Schüler, sondern schaffen auch ein Gemeinschaftsgefühl und ein Gefühl der Verbundenheit zur Schule.


before the leave and not after.

The Principal must approve all leave applications.


Another email service for parents





The last 3 weeks, although interrupted by weather, have seen a real buzz occur among our cricketers with consistent performances, competitive scores and individual improvements. In particular the improvement in the boys in the Years 7, 8 and 9 teams and their attitude towards training and attendances has been terrific. But most importantly I am hearing from teams that there is now a belief that each time we take the field we can win matches – and if the “winning attitude” is maintained we will ultimately succeed.

AROUND THE GROUNDS –

The weather was the winner, with Group1, 1st and 2nd XI matches last Saturday abandoned due to rain and lack of opportunity to prepare turf wickets.
