Transitioning to LMBR

We 'go live' on Monday. That means that the OASIS system will be closed down and its files

archived. All our students' records from ERN will be uploaded into the new system. All our invoices will have to be re-entered. We have to work with only 18 'cost centres' instead of our 50 or so 'dissections'. We have to use state wide 'internal orders' and establish bespoke ones for some of our activities. There are many changed practices to be internalised and our SASS colleagues will be working hard to prepare our complex accounting activities to fit the new arrangements. All of the above means that we are not going to be able to reopen for normal 'business' until at least July 31st. To those groups planning and organising celebratory functions for the end of the winter season, it means extra work will be needed to track transactions. We will be able to receipt payments manually and return the funds in cash but we will not be able to supply lists of those who have paid. Committees or Managers in charge, will have to keep track of paid up participants independently of the office.

Returning to debating, it has been said that the core of competitive high school debating is to examine every side of important and controversial issues in an atmosphere of reasoned argument and respectful discourse. The culture of the activity is strong in this regard. The focus is on the argument, not the arguer. Perhaps the most important skill debaters learn is the ability to think rigorously and critically. They cannot hold fast to bias or prejudice when applying themselves to one side of the topic or another. Academic benefits can be accrued by debaters. Debating students excel in written and oral communication, and greatly improve their reading comprehension. Moreover, they gradually become more comfortable with encountering new concepts and unfamiliar language. Debating students show more maturity in the face of adversity, considering they have to learn to be gracious in victory or defeat, and tend to develop stronger relationships with peers and mentors than other students. Many top corporate executives and high-ranking officials in all branches of government are former high school debaters. It is gratifying to know that our program attracts so many boys to participate in it, given the long term benefits that they will derive from their experiences in high school debating.

I congratulate all boys selected in debating teams and in first and second grade volleyball. Well done to the rifle shooters. I wish all competing teams the best of luck on Friday night and Saturday and for the GPS season ahead.

Cars Travelling On School Grounds

Parents and visitors to the school are reminded that they



must travel at a safe speed (10KMphr) whilst in the school grounds. When entering from Cleveland Street by Gate 2 they should park rear to the buildings or tennis courts. Parents and visitors should not use the Anzac Parade

entrances. Three-point turns in the bus bay area have posed serious risks to students walking beside the Great Hall and the buses or walking along the path next to the tennis courts and coming down the stairs. The bus bay area is not a drop-off point for students. Parents should drive in gate 1, drop off their sons and drive out gate 2, as per school policy. Please be vigilant in the interests of the safety of our boys!

Parking on School Grounds

All parents and visitors to the school are asked to park



their vehicles in approved spaces only and to respect 'no parking' signage on the roadway and the 'restricted parking' signs on the walls of the gymnasium. Vehicles blocking emergency exits or access ways may impede

emergency exits from buildings or the site. Also, the bus bay needs to be kept clear for the movement of our two school buses. Thank you for your cooperation

Gymnasium Safety

Having been alerted to the issue of cars parking outside



the gym doors and obstructing exit flows from the building, our GA Jim Crampton has painted 'No Parking' on the roadway to deter drivers. In addition, he sourced and fixed to the doors signs clearly stating 'Fire Doors Do Not Obstruct'. There are offences relating to fire exits and parking a car in front of them is one of them. Please respect the

area and refrain from parking there. Likewise, parking spots marked with wheel chairs are reserved for disabled drivers and / or passengers. Only drivers with disabled parking permits are allowed to use them. Otherwise, they need to be kept clear. Thank you for your cooperation.
