Congratulations to Lokesh Sharma, Jon

Freiberg, Riley Irwin and Peter Stephens for their hard fought win in the Hume Barbour PDC debating competition final. They convinced the adjudicators that we should introduce a \$7 Medicare Co-payment for visits to the doctor! They won the coveted trophy for the 26th time since it was first contested in 1930 and made it three in a row for High - a feat last achieved in the great run of High successes 1950-1954. Well done to Alan Loi who achieved the top score in Year 12 for NSW and ACT in the ICAS Science test. Max Koslowski and Thomas Shortridge ranked second at the annual Model United Nations Conference Final. They qualify to represent NSW at the National Conference in December. Great job, boys!

Fairland Pavilion Refurbishment Opening

In order to celebrate our traditional end of season clash with arch rivals SGS on September 6, the refurbished Fairland Pavilion with its new electronic scoreboard, will be officially opened by The Hon Malcolm Turnbull MP, Member for Wentworth, Minister for Communications and Broadband. At this occasion we will reaffirm our commitment to investing our time and money into Centennial Parklands and its assets – the McKay Playing Fields and the Fairland Pavilion.

Sydney High boys have played on McKay for 82 years. We really value our relationship with the Parklands. I trust that a large crowd of students, parents, Old Boys and well-wishers will join us on Saturday the 6th for the official opening of the building, refurbished by the Sydney High School Foundation at a cost of > \$100k. The ceremony is due to commence at 1430, followed by afternoon tea and the 1st XV rugby match at 1515.

For us to demonstrate the strength of our relationship with the Park we need your support. It is not about whether you play rugby, cricket or football but about your connection with High, its programs and long association with Centennial Parklands. I look forward to seeing the High Community out in force to make this landmark day a success.

New Home for Table Tennis

Relieving MIC of table tennis, Mr Cipolla, has



negotiated a long term arrangement for High to conduct its table tennis program in a local church

hall in Darlinghurst. The venue can accommodate five tables and is just seven minutes' walk from the school. Our tables will be stored on site. This arrangement will be more convenient than the one we have had for some time with PCYC at Daceyville. Our small bus will be freed up to assist other students to get to their sports. The new arrangement will thereby save on transport costs for the boys and the school. I thank Mr Cipolla for his initiative.

Prefect Elections



Staff and students are voting online this week to select 36 Prefect Interns to serve the school as trainee leaders for the

next two terms. The boys on the ballot have met the high standards for eligibility for nomination on the ballot. The school engagement qualification is to achieve the appropriate Award level (for example a boy who enrolled in Year 7 should achieve at least a Platinum Award) and at least 100 points in Year 11 in the Award Scheme. The academic requirement is to be on track to 90 ATAR on twelve units. Behaviour, school uniform and punctuality standards are also applied. Every student on the ballot has authentic claims to represent the student body. I wish all the candidates well.

FROM THE JUNIOR LIBRARY - stepping into a virtual future (new dimension for school libraries) Our 2 Librarians are very excited - the DEC has just accepted the tender from Softlink to put a new library system - Oliver - into all State Schools. We are now going to be able to purchase E Books to loan out to our students. Students will key straight from a Google search to an Oliver search. There are also features of this system which will be very useful to library staff such as downloading cataloguing from systems other than SCIS. PDFs and possible W drive titles can be indexed. The add-ons such as LibraryThing are being used now so the integration of these with Oliver is great for our Librarians. If you are interested you can Google Oliver and have a quick look. The roll out will take 2 years we are hoping we get in early.

LIBRARY STATISTICS TELL THE STORY - Are school libraries just about books? SBHS Libraries have published statistics for the last 12 years usually in the School Record or the Annual Report. The discerning analyst will soon realise that our students use our Libraries very well. In the last month 3278 boys voluntarily used the Junior Library in break times. 1092 of them used laptops. Over that period of time the boys

borrowed 596 books. While the loans were good, the really good stats are the boys using the Library to underpin their learning by studying co-operatively, inspired by boys happily engaging with learning who are around them. Our annual stats are even more impressive and tell the real story of boys using libraries in schools.

MIC of Football Report

Newington is regarded as the leading soccer school in the GPS competition. So we knew we had a tough task ahead of us. When running a sporting program the most important thing you want to gain out of the season is making sure the boys have improved and developed their skills. Although we may have lost the majority of the matches, if we look back at our results against Newington during the trial period we had a deficit average of around 7 goals to last weekend whereby we averaged a deficit of around 3 goals. This is a remarkable improvement that has been the result of the boys training hard and enjoying their time.

Although going down 0-3 the 1st XI came away with a lot of encouragement. In the first minute of the match we had a chance to score, missing a golden opportunity to take an early lead. This sent a message to our top of the table opponents that we were here to seriously challenge them. The boys continued to fight hard, but a couple of lapses in defence gave them a 2-0 lead at half time. Our boys have continued the attitude to never give up and came into the second half still believing we could do this. We applied a lot of pressure causing a stir within the Newington camp. They were getting very frustrated resulting in them getting a few yellow cards. We knew we were on top, but what is now becoming more evident is the loss of our striker, Jesse Cooper, who regularly found the back of the net. We just couldn't convert our chances and then towards the end of the match we conceded another goal securing the win for Newington. The 2nd XI also had their chances, but when you concede an early goal you are always chasing your tail. With the final minute of the game looming all players went on the attack allowing Newington to counter attack and win the game 2-0. Eddy Wang scored a spectacular goal for the 3rd XI from 20 yards out, while Jun Park showed true commitment and enthusiasm running on for the 4th XI, 3rd XI and also getting a good stint for the 2nd XI. This is credit to his hard work and determination on and off the field.

Many of our top age group teams were victims of tough defeats, but it is good to see we have depth with the majority of matches being very close. It is important we continue to develop all teams to keep challenging our top tier players. Our team of the week goes to the 10th XI with their strong win with Michael Hughes scoring a hat-trick.

On Saturday we play our fourth round match away against Riverview who are also equal top of the ladder with Newington. A win this weekend will place us right

back into contention for the premiership. So our boys are primed and ready to go.
