Capital building refurbishment upgrading

works undertaken by the school this year include: data cabling \$80,378 Installing air conditioning in 611,

604, 605 and the visual arts staffroom (\$19,880); renewing the Office Kitchen (\$18,539); installing a kiln exhaust system in 707 (\$9467); and partitioning room 901 to create an ergo room to house 8 Concept 2 ergos with sliders (\$6987). These projects were financed by your school contributions and donations to the Centenary Building Fund and to the Technology levy. The P & C helped with \$5k for air conditioning. As well as saving for the future through the SBHS Building Fund – focussing on the Governors' Centre for Education Excellence - \$135,251 has been directly invested in providing facilities to enhance the teaching and learning environment at High.

Organised Sports and academic achievement



The US Surgeon General recommends children should engage in 60 minutes of moderate activity on most days of each week for optimum health. Research indicates that daily exercise may improve students' concentration and cognitive functioning. Eleven of 14 published studies analysing data from 58,000 students between 1967 and 2006 found that regular participation in physical activity is associated with improved academic performance.

At High we place a heavy emphasis on involvement in organised sports as well as PE. This summer we will provide healthy and sustained competitive team activity for: 32 basketball teams, 17 cricket teams, 22 tennis teams, 3 water polo teams, 115 rowers and a squad of 30 sailors. Our objective is mass participation at an appropriate standard. We strongly recommend that boys engage in organised sport in both summer and winter seasons.

To those parents who believe that boys need to be getting coached at weekends or locked up doing homework, we say that a balanced lifestyle for their sons will be more beneficial for them in the long run, both physically and academically.

Canteen Committee Volunteers



We need more volunteers to join our Committee. It is a great way to get to know your school and to help run

one of our major sources of income - the school canteen. People with expertise in finance/accounting are needed but we also need a secretary and a convener of the group. Our succession planning usually has volunteers joining the committee some years before they are asked to serve in a defined role.

The Foundation's Project for 2011

By agreement with the Management Committee, the Sydney High School Foundation Inc will target a facility, resource

or equipment need within the school to inject significant funds to make a difference on behalf of the school.

The funds used in such projects represent c 50% of the annual profit generated by the High Store. SHSF needs to communicate more frequently with staff, parents, Old Boys and students about what it does for students. This year the *Sydney High School Foundation* has decided to upgrade the Fairland Pavilion. Parts of the roof and guttering needed replacement. New windows are being installed and a long overdue repainting is planned. The floor covering is in need of repair, also. The Foundation will spend >\$50,000 to deliver a more respectable and practical facility for our boys and visitors to use.

Subject acceleration applications

Year 9 boys and their parents are advised that the deadline for submitting expressions of interest to be considered for admission to an acceleration class for Year 10, 2012 is Friday, November 4. Each Faculty has its own protocols but there are standard procedures for qualification for all Faculties [For specific course rules see www.sydneyboyshigh.com/curriculum/subjectaccele ration]. I make the final approval for these courses, based in part upon Year 9 annual rank orders, as established by Mr Dowdell's weighting formula, used to establish the Dux of the Year. Letters Re Absence/Lateness/ Early Leave

Leave



One new feature of the Literacy Circles this year is the embedding of the Sydney Boys New Book Blog 2011 into the unit of work.


So far the on-line writing standard of Years 7 and 8 boys has been very inspirational for me. Two

THE HUNGER GAMES Blogged by Timothy Nguyen - Year 8



Title of book: The Hunger Games *Author*: Suzanne Collins *Publisher*: Scholastic *Rating:* 10 out of 10 *Intended Audience*: Mostly teenagers since younger readers may find the book a little gory.

Voice: This novel is

written in mostly first person, where the narrator is Katniss.

Synopsis: Our heroine, Katniss Everdeen, is a resident of District 12. She lives in a desperately poor mining community called the Seam, and when her little sister's name is chosen as one of the contestants in the upcoming Hunger Games, Katniss volunteers to take her place. This is a gutsy decision, as District 12 hasn't had a Hunger Games winner in 30 years or so. Complicating her already desperate situation is her growing affection for the other District 12 contestant, a clueless baker's son

named Peeta Mellark. Further complicating her situation is her sorta-crush on her 18-year-old hunting partner, Gale.

