



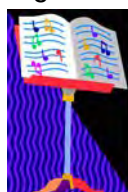
From the Principal Welcome to Term 1



We commence the new school year with a fresh perspective on making a difference in learning using visible thinking routines and dispositional teaching strategies to engage our students. We hope to produce a renewed enthusiasm for maximising student potential. This is the last year of our Strategic Plan (2015-17).

Killip Wing and the northern side of the main building are being painted. We expect this major facelift to our site to be completed next week. Along with the painting, the renewal of downpipes with externally mounted ones, repairs and drainage reclamation, Killip Wing is looking much better indeed. Our thanks go to the DoE who have funded this much-needed work. The foyer and stairwell of the main building have also been freshly painted and the honour boards rearranged. The area is lighter and brighter than previously. The P & C project to renew the sound and projection system in the Great Hall was completed in the holidays at a cost of \$87k. The sound and projection quality is much improved as a result. Thank you to the P & C for funding the renewal. A parent of an Old Boy has funded a new honour board to be displayed in the Great Hall. This board commemorates the CHS Blues recipients since 1961 when records began. I want to thank Mrs Elizabeth Phipps for her generosity in making this donation to recognise elite sportsmen. The cloisters have been smartened up with the camellias pruned, the statues cleaned and the lawn treated. It looks really green and healthy in that area.

Early Bird Discounts

In order to help all areas of the school we offer a **substantial discount** to parents who pay all their invoices in full before Tuesday, 28



February. It is not only a great demonstration by them of their commitment to the ethos of the school but also it's an encouragement for others to follow their lead and it helps to create a critical mass of financial support for our programs. The annual cash contribution by the DoE finances **less than one quarter** of our programs at High. The rest comes from the support of parents and the efforts made by School family volunteers, helping in fund raising. Having substantial funds early in the year allows us to make sure that capital works are completed in the holidays, orders are made promptly and that the boys get the maximum benefit out of equipment and services deployed for them this year. Quality services, extra staff and high standards come at a price. A very large number of parents see the package as value for money and contribute in full. The early bird discount is available for students who were invoiced in December 2016 or later and does not apply to students who were invoiced in October 2016 and subsequently came to Orientation Day in November and had the

opportunity to pay everything on the day and obtain the discount. Year 7, 9 or 11 boys who were **not** made offers before Orientation Day are eligible for the discount. Students in Years 8-12 have the chance to make a saving by paying in full by Tuesday 28 February.

Last year, **671 families (55.64 %)**, saw the benefit of supporting the school fully, in all of its activities early in the year and thereby earned the discount. I thank them heartily for their support and reset our target to attract 56.5% of parents this year. We offer all the benefits of activities available at independent schools...but at 10% of the cost. Let's carry on High's self-help culture to make sure we achieve our goals for your sons in 2017 and beyond!

Weights Room for 2017



High's weights room offers exceptional value for money. The room has appropriate equipment for preparing the bodies of teenage boys and crucially, it is constantly supervised. When handling weights, technique is vitally important and boys need to learn the correct way to lift. Kurt Rich, our *Head Strength and Conditioning Coach*, is a well-credentialed and experienced trainer. His presence ensures that the boys are training safely and sensibly. So as well as getting gym facilities, clients have a supervisor and adviser to help them during their **unlimited visits**. The Weights Room operates much more effectively if all boys get their training in how to use the various pieces of equipment and in proper lifting technique, as soon as possible. Kurt Rich provides this service at the beginning of each year and can tailor individual programs for members after the introductory sessions. Having a fixed clientele makes his job more productive and leads to a better training experience for members and better strength outcomes for participants. Hence, we decided to close off memberships by the end of February each year. Boys who have not paid by that time can no longer attend the weights room.

Costs for this service are held down to a minimum and reduced by boys taking out a full year's membership. For 2017, a **full year** Weights Room membership costs **just \$240**. Boys wishing to have full year membership must register and **pay by Tuesday 28 February 2017**. There will be no extensions of time nor another window of opportunity later in the year if you forget to pay on time.

Year 7 Transition

On Friday 27 January, we were lucky enough to have our Staff Development Day led by Karin Morrison who is an Australian member of Harvard's Project Zero, which investigates the nature of intelligence, understanding, thinking, creativity, cross-disciplinary and cross-cultural thinking, and ethics. The class of 2022 will benefit from a whole school approach to making thinking visible which we were developing in 2016

So, to start, we asked Year 7 parents and Year 7 students, at the welcome meeting, to take part in a thinking routine called Compass Points. Each person was given four 'Post-it' notes and asked to consider their first year at SBHS. On one, they are to write something that they are excited about; another, their worries; a third, something they need to know and on the fourth their



suggestions.

The parents' comments are below and next week I will report on the students' comments:

Excited 51

Sixteen parents were excited about the range of activities we offer especially sports. eleven were excited about the new challenges and opportunities offered by the school; ten were excited about their sons making new friendships; seven were particularly excited about SBHS "One of the best schools in Sydney"; six were particularly excited about the personal effect on their son "seeing all the ways my son will surprise me" one was excited about the Governors Centre.

