#### From the Principal High Talent

Congratulations to Francis Torok (Year 12) of SBH who ran in the NSW Cross Country Championships to win 1st place in the Opens age group. #### Changes to the School Certificate



The Minister for Education announced this week that the School Certificate Tests will be discontinued after this year. A new credential will be developed to cater for

students who may leave school before completing their Higher School Certificate. We welcome this development at High because it frees up term 4 each year from now on to pursue stage 6 level activities, complete electives and reschedule the sequence of end-of-year events. I hope that more learning and more student-centred activities will be possible as a result of removing the examination pressure on Year 10 in November. The announcement also aligns nicely with the decision taken last year to compact the stage 5 curriculum in history and geography and deliver it in Year 9, thus freeing up Year 10 for 3 electives of 8 periods each. These electives simulate the breadth and depth of learning that is required in stage 6 courses. The removal of the testing will also allow some re-writing of stage 5 history and geography programs by teachers to reflect a change in emphasis and the absence of a need to prepare students for an external examination.

#### Australian Curriculum Implementation Delayed

The Minister for Education also announced that the timeframe had changed for the

implementation of the Australian curriculum in English, mathematics, science and history (K-10). The planning phase will now commence in 2013 with classroom implementation in 2014. The proposed timetable is both more realistic and circumscribed - we now have a timeline to plan to. In developing the school's strategic Plan 2012-2014, we now have some clear objectives for the final two years for four departments at least.

#### The Jaggar Gift

The rescheduled Jaggar Gift was run this week. Unfortunately, the calendar date was washed out during a recent period of torrential rain and had to be postponed. A very small field of runners this year turned out to race for the prizes - \$50 for first, \$30 for second and \$20 for third. The crowd was also much reduced compared to previous years. The race is in two divisions - Junior and Senior. The rationale for the Gift is that runners are handicapped according to their 1.6km registered times to allow for an equitable chance for each competitor. Runners are sent out at their handicapped time of zero + X seconds. . The handicapper is renowned for his fairness when assigning handicaps. The fastest runner has to chase down the field. The Gift was initiated to add more incentive to the school's campaign to improve the quality of middle distance running. Many boys have improved their times dramatically. They are also rewarded in their PE assessment scores for their efforts in achieving goal times. The winners this year were: Junior Division - first, Steven Chung; second James Tinker; third, Luke Hoad. Senior Division - first, Lloyd Perris, second, Jonathan Clements-Lendrum, third, Adam Booth. Congratulations, boys!

#### EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEMES

Most institutions that participate in the University Admissions Centre (UAC) have an Educational Access Scheme (EAS) for applicants who have experienced long term educational disadvantage. To qualify applicants must demonstrate that their educational performance during Years 11 and 12 or equivalent have been seriously affected by circumstances beyond their choice or control. Students applying for Educational Access Scheme (EAS) for Universities in 2012 will need to download their booklets and applications forms from the website: www.uac.edu.au

If you require a Statement of Support from the school counsellors, your EAS form will need to be in to them with all required documentation by the beginning of week 8, term 3. The responsibility for sending the finalised application to UAC by closing date at end of September 2011 rests with the individual student.

#### What's Up in the McDonald Senior Library? Senior library survey



For the past few weeks students in the senior school have been responding to our library survey, the results of which will be used to develop the library into the future.

Various questions relating to aspects of the library including what students use the library for, what resources are needed, what resources they use to do their research, what positive and negative characteristics exist at present to provide a good study environment and what they would like to see changed.

The survey has 20 questions comprising both multiple choice and comment answers. So far there have been over 174 responses the larger group being Year 10 students (54%), with year 11 (26%) with Yr 12 (20%) students being a bit more reticent to complete the survey. The reason some have given is that they will be gone soon. As Year 10s are the largest group responding, the results will be slightly skewed toward their experience of the Senior Library in that they only use it outside lesson times at recess, lunch and when their class is booked in with their classroom/subject teachers for a lesson. However, there have been many useful comments from both Year 11 and 12 students which reflect the views held also by many of the Year 10s.

