## Welcome to New Parents Evening

Thank you Angela Lam, the Year 8 parents, the Sailing Support Group and High sailors for their organisation of the New Parents Wlcoe Evening held on Tuesday evening last. My address to the parents is reprinted below:

On behalf of the High community, I extend a warm welcome to all new parents to High. The purpose of this evening is for us to get to know each other and for you to gain an understanding of the school and its culture. We would like you to feel that your family has now become part of our School Family. Just as we want your son to engage with the academic and co-curricular life of the school, we also hope that you will too. We want to persuade you to get involved in the life of the school. It is a mutually rewarding experience.

Ours is a great school with a well-deserved reputation for academic excellence, co-curricular achievement, leadership development and involvement in community service and social justice programs. It has always been an individual, unique, state school. High has faced many challenges in its

history – it had to struggle a long time to secure membership of the AAGPs. It had to fight for its existence when a strong move to abolish selective schools came in 1977-1980. It recovered after losing its 50 reserved places for Old Boys and two extra teachers to help with sport.

High has overcome our 'tasks severe' and remains true to itself as an institution. We have been nurturing scholar-sportsmen since 1883. We prepare boys for university and nurture them as sportsmen, individuals and citizens. We are proudly a state school operating in a market dominated by private schools.

High has been resilient for so long because of the strength of its partnerships. The school has been a self-help institution for extra-curricular activities since 1886. The boys originally organised activities for themselves as teachers were forbidden to help in its early years. Old Boys have influenced the development of the school significantly. High ranks 3<sup>rd</sup> amongst Australian schools for *Who's Who* entries for achieving alumni. Our environment breeds initiative and self-efficacy.

Since June 11, 1925, the school has also relied heavily on its Parents and Citizens Association to provide assets and equipment not supplied by the Education Department. Since 1951, *The Sydney High School Council* has supported the school in asset acquisition and maintenance. The *Sydney High School Foundation Inc* was incorporated in 1986. Its committee comprises representatives of the P & C and Old Boys as well as the Principal.

The Foundation took over the assets of the Trust that used to be vested in the Principal and two Old Boys as well as the Sydney High School Council. The Foundation owns the Outterside Centre, maintains the Fairland Pavilion, holds money in trust for the school and manages access to playing fields in Centennial Parklands. The Foundation also runs the High Store and the Tennis Courts under Deeds of Licence and shares management of the COLA and the Great Hall. Most of the important initiatives taken by this school over the 134 years of its existence have come about through the establishment of partnerships of parents and Old Boys. Our Joint Project to establish the Governors Centre is the latest example. You have the opportunity to make this vision a reality within the next three years.

We are driven by our need to compete with Independent Schools in the GPS since 1906 – a unique feature of High's history as a state school. In addition, since 1913, High has competed in various CHSSA competitions. We need access to

playing fields, facilities and expert coaching in depth, in order to compete in the GPS. We are serious about sport and all the other co-curricular activities. Each year we need parent volunteers to give of their time.

To illustrate our ethos, I will tell you a little about Louis Wang. He was Dux of High in 2000, my first year here as Principal. He was a School Prefect who participated in cross country running, rifle shooting, athletics, choir and school service (for which he won an award). After earning 100 UAI Louis studied medicine. He is now a cardiologist on scholarship with the Victor Chang Institute. He is married and his daughter is starting school this year. Louis wrote a piece for the SMH about his hopes for his daughter's schooling. He was at pains to stress that non-intellective outcomes were the ones he wanted for his daughter: being open to new experiences, exploring one's interests, learning and honing new skills, being able to communicate ideas and making informed choices. I strongly agree with Louis. The ATAR is not our sole definition of educational success. Character development and social confidence are nurtured through activities outside the classroom.

I warmly welcome you tonight and hope that you and your sons get involved in many of our activities and derive the same satisfaction and enjoyment from school life, which the staff and generations of active students and their parents have enjoyed.

### Early Bird Discount ends Tuesday 28 February



In order to help all areas of the school we offer a substantial discount to parents who pay their complete invoices before 28 February. Having substantial

funds early in the year allows us to make sure that orders are made promptly and that the boys get the maximum benefit out of equipment and services deployed for them. Capital for the Building Fund can be invested to earn interest for longer. Our aim is to encourage at least 55% of parents to make this financial commitment to the school early in the year. Let's carry on High's self-help culture to make the Governors Centre a reality by 2018!

