Every Student, Every School: Learning and Support

Every Student, Every School: Learning and Support is a national partnership strategy to build the capacity of all NSW schools to improve outcomes for students with disability and additional learning and support needs. There are Disability Standards for Education published in 2005. There are 90,000 students enrolled in NSW public schools with additional learning and support needs. A learning and support framework has been designed with 5 elements. Professional development for teachers is one of them, as is collaborating with parents to develop and implement personalised adjustments for the learning and support needs of students. Let's hope that students in need everywhere benefit from the shift of emphasis from the categories of their disabilities to their additional educational needs.

The world of gaming



In a society in which the overwhelming majority of teenagers play games of one kind or another, online gaming is just another thing

that kids do. However, socially acceptable pass times, such as gambling and alcohol use, do lead to addictive behaviour for a small minority of people in adult society. Similarly, we can expect that a small minority of our students are not coping with gaming in their lives. There comes a time, paralleling experience in the adult world, when professional intervention is needed to restore healthier lifestyle sufferers. for а Researchers have confirmed certain behaviours that may indicate dysfunctional gaming in teenagers' lives. Declining school performance, signs of depression, cutting back or giving up on previous activities, such as sports or hobbies, not seeing established friends any more or only associating with gamers, isolating behaviour - alone with a computer wherever possible, missing meals - these are seen as indicative of addictive behaviour. Left untreated, the likelihood is that the addiction will become more intense and the symptoms more severe.

There are more professionals working in the area of gaming addiction now. If you have a

problem or you know someone who has, advise them to see the School Counsellor or to contact their nearest youth mental health centre. It is appropriate for all students to be informed about the possible risks associated with many activities in their lives, gaming included. Late last year I was fortunate enough to join the State Drama Company for 2012, rehearsing to perform 'The Grandfathers', by Rory Mullarkey at the PACT Theatre in Erskineville in what is now a week away. Over the past few months, I have been able to develop my drama skills by rehearsing in a fully staged production of a brand new play, with our own production designers, lighting technicians and stage managers. 'The Grandfathers' is a war play, following the lives of 9 soldiers as they go through training and gradually become a part of the machine of their platoon. To say the least, it has been rewarding to work with such a group of likeminded people, and as a result, I have received much knowledge that I can adapt to my classwork in Drama. The opportunity that appeals the most though, is our tour to England scheduled for mid-June, where we will take part in theatre workshops in Stratford-upon-Avon with leading theatre companies, and hopefully perform the play at different schools and community theatres. We are taking video of our performance next week to send to the National Theatre to audition to perform 'The Grandfathers' at the National Theatre Connections Festival in London – and for our live performances they are sending over the manager of their Connections program to report on our show. I also now have opportunities to MC events at locations such as the Sydney Town Hall, the Opera House, and the Seymour Centre, and while in last year's Drama Company I was even asked to MC an art opening at the Art Gallery of NSW. I'm very grateful to have been given these opportunities, and would like to thank Ms Rohr and Dr Jaggar for their continuing support of my endeavours.