Worried 55

Ten parents were generally worried about transition "ability to cope in a new environment." Ten people were worried that their sons would not make new friends; twelve people were worried about the workload and their sons ability to cope with the travel/study or study and sports; ten were worried about travel; six were worried about sports; two were particularly worried about their son's excellence in study; one person is worried about missing important information; one is worried about their child coping with new responsibility, another about pressure on children and screen time, and two about bullying with one particularly worried about racism.

Need to Know 35

Nine parents wanted to know practical things about school programs including information about laptops, maths competitions, subject selection, and exams; form teacher and group, camp school schedules; eight wanted to know about the school routine including start and finishing times and practical things such as parking and drop off; six wanted more information for sports; four need to know about their sons – will he cope, how to support my son without smothering him, how to make him self-motivated, four wanted to know about school commitments, three about parents – support groups, expectations; three want information about 'everything'; two wanted to know about our methods of communication;

Suggestions 30

Ten people felt that our communication needed improving with daily updates for the first week, a weekly newsletter emailed home and a quick link for new students on the website being suggested; there were four practical suggestions: air-conditioning, smaller school bag, students to wear sports clothes on sports day, lose the long socks and the tie, three people made suggestions about parents groups and one asked us to understand that parents have long journeys; three people wanted to see less emphasis on sport, there were two comments about transition 'better transition program' and 'create bonding opportunities for students'; one parent wanted more information about sports trials and another about studies.

There were five specific suggestions about the presentation – air the hall because it smells, have an agenda with names of speakers, better sound system, speakers need to be clearer, smile more.

Many respondents said they had no suggestions or none yet and one suggestion was to 'Keep up the good work!'

The carnival will commence at 8:45 am and finish by 2:45 pm (approximately).

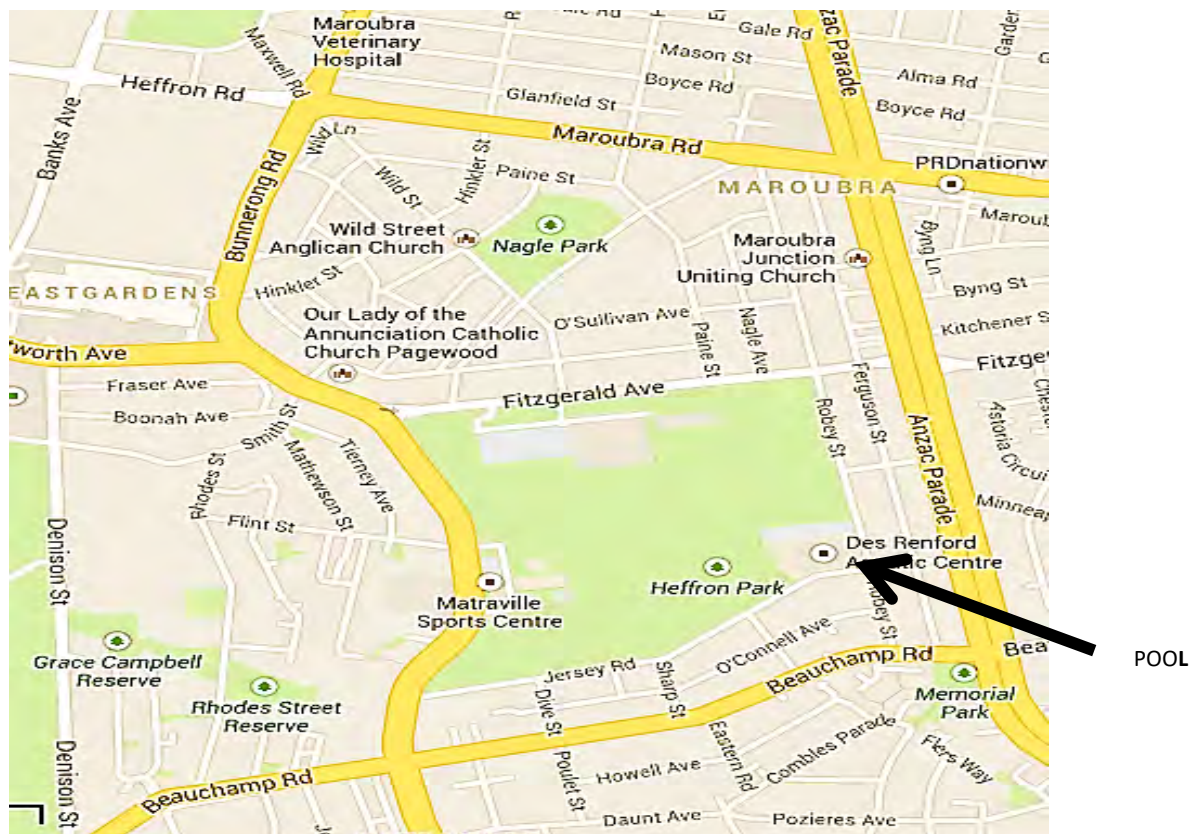
ALL students will make their own way to and from the swimming pool.
