### From the Principal



Good luck to our basketballers who are competing in the NSW Champion Schools Knockout tournament to decide which

team will represent NSW at the National Basketball School Tournament. Well done to Andre Brokman who has been awarded a GASS scholarship to spend several weeks in Germany immersing himself in the language and culture. Congratulations to Sam Lane (Year 10), Tom Connolly (Year 9) and Tim Collier (Year 8) for winning silver medals in the 3.4km cross country event at the National Schools Skiing Competition at Falls Creek last week.

### **NAPLAN Results**

The National Testing results are in for Years 7 and 9. These results will be analysed by staff over coming months and any adjustments to programming or specific interventions will be made for implementation in 2010.

### Literacy



During the period 2006-2008, overall Literacy standards amongst Year 7 students declined. We

compare ourselves to a Comparison School Group of Selective Schools. Band 9 results fell from 76 to 67% (CSG 63%), while band 8 results increased from 22 to 33%(CSG 29%). Band 7 results declined from 3 to 1% (CSG 6%). In reading, band 9 results dipped in 2007 from 69 to 53% but recovered in 2008 to 66%. Spelling results for band 9 were 71% (CSG 64%) and grammar and punctuation 52% (CSG 53%). In writing, the decline in band 9 is alarming, from 68% in 2006 to 41% in 2008 (CSG 51%). Band 7 results in the period grew from 5 to 17% (CSG 13%). In the inaugural Year 9 test, 61% of our students achieved band 10 (CSG 49%), but 7% of boys were at band 8 level (CSG 11%). In reading, 41% of boys reached band 10 (CSG 39%), in spelling 52% (CSG 49%), in grammar and punctuation 66% (CSG 59%) and in writing 51% (GSC 43%). These results indicate that we are facing a challenge to lift the standard of our writing skills across the board. We have responded in 2009 with a pilot remediation program for a single class in Year 7. More generally, literacy skills need to be scaffolded, taught explicitly and assessed broadly if we are to raise our standards.

### Numeracy

During the period 2006-2008, overall numeracy standards in Year 7 were consistently excellent, with 2008 recording 100% of boys in band 9 (CSG 89%). In number and patterns band 9 was achieved by 99% of boys (CSG 91%); in measurement and algebra 98% (CSG 89%) and space and geometry 91% (CSG 74%). In the first Year 9 test, our overall results remained strong at 98% in band 10 (CSG 82%). In number and data band 10, High was 94% (CSG 79%); in patterns and algebra 93% (CSG 83%) and measurement, space and geometry 87% (64%). Notwithstanding our great results, we have room for improvement in space and geometry in Years 7-9.

### The Football Dinner



It was a packed Great Hall to celebrate the end of a successful football season last Thursday. The Football Committee did a

great job organising the event and many people were thanked for their efforts during the season. Players and teams were honoured for their efforts on the field. The theme of the evening was that more commitment to training would bring a greater level of skill to teams that would as a consequence improve their results on the paddock. Mr Gifford was tireless in his organisation of the sport while coaching second grade. First grade had a good season, in large part due to the great coaching of Andrew Bennie and the inspiring teamwork the boys demonstrated. Nick Dimitropoulos was remarkable in the back all season and Antony Paul finished some crucial opportunities to secure wins or save draws. I hope the example set by the 2009 team becomes the benchmark for future teams - a star team can outplay a team of stars.

### The Rugby Dinner

As usual, the Rugby Dinner was well attended last Saturday night, particularly by Year 7 parents. Many awards were distributed and coaches thanked. Mr Stein organised rugby with his customary great efficiency in 2009. The Rugby Committee, led ably by Geoff Andrews, organised additional camps to promote junior rugby. Mr Scrivener was passionate about getting the first XV prepared. Both he and Nelson Ridges stressed the importance of logbooks in sustaining motivation and building team cohesion through shared training experiences. Our first XV was arguably the best for five years. It was no accident that their improved showing was linked to their improved attitude to training. I commented on the disruptions of the compromise 2009 season and praised all the teams for sticking to their guns under trying conditions at time. Despite the difficulties, every High team had at least one win this year - a tribute to the fixtures meetings and our boys' determination. I trust that even a single taste of success will spur on more boys to join the sport in 2010 to increase our depth and capabilities. Dr K A Jaggar

### ONE HUNDRED YEARS OF THE RECORD



This year marks the 100th anniversary of "The Record" – the magazine of the Sydney Boys High School – which was first published in December 1909. To commemorate this milestone, "High Notes" is publishing a selection of editorials from the various editions published over the past century.

This week we are publishing the editorial from the issue of April 1912. It was written at a time when the State was expanding secondary education with the establishment of many new high schools and the public examinations were necessarily changing from the Junior and Senior examinations conducted by Sydney University, to the Intermediate Certificate and Leaving Certificate examinations administered by the Department of Public Instruction. (The Intermediate Certificate and Leaving Certificate have since become the School Certificate and Higher School Certificate of today.)

The Editor for this issue was George Jacob Maxwell Saxby, the son of the then Deputy Headmaster (and later, Headmaster of the School), George Campbell Saxby. After School, he completed his medical degree at Sydney University before enlisting in World War I as a medical officer in April 1918. He returned from service in 1919 to continue his medical career until his death in 1967.

### Editorial

We are at the parting of the ways. "The old order changeth, yielding place to new." The present Senior and Junior classes will be the last that the old School will see. We scan the pages of the past and note its many triumphs, but we look towards the future with hopes of many more. "What need is there for change?" we ask ourselves. We fit comfortably and usefully in the existing order of things. We have more than justified ourselves in the educational life of the community.

Year by year we have turned over to the business world, the Public Service, and the University, boys well prepared and eager for the duties and activities of their choice. Our alumni – the oldest are still young – fill honourable and honoured positions in the various professions and in medical and scientific research; some are world-famous.

What wonder, then, if regretfully we close a volume of our history?

Can we be expected to view with equanimity the passing of the Senior, the Junior, and Matric Examinations? What school traditions of mighty conflicts with other Schools on the battle-grounds of these exams are conjured up by their very names! What glorious victories! What scarcely-to-be-credited defeats – sometimes! Shall our champions measure blades no more with the champions of other schools? Shall this spur to effort be denied us?

The much-coveted distinction of bringing honour to the School has been a potent factor in the making of many students. We seldom – in our boyhood days – love study for study's sake, and the University examinations have undoubtedly provided the stimulus to many a boy to get the best, intellectually, out of himself.

And so we sigh regretfully.

But the buoyancy of lusty youth is ours; also an adventurous and progressive spirit, product of the freedom and opportunities of our sunny south land, which views the future hopefully. We must march with the times. So, be it Junior Exam or Intermediate Certificate, be it Senior Exam or Leaving Certificate, the Sydney Boys' High School can be depended upon to do its very best.

The old order changeth, yet we feel justified in prophesying that the new – which presents so many favourable features in its inception – will, when in full operation, produce even more brilliant triumphs and more widespread and lasting educational benefits to the State than the old.