### Weights Room

Another reminder to all boys who might have weights training as a requirement in their regime for a GPS sport. **No term memberships** will be offered in 2017 for the Weights Room. Boys who restart after absences of a term in the Weights Room have to be retrained by Kurt when he should be concentrating on adding value to the experience of existing members. Students requiring memberships even if they don't start serious training until their winter sport, **should pay \$240 by 28 February 2017**. No further membership opportunities will be offered after that date.

## Outdoor Education

*"Outdoor Education serves many purposes in a school, particularly when delivered in a planned and sequential manner over a number of year levels. Outdoor Education can support and reinforce pastoral curriculum in the most practical of settings. Students working together in small, professionally facilitated groups deal directly with concepts such as leadership (and equally importantly, followership), inclusiveness, the value of working towards a common goal and the recognition of the unique attributes each individual can bring to the team."*

The Outdoor Education Program is an integral part of the SBHS's co-curricular program incorporating camps in Years 7, 8, 9 and in 2017, Year 10. Introducing a "journey based program" in Year 10 culminates the sequential nature of our Outdoor Ed. experience. Year 10 Camp is voluntary. Students who choose to attend, in addition to gaining valuable skills, will receive a Certificate of Completion detailing the 4 years in the Outdoor Education Program and Award Scheme points.

Normal classes will not be scheduled during the week of the camp. Those students who choose to remain at school will be offered a variety of alternative activities. These may include: work experience, voluntary community service, completion of elective projects, MOOCs or a "Project Based Learning task" under the guidance of their classroom teachers.

The program itself would run for 5 days and 4 nights. There would be 3 grades of difficulty, each following a different navigation line. The boys, under the guidance of the OEG and SBHS staff members, would be responsible for navigating their way from the drop off point to where they will be picked up 5 days later. They will be carrying their own equipment (provided by OEG) and be responsible for preparing all their own meals. During the journey, the boys would be undertaking team initiatives, raft building and catapult challenges and a short canoeing journey. There will also be night activities including a first aid scenario.

For those students completing the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, this program meets the requirements for the Silver Practice Expedition.

### Compass Points – Students

Last week I reported on the Compass Points for parents. This week, I have the results of the students' comments.

#### Excited

Most students were excited about sport (33) almost all said sport generally, but cricket and the swimming carnival got a specific mention, 22 were excited about the prospect of making new friends; 10 were excited about academics with maths and DT being specifically mentioned competition, and "learn and develop my creativity": 6 were excited about school camp and excursions; 5 spoke about the whole new experience being an exciting one, 2 students were excited about chess and 1 was excited about using laptops.

#### Worries

The majority of students were worried about academics of which 17 specifically mentioned worrying about exams and grades. 9 were worried about the quantity of work – especially homework and three mentioned new subjects and in particular: woodwork and 'learning more about writing' were mentioned; 14 students were worried about getting lost and most of these were at school, but some had fears about public transport; 14 students were worried about not making friends; 5 were worried about understanding the new routine of High School; 4 were worried about the impression they would make 'worried about looking a fool', "forgetting something and getting in trouble or being shouted at". 2 were specifically worried about the new organisation of high school and remembering things/new routines; 1 student was worried about competition in sport.

#### Need to Know

Most of the need to know were about logistics. Locations around the school – particularly classrooms (17) and timetables and scheduling including start and finish times (15) were frequently mentioned. Six students stated that they need to know teachers; four wanted more information about sports; four about school rules; 3 about

school facilities 'lockers' and "everything this school has to offer."

There were single responses regarding 'Is there religious studies?' "Homework", "Other students", "Programming" and "How not to fail life."

### Suggestions

Twelve suggestions about the buildings – renovating and particular emphasis on air conditioning; 5 practical suggestions all of which will be addressed during the first week in school: a timetable that we can access, tell us how to get around, inform us about consequences, introduce the school more and introduce our teachers

There were other practical requests such as: cheaper canteen food and smaller bags and less equipment, being able to try out for two sports, more time for the scavenger hunt!

One student suggested "less pressure".