Most of the responses were confined to just a few areas of concern for the students. On the questions regarding resources needed and how the library could improve the overwhelming opinion and number of requests was for **more book resources**. This ranged from Fiction, nonfiction, reference, study guides and additionally students comments were about the need for more books and other materials such as DVDs relevant to current curriculum subjects and topics.

The issue second most commented on, of concern to students, was the **lack of space** in the Senior Library. There is seating for 110 students currently which means the library is very crowded and often can be noisy if students have group discussions during their study periods. Many thought that a quiet area is needed so that students studying individually can do so without distraction. With the number of students using this space each lesson during the day it is impossible to provide quiet areas.

This could involve extra space being provided in the future by extending into adjoining classroom/s when these have been freed up after other classrooms

become available elsewhere in the school. Extra space is also needed to house our developing library collection. As expected the library resources used regularly are: the internet for research (84%) and after that they use Moodle (52%), Fiction Books (20%), non-fiction books (17%), Newspapers and magazines (22%) and finally online databases (14.41%). Students still see books as relevant (43%) and when asked why they read most responded that they read for pleasure/leisure (72%) and then for homework/assignments (43%); classwork (40%) and finally interest/information (35%). When asked though about what other resources they thought should be available their responses were: more non-fiction books (44%), more fiction books (41%), hard copy encyclopaedias (25%), more online databases (25%) and many also wanted e-books (24%).

From these figures it can be seen that the boys have a clear idea of what they want to see in the library and that they still value physical books as important resources in their learning, for general interest and reading for pleasure.

Reading for pleasure is directly related to academic achievement and this is reflected in many studies, so having a good collection of current fiction and interesting non-fiction with plenty related to curriculum is vital in creating library excellence for our gifted students who use it. Richard Watson in his book Future Minds : how the digital age is changing our minds, why this matters and what we can do about it (2010), raises some interesting concerns about the "rise of the screenager" and "why books still matter" (p36). He states that "reading, especially reading for pleasure, has been in decline for decades...[and that]...This is a serious issue because reading has a direct impact on intelligence and attainment. For instance, a Kaiser report in the US called "Generation M" found that 'leisure reading of any kind correlates more closely with a student's grades than any other media'." (p37)

When asked about the library environment most students thought the library was comfortable (64%) and welcoming (49%) despite overcrowding (50%) and noise (41%). Generally students are happy with many aspects of the library commenting that the best thing/s about the Senior library were that it is exclusive to seniors, good for study, is air-conditioned, has sofas and separate reading area, being able to study with friends, the resources, has access to information, is good for research, has the networked printer/copier/scanner and computers.

Implications from this survey are yet to be fully explored but we will be attempting to address student concerns about the lack of resources, space and quiet areas especially to fully develop the Senior Library into an excellent learning space which meets their needs fully.

#### Literacy Week and the Senior Library

This term, starting in Literacy Week (29<sup>th</sup> August – 2<sup>nd</sup> September) the Year 10 transition classes will be attending presentations by State librarians on the use of State Library resources. These sessions will continue until the end of term and will focus on the databases available for the use of library card holders outside the library. All Year 10 students have registered for a library card which will be distributed during these presentations so that they can be shown how to access and make the best use of this fantastic resource in their studies.

The Senior Library is also fortunate to host a visit on Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> September by the young adult author and journalist (The Australian) **Scott Monk**. Year 10s will be attending this presentation in the Senior Library. Scott will be discussing his writing and providing techniques and ideas to assist and encourage students to read widely as this will lead to more insightful and skilled writers.

#### ABOUT THE CENTRE

The two-storey Governors' Centre for Excellence in Education is planned to front Cleveland Street, located between the two schools on the site of the SGHS tennis court and incorporates:

- A 400 seat tiered auditorium suitable for lectures, seminars, conferences, productions and performances (with audio-visual facilities and collapsible first five rows for an orchestra pit)
- Substantial main stage and back of stage facilities
- A complementary 400 square metre multipurpose flat floor space with moveable internal walls, suitable for classrooms, meeting rooms and examination spaces
- One additional classroom
- Debating, teaching, music and drama rehearsal spaces with equipment and instrument storage
- A commanding entrance foyer with kiosk, cloak, toilet and change room facilities, suitable for functions and fundraising.
