Educational Assessment Practices – a new approach?

Australia is one of five 'founder' countries researching computer simulations to test problem solving and teamwork. The pilot program is designed to prepare students for the C21 workplace. Newly developed testing tools are scheduled to be ready by 2012. They could be adopted by the OECD's triennial testing of international 15-year-olds. Cisco, Intel and Microsoft are behind the initiative which has the potential to revolutionise formal school testing and classroom teaching by the end of the next decade.

Joint SBHS-SGHS P & C evening – Andrew Martin

Dr Martin spoke knowledgeably and clearly about 'Boosting Student Motivation and Engagement' at SGHS last week. He puts underachievement in gifted adolescents down to failing to learn the 'effort lesson' because they have cruised through school life relatively effortlessly. He tries to orient students towards the process of learning rather than dwelling on its product. Dr Martin favours the 'drawing approach' to motivation by means of building coordination, commitment, coordination and control. Enhancing self-belief, valuing school and focussing on the process of learning, boost motivation. Good personal planning, management of study and persistence are the behaviours that boost motivation. Success can be maximised by chunking, or dividing tasks into manageable units, and seeing value in the completion of each unit. Individuals can reduce the focus on

comparing with others by mapping their success and progress against their own personal bests. Resilient people see their worth as a person in the round and not by academic performance alone. Winter Sports Assembly



Last week's Winter Sports Assembly was one of the most enjoyable that I have attended since being at High. The boys who spoke summarised their preparatory experiences and introduced their teams efficiently and informatively, without attempting 'in jokes' or commentaries. Andrew Jacques (2004) spoke about his pride in representing his school. He emphasised the value of participation across the activities offered by High and what unexpected benefits such activities can bring. In his case, being introduced to rifle shooting. My speech is reprinted below.

Special guest Andrew Jacques, players, coaches, staff, parents, students – welcome to our Winter sports assembly for 2009. We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land where we gather, the Gadigal people of the Eora nation and pay our respects to them and their elders past and present. Our winter sports are very well attended overall in 2009 but we still need boys who used to play rugby to return to the sport. The viability of the rugby program going forward requires at least 3 teams per age group for years 13-16 and three opens teams. If you are playing rugby and having fun, tell your friends about it. I would like to see more boys in cross country running also. Many boys have demonstrated talent at 1.6 kms but neither ran middle distance during the athletics season, nor joined cross country. Get involved boys!

As we enter another winter season of GPS competition, I want to acknowledge the efforts made by many coaches and team members to accept accountability for their personal preparation. School policy is that three training sessions per week must be completed for selection in A or B GPS teams and are recommended for C teams.

Boys involved in outside school training sessions can have one of these credited by arrangement with their coaches, if they are cross training at an advanced level. In the senior school coaches expect further sprint or weights sessions for players in first grade but these additional sessions are not compulsory. They are recommended. Not surprisingly, students who do the extra work will have a selection advantage with their coaches. The log book system is now firmly in place and should apply to all sports. Students need to get their logbooks signed off.

I want to recognise and applaud the hard work of Richard Gifford and Andrew Bennie (Football), Geoff Stein and Paul Scrivener (Rugby), Jenni May (Fencing) Clay Kesting / John Prorellis , Mick Kay (Volleyball) and Cathy Meaney (Rifle Shooting). The Parent Committees work tirelessly to support our sports. Thank you to them