Author's Purpose: The author's purpose is to entertain the audience with a forecast of what could happen in the future. She also leaves a hidden message about how the world is so unjust and uneven (first-world and third-world countries). She also provides an insight into what might happen in the future. (I'm not sure if this is what we are supposed to write, but it is how I feel)

Review: The love triangle is fairly standard teenread stuff - what 16-year-old girl wouldn't like to have two interesting guys to choose from? The rest of *The Hunger Games*, however, is a violent, jarring speed-rap of a novel that generates nearly constant suspense and may also generate a fair amount of controversy. I couldn't stop reading, and once I got over the main character's name, I got to like her a lot.

Collins is an efficient no-nonsense prose stylist with a pleasantly dry sense of humour. Reading *The Hunger Games* is as addictive (and as violently simple) as playing one of those shoot-it-if-it-moves videogames in the lobby of the local Eightplex; you know it's not real, but you keep plugging in quarters anyway. Balancing off the efficiency are displays of authorial laziness that kids will accept more readily than adults. When Katniss needs burn cream or medicine for Peeta, whom she more or less babysits during the second half of the book, the stuff floats down from the sky on silver parachutes. And although the bloody action in the arena is televised by multiple cameras, Collins never mentions Katniss seeing one.

But since this is the first novel of a projected trilogy, it seems to me that the essential question is whether or not readers will care enough to stick around and find out what comes next for Katniss. I know I will. (even though they already came out) So in my case, it just depends on how long I have to wait for the library to have one ready to borrow \bigcirc

Anthony Eaton - Nightpeople, Skyfall, Daywards, -> LESSON 3: PRESENTATION: BOOK BLOG - NIGHTPEOPLE

Nightpeople is a science-fiction fantasy/adventure story by Australian author Anthony Eaton. It is the

first book of the *Darklands Trilogy* for young adult readers. Eaton's book is both entertaining and thought provoking. It explores such themes as life after a nuclear holocaust, indigenous culture and traditions, family bonds and tribal rivalry. It also shows how humans struggle to survive – by whichever way they can – in one of the most desolate and inhospitable places on the planet.

The story is about a thirteen year old girl, Saria. She was the last, genetically perfect baby, born in the Darklands. Up until now, she was hidden in a secret valley to avoid being 'removed' by the Nightpeople. The Darklands believe she is their only hope of keeping their race alive. But, there are some Darklanders who want to trade her with the Nightpeople, in exchange for water and other essentials. Saria, however, is also special in other ways. She is a 'dreamer'. That is, she has telepathic powers which enable her to 'reach' into both people and nature. But, she has not yet learnt how to control this 'reading' and, the only person who can teach her has been killed by rival Darklanders.

The story is told in a third-person narrative. The reader is taken on an extraordinary journey, following the protagonist, Saria, through the Australian outback. Her journey is both a search for her true identity and also an escape over the Darkedge.

The story covers issues which are relevant to our own society. Issues such as: pollution, exploitation of mineral resources and the breakdown of family life and social order. It also delves into the paranormal – such as the power of 'reaching'. This added an important dimension to the plot because it empowered the physically defenceless Saria, against almost all of the bad elements in the Darklands. But, can she use her 'reaching' to defend herself once she escapes from the Darklands? I'll definitely be reading the rest of this Trilogy to find out.

Letter to Parents about ESSA online 2011

Dear Parent or Carer

The Essential Secondary Science Assessment (ESSA) test for Year 8 students will be held on T**uesday 22 November 2011**. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSA online.

ESSAonline contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including a simulated investigation. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW *Science Years* 7–10 *Syllabus*. Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values.

Since students complete ESSA online on a computer, they will not need writing materials. However, each student needs to bring **headphones or earbuds** that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an ipod or portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2012. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test. You will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning.

The principal of your child's school is able to provide you with more details about the ESSA program if you require additional information.
