Invest in the Planet - High Solar Project

If you want your philanthropic dollar to work harder at tax time, why not invest in High Solar? We have had two generous donors who have contributed nearly half of the \$28k required to install a 24KW solar generation system comprising 93 solar panels of 260 watts generation each. Also a 24KW solar inverter will be installed. Over the next seven years, the combined system will generate c.220 megawatts of electricity and save nearly 200 tonnes of CO2 that would have been generated by a fossil fuel alternative supplier. The financial benefit to High at current prices of 11c/kwh would be a saving of \$24,200 over the seven years. A third longer term benefit is the pedagogical one. The plight of the planet will be seen as important enough for the High community to demonstrate to its students that clean energy has to be a high priority investment in the future. We need your help to make this project a reality before the end of the year. Make a donation to the Sydney High School Building Fund and send an accompanying message indicating you would like the money to be spent on the High Solar Project.

The ASF Project – Team Travel Fund

If contributing to sports is more where you would like to direct your annual giving, then the High Project at the Australian Sports Foundation has 16 areas to personalise your donation. The Team Travel Fund is a recent addition. This project is dedicated to helping fund team travel to CHS, AAGPS events and exchanges with other schools. Parents paying for various interschool visits and knockout competitions will have an avenue to make a tax

deductible contribution to team travel. We will ask for an additional amount to be added to the actual cost of the team travel (\$10 or \$20) in order to preserve some funds in the Team Travel Account to pay for future deposits or airfares. I have kick started the fund with \$1500 as a personal donation. Our first focus will be the basketball nationals, then the volleyball nationals, the Melbourne High Exchange and TAS. I encourage Old Boys who would like to help out our representative teams or who remember the fun they had doing interschool visits, and would like to give something back to the School, to make a tax deductible contribution.

Extended Library Hours Trial

In response to representations by our SRC School Council Members, we are going to operate a trial period of extended hours for the library on Tuesday afternoons. For many years we have had early morning access to both the Junior and Senior Libraries. The Student Resources and Research Fund provides the money to pay the overtime for the staff needed to extend the library hours. In the past students did not access the after-hours service in the afternoons and it was discontinued. Recent research, organised by SRC Tony Li (11R) has revealed a stronger desire amongst Year 11 and 12 students to have access to after -hours library services. Given that sports training is on Monday & Thursday afternoons and Years 10-12 have sport on Wednesdays, Tuesday afternoon is the only viable time slot. When we have a period of time free of examinations, we will run a trial library afternoon session for four weeks to gauge student demand.

Collection of Reports

All boys should have collected their reports.



Regrettably, there are still many boys who have not fulfilled their commitments and completed their Clearance Forms and

booked an appointment time to see me to discuss their progress at school. This is an important step in our feedback loop and I insist on speaking to boys personally. Boys can come and get their reports before or after school and at lunch or recess on most days.

There are also sheets provided for 'Stragglers Reports' for an hour or so on selected days. Boys just need to make an effort to comply with policy and come and see me. Once I have had a short feedback session with each boy, his report is loaded online against his personal file on Find a Student.

The next morning the Boggabilla group said goodbye to their billeting families, and after a teary goodbye, they left Sydney to travel the 740km back to Boggabilla. We hope that everyone had a great time while they were here, and have learnt a lot about not only their culture but more about our own too. We wish to have just as positive a trip to Boggabilla in August, and hope that more people can get involved in this great program.

I would like to thank Dr Jaggar for allowing this exchange, Mr Cotton, Ms Powell and Mr Barris for organising it and all the students for hosting the Boggabilla entourage during their trip. Mobile Dental Services

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule is an Australian Government, Department of Health program for eligible children aged 2-17 that provides benefits to the child for basic dental services that include: dental examination, X-rays and preventative oral care, such as oral hygiene assistance, cleaning teeth and fluoride application

Under the Child Dental Benefits Scheme, these basic dental services may be provided in a public or private setting and for that reason AMDT (Australian Medical and Dental Technology) proposes to provide these dental services to students at our school within the School's premises and on school grounds to ensure the safety, comfort and well-being of the children taking advantage of the program.

Payment of benefits under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule is administered through the Department of Human Services - and at no cost whatsoever to the school or parents and with no GAP.

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS) commenced on 1 January 2014 and provides access to benefits for basic dental services to around 3 million children aged 2-17 years. The total benefit entitlement is capped at \$1,000 per child over a two calendar year period. The CDBS has a means test, which requires receipt of Family Tax Benefit Part A (FTB-A) or a relevant Australian Government payment.

Please contact Miss Chan if you are eligible and are interested in this program by the end of this term.



Booking Interviews with your Son's Teachers

This year we will again use a web based electronic scheduling system for arranging interviews. This produces better results for all participants, especially more compact time schedules for both parents and teachers. The system works as follows –

- On Tuesday 14 June all parents of boys in Years 9 and 12 were sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book
- On Thursday 16 June all parents of boys in Year 7 and 11 were sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book
- On Tuesday 21 June all parents of boys in Years 8 and 10 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book

- indicate your son's name and roll class or date of birth so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview (if you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown.) At the same time, you can indicate your availability between 3:00pm and 7:00pm.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from two days before the interviews.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all Years will be dismissed from class at 2:35pm each day. School Special buses will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these buses.
- Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration.
 If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date, or contact by telephone arranged.