This morning I would like to share with you some experiences from the life of Johnny Warren, a legend in Australian soccer, who was an established Australian football team member in 1968. He played for the St. George club in Sydney. His team finished second last in the first grade competition in 1968. Frank Arok was appointed in 1969 as the first full time professional administrator / manager of an Australian club football team. His brief was to turn the fortunes of the club around. Arok believed that maintaining team discipline was the key to success. He immediately increased the number of training sessions to four nights per week and fined players for being late to training. He provided a training ball for every member of the team – a new experience for Warren. Frank concentrated on game simulated preparation, using interval training instead of 10km runs to build endurance. He introduced the position of 'sweeper' for the first time in Australian football. He changed expiring player contracts to include an incentive scheme based on performance. As a result of these changes, St George Club played in the next two first grade competition grand finals. Johnny Warren, in his autobiography, credits Frank Arok with the revival in the club's success using basically the same players from the previous season. How does this vignette apply to students at High? I think every team member in any sport can learn that success in competition is grounded in physical and mental preparation of individuals and with achievable goals and a plan of action for the team as a whole. Discipline, dedication and persistence are necessary to achieve success in any sporting environment. Together we can achieve greater goals. The catch is ...we all have to do the work

All our representatives in winter GPS sports teams should be congratulated for their personal preparation, their commitment and dedication to team goals. They are the examples of the ethos of our school – the scholar-sportsman. They are the role models for younger students to follow. At High we believe in pursuing high quality performances in every area of school life. Our special guest today is Old Boy Andrew Jacques, from the class of 2004. Andrew represented target rifle shooting in the Australian Schools Rifle Team in 2000, a year in which he was also presented with the Australian Sports Medal. Andrew was selected in High's first grade rifle shooting team for four

years 2001-2004. He was in the GPS Premiership winning teams in 2001 and 2003. Andrew rowed at the Head of the River in the 2nd IV and subsequently in the 2nd VIII. Since leaving school, Andrew has completed an honours degree in Exercise and Sports Science, being awarded the University Medal. Andrew is currently studying medicine. Please make welcome a fine recent example of a High scholar-sportsman, Andrew Jacques.

Human Swine Flu Information Sheet

Australia is entering a new phase in its response to human swine flu, known as **PROTECT**. The change in approach is because the virus strain is currently not as virulent as anticipated.

The aims of the **PROTECT** phase are to ensure that people at an increased risk of complications from influenza are treated early to try to prevent severe illness from developing, and to help control outbreaks in schools and other institutions.

On the advice of NSW Health, staff or students who have been to an area where there is known community or school transmission of human swine flu are no longer excluded. **Any staff member or student who has been excluded from school and who does not have flu symptoms can return to school immediately.** The school exclusion policy was inconvenient but it helped to limit the spread of disease in NSW schools.

Instead of excluding people who may have been to an affected area, or who have been in contact with a person with confirmed human swine influenza, we will now be asking any person with flu symptoms to stay at home until they are well.

Any student attending school who identifies that they are unwell, or is displaying flu-like symptoms will be sent to sick bay and their parent or carer will be called to take them home.

Please watch carefully for any signs or symptoms of flu-like illness in your child. These symptoms include fever, cough, tiredness, muscle aches, sore throat, chills or shortness of breath. NSW Health has advised if you or your child develops flu-like symptoms you should seek the advice of your family doctor as you would with any other illness. Parents have an important role to play in helping their children understand and follow the government hygiene advice. Your help to do this is appreciated.

We understand there may be some ongoing concern in school communities, however, we can reassure you that we have taken, and will continue to act on advice we receive from NSW Health to ensure the health, safety and wellbeing of our staff and students.

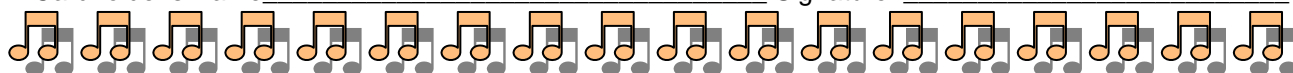

After each GPS match the captain will be responsible for forwarding on the result of their game, including the names of any goal scorers, to the MIC by Monday afternoon.

Match Reports

1st XI v Shore Won 2-1

The first match of the GPS season presented an exciting scenario for the first grade players. Shortly after arrival at the ground, the group was presented with their jerseys by former SBHS pupil Marc Bennie (1997). With a blazer that has more lines and blues than the team put together, he encouraged the team to put in an inspired performance against a determined Shore outfit.

