The National Plan to Reduce Violence against Women and their Children



2010-2022 Why do we need a National Plan?

The main types of violence

targeted are domestic and family violence and sexual assault. These are gendered crimes. One in three Australian women have experienced physical violence since the age of 15 and one in five have experienced sexual violence (ABS 2006). People who experience this kind of violence are women – in a home, at the hands of men they know. Domestic violence affects not only the victims themselves but also *children who are exposed to it*, their extended families, their friends, their work colleagues and the broader community.

Violence against women means "any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual or psychological harm or suffering to women, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or in private life." (p3).

Domestic violence refers to acts of violence that occur between people who have or have had an intimate relationship. A central element is an ongoing pattern of behaviour aimed at controlling a partner through fear. Domestic violence includes: physical, sexual, emotional and psychological abuse. Psychological and emotional abuse can include: control of finances, isolation from family and friends, continual humiliation, threats against children or being threatened with injury or death. Family violence refers to violence between family members, including marital and kinship relationships.

From my perspective boys schools in particular need to start raising awareness of this significant social problem. It is a social and health issue as damaging as smoking and drink driving. Our young men need to be trained in skills to establish respectful relationships with girls and women so that the intergenerational cycle of gendered crimes of violence is broken. Our High Resolves boys showed the way last year with their PowerPoint presentation on the international plight of women. Now we should focus on our own society and confront the problem. Only long term educational interventions, supported by government-financed professional support coupled with more resolute legal responses, can lead to a significant reduction in violence against women.

Year 12 Reports

Year 12 boys will be issued with their reports next week. However, *Clearance Forms* may be needed by more students this year as many have yet to finalise their accounts for term one, particularly in respect of copayments for participation in summer sports. In addition, captains of teams in summer sports competitions need to submit written season report summaries to Ms May for inclusion in The Record. Until those responsibilities are met, *Clearance Forms* will not be signed.

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Growing Gorgeous Boys into Good Men!

Adolescent boys — they seem to disappear into another world where they barely communicate, and where fast cars, alcohol and drugs are constant temptations.

Will they survive to become good men? How can parents and schools understand and help them through this difficult and dangerous time?

After 15 years as the first female prison officer, Celia knows what can happen when boys make the wrong choices. She also knows what it's like to be a parent — she raised a son on her own and feared for his survival. During the recent Good Man Project she talked to 180 classes of boys throughout. The result was a significant insight into the minds of teenage boys and what they are feeling in this period of their lives. There are challenging suggestions for parents if they want to see their sons become the good men they want them to be. Celia is a great speaker and her talk gives parents plenty of food for thought and plenty of hints at how to work with their teenage sons. All parents will find something valuable in this talk -regardless of whether they have sons or not.
