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### High Talent

Congratulations to our three first in course in the HSC students! Danny Yu (chemistry), Dibyendu Roy (engineering studies) and Kieren Shivakumaarun (physics). Great work, boys! Rowan Tan (8M) won a gold medal in the U14 Triple Jump (12.46m) at the Australian All Schools Track and field championship in Adelaide. Great job, Rowan! In the National Schools Volleyball Competition, every High team entered won a medal – an unprecedented result for High volleyball. The results pay tribute to the focussed junior development policy in the sport. Our results were: U15 Honours division – top two teams from each state and NZ – bronze medal; Year 11 – Division 1 – teams ranked 1-4 in each state – gold medal; U16 division 1 – silver medal; Year 12 Division 1 – bronze medal; and Year 7 – Division 2 – teams ranked 1-8 in each state - gold medal. of coaches who trained and mentored the teams in this prestigious competition. Our annual pilgrimage to the National Schools basketball Competition resulted in a silver medal for our team in the U15 division. Well done, boys! Kieren Guan (9R) scooped the pool at the Australian Open Short Track Ice Racing Championship. He won gold at all distances in his age group (333m, 500m, 777m & 1,000m) as well as two relays – one in the age division above his own. Congratulations on a fine effort, Kieren! Well done to our first XI cricket team who finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Five Highs competition and have qualified for the final eight schools in state in the Davidson Shield Knockout competition.

Appointments can be made in the new school year before school, recess and at lunch (except Tuesdays). The benefits of my interactions with boys lessen if the discussion is too far removed from the assessment events being discussed.

Next up was a game against The King's School themselves. High was up for most of the game, but slipped towards the end of the game and narrowly losing. After a full day's break, the boys were fresh for the third day, and managed to grab a W against a St Josephs College of Victoria (that is, not the Joeys we know in the GPS). But the last game was a narrow loss to Henley High. Overall the team placed third in their pool, and in the quarter finals they played Barker College, but once again let the game slip through their fingers, missing out on a spot in the top four. The team had some discipline problems at times, was well coached and learnt a lot about how to improve going forwards. Let's see how Term1 progress'.

Thank you to everyone who went on the trip to Melbourne to make the trip possible - it was a terrific experience for all the boys.