After a slow start, High conceded a goal inside 20 minutes courtesy of a cracking free kick from one of the Shore players. While the first half action was below par, High dominated the second period. The hard work of Sam Higgins soon paid off as he was cut down inside the box. Nick Dimitropoulos - who is now closing in on our leading goal scorers - calmly slotted home the ensuing penalty. Not bad for a centre back!

Much the same as our pre-season trial match against Shore, High found it difficult to convert their many chances. This was despite holding the majority of possession and the many goal scoring opportunities created throughout the game. With time running out and the will to never give in, something had to happen!

Enter Anthony Tsiailis, Sam Lane and Sam Higgins. A smart pass from Anthony put Sam Lane in the gap who was then able to cross the ball in sweetly to Sam Higgins who gladly knocked the ball in the back of the net with a mere 30 seconds left on the clock. Wild celebrations followed from the supporters while the coach looked on in disbelief with how we got away with this one...A great start to the season for the team.

2nd XI v Shore Lost 0-1

High 2nd grade struggled to convert their dominance of field position and possession into goals in their first round match. High needs to move the ball around more, in order to open up space, to create quality scoring opportunities. This requires contributions from all 11 players on the park, at all times. We need to focus on reading the direction of the play as it develops, in order to be in position to move the ball away from the congested areas of the field. We need multiple options off the ball and decoy runners, to break down our opposition's defensive line. In doing so, it will give our attackers the time required to allow them to either shoot or to play the accurate passes that are necessary to release our strikers on goal.

I would like to commend all players for their effort during the match, a true display of the High spirit. We know we can play hard, we now need to learn how to play smart.

16Cs v Shore Won 2-1

High 16Cs kept their unbeaten run intact with a gutsy 2-1 win over Shore. Goals by Ali Mokdad and Ilya Bonch-Osmolovskiy sealed a thoroughly deserved win. As ever, the defence, anchored by Marcel Rosza and Varun Sethi, limited Shore's scoring chances, while the midfield runners -- Kevin Lin, Kevin Lu and Henry Lu -- chased all game. Leo Lu, playing with an injured ankle, was also a stand-out at left back.

15Bs vs Shore won 3-2

The 15Bs went onto the field with high hopes, but things did not go to plan at the start. Key players (including our Captain and Vice) couldn't attend the match and our coach was unavailable. The field was muddy and as a result, High was down 2-0 at the end of the 1st half. However things would soon turn around. Allen (keeper) told our strikers to be trigger-happy as the goalie box was a mud bath. Early in the half Jerry found an opening and, keeping Allen's advice in mind, launched a curve-ball that caught their keeper off-guard. A few minutes later MT brought the game to a tie with a well-earned goal. The ball bounced back and forth for the next few minutes, with no side able to secure a lead. It was all down to the team who wanted it most. In the last minute, a clearance ball by Shore fell to Tim (sweeper). Spotting Jerry open near the box, he dribbled past 2 players and sent a sliding through ball to Jerry who crossed it to MT, securing a lead for High with his 2nd goal. Overall it was a fantastic effort from the team and a good start to the season.

13As v Shore Lost 0-4

After some good training sessions this week High 13As went into a match needing a confidence boost after coming off a resounding loss to Newington in an earlier trial. Training has been hampered by the weather and thus the 13s have spent some time sitting idle

The game started off well, High dominated early possession with short quick passes. Actual scoring chances were limited as the final decision of many of the boys was poor. Runs off the ball were not made, and many times the boys found themselves running alongside each other and making 1 metre passes. Defensively for the first 15 minutes the boys were rock solid. Sida having a man of the match performance, clearing balls and running down fast breaks. Abdul also put in his share of back tracking tackles. However High were again undone by some simple mistakes, a soft first goal so heads dropped. And players began to lose their shape and High began to lose control of the game.