RIFLE SH®®TING



On the Queen's Birthday weekend 10 June 2016, 12 shooters consisting of John Huang (12R), Wentao Ruan (11F), Daniel Tian (11E), Nathan Wong (11F), Dallas Yan (11E), Henry Deng (10E), Jason Hidajat (10S), Ricky Li (10F), Kai Mai (10R), Dinan Pingamage (9T), Alex Tan (9F), and Frank Zhou (9M) made their way to the Wingham Rifle Range to compete in the 65th Wingham Open Prize Meet. After the 6-hour bus trip, arriving well after sunset, the crew pitched their tents in darkness, guided only by torchlight. Having failed to locate a mallet, tents were pegged into the ground with rocks, until Henry found a single hammer. After setting up the tents, we toured the range to show the new shooters the facilities, and we were left to our evening activities.

With a busy two days of shooting with six separate matches ahead of them, the morning was off to a relatively slow start, with late arrivals at breakfast, but everyone made it to the 7am deadline for the competition paperwork. First shot was at 8:30am, so with an hour or so before the competition, the team went about preparing their rifles and gear for the shoot. The preparation became slightly chaotic as the shooting order was announced and took some by surprise. This wasn't helped by the lack of scopes that became prevalent as the shoot progressed. However, much to the newer shooters' merit, their performance with manual targets at their second prize meet was very much improved. In the 1st match at 600 yards, Jason Hidajat took first place in C grade with an impressive 48.3, narrowly edging out Kai Mai, who came third with a 47.3. In the 2nd range at 500

yards, John Huang shot an incredible 49.6, unfortunately dropping the point on his first shot. This was closely followed by Nathan Wong with a 48.4 and even closer behind was Wentao Ruan (48.2), with only 2 centres less. Impressive shooting came from one of our newer shooters, Ricky Li, who shot a 47.2, with this being only his second prize meet. In the 3rd shoot of the day, at 400 metres, Nathan Wong came 2nd in B grade with the remarkable score of 49.5, and Jason Hidajat took 2nd in C grade with a 48.3. Other noteworthy scores came from Wentao Ruan (47.3), John Huang (47.2), and Kai Mai and Dallas Yan, both with a 47.1, but with Kai coming out on top after countback. For the first day aggregate, Jason Hidajat came 2nd in C grade with 142.10/150. The top 3 scorers from Sydney High were all extremely close, separated only by centres, and these came from John Huang (143.11), Nathan Wong (143.09) and Wentao Ruan (143.06).

Following the shoots of the day came the arduous task of cleaning up, followed by dinner and a trivia night. Despite being almost a completely homogeneous group, the group failed to answer many questions regarding China, and almost every other category. Our one area of strength was the music and films section. The second part of the night involved a dart throwing contest and it was decided that Wentao would be our representative. The third part was an eating contest, in which Daniel and Wentao were paired. Dressed in a raincoat, and crouching behind Daniel, and unable to see, Wentao proceeded to feed his partner the coco pops. The result was hilarious.

The second day of shooting was much better organised, even with the first shot being brought forward to 8am. In the 1st match of 500 yards, Jason Hidajat took first place in C

grade, with a 49.6, the highest score amongst the school. The scores picked up considerably in this range, with lots of good scores posted. Nathan Wong was one centre behind Jason with a 49.5. Wentao Ruan and Ricky Li both posted a 49.2, with Ricky Li on top if counted back, John Huang a 48.5, Kai Mai a 48.3, beating Henry Deng (48.3) on countback, and Dallas Yan a 47.4. The 2nd range at 600 yards posed a problem for all but our best shooters, with John Huang managing a 49.6, and Wentao Ruan a close 48.4. The 3rd range, a 15 shot match at 600 yards presented much more favourable conditions. John Huang dropped only one point, scoring a 74.7. Nathan Wong posted a 72.4, and Dallas Yan a commendable 71.3. The highest aggregate score for Day 2 came from John Huang, with a 171.18/175. In the grand aggregate, Jason Hidajat came 1st in C grade, and Kai 3rd. Dallas Yan and Wentao Ruan both came 4th in their respective grades. John Huang took the prize for highest school student score and Jason Hidajat took the prize for most centres shot.

After the shooting, Mr Mal MacKenzie spoke to us as a group about the finer details on using our sights. Thank you to Mr MacKenzie and all the other shooters who assisted us on the weekend. The squad then became much more relaxed and the night was left to us to enjoy. The mix of campfire, card games and meeting with older experienced shooters, made for one of the most enjoyable nights of shooting camp.

Overall, the Wingham Prize Meet was a huge improvement from the last prize meet and one of the most enjoyable. As rifle shooting is a team sport, camps like this are extremely important not just for practice, but for team bonding. It was also great to see the improvement from last year from our more experienced shooters. All but one shooter who competed at Wingham last year saw improvements in their aggregate score, with the most impressive improvement coming from Dallas Yan, who shot a 276.7 last year, and 299.14 this year. An improvement of 23 points, and doubling his centre count. Well done Dallas.