As the wind was relatively light, we only had one race, and starts were extremely important. Dallas was able to achieve a clean start, using his light crew to build

an advantage in boat speed. Kai was unfortunately squeezed between two boats, slowing him down significantly. Although not arriving at the top mark first, the leader rounded the mark the wrong way and thus had to return, allowing Dallas to overtake them. With second and third on his heels, Dallas built a slight gap on the way to the wing mark to force them to go around him at the next mark. From there, the gap only increased as Dallas took advantage of the waves to push him, and he won by almost half a leg. 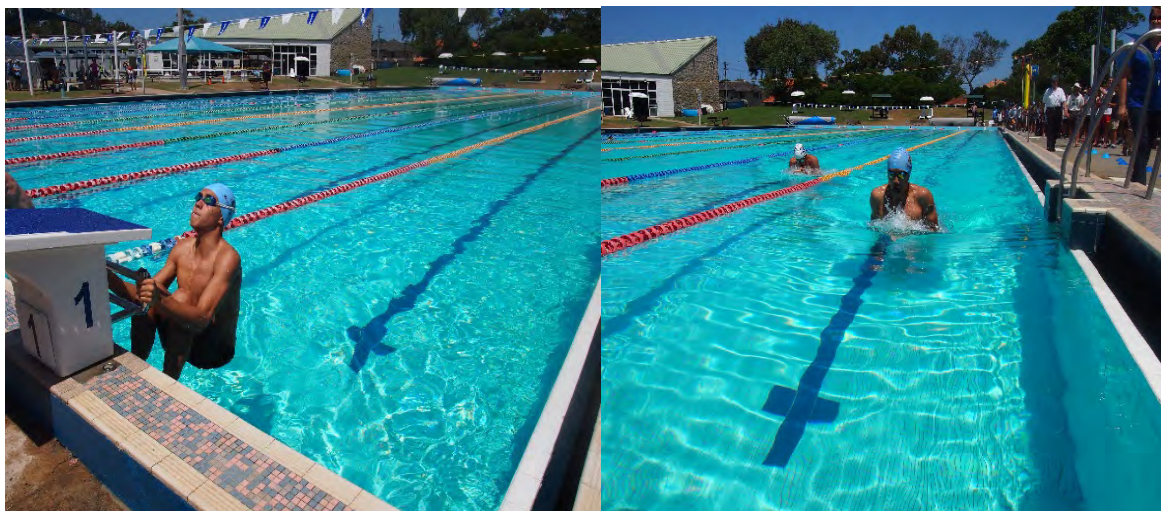

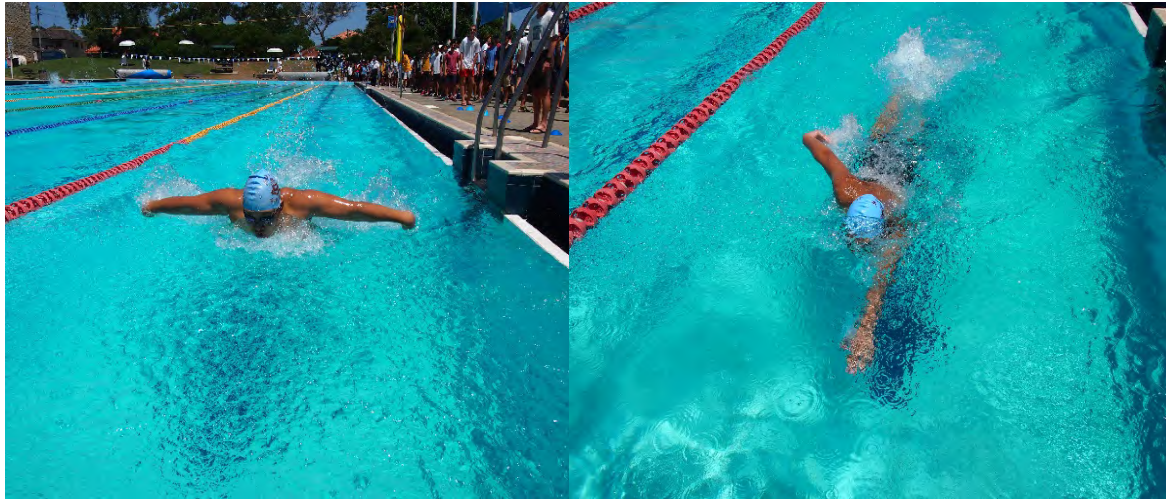
