Recently, two student laptops have been damaged accidentally while being used in the playground. Laptop security responsibility of each individual student. #### Recent Media Attention

Recent Sydney Morning Herald articles have questioned the elite nature of selective schools and how some of them raise significant amounts of money, whereas most comprehensive schools do not. A parallel assertion is that selective schools do not increase equity in education because the parents of so many of their students are in the upper quartile of the Index of Socio-Educational Advantage. This index has its critics (see Brent Michael's SMH article from 19.7.18). Sydney Boys was singled out (as it has been many times before) for raising the most money of any government school. After consultation with school community representatives, I sent the following email to the Education editor at SMH.

"I am loathe to reply to inquiries from journalists because they inevitably slant the subsequent published story in ways that do not help the school's mission - to provide opportunity for excellence for gifted boys. It is tiresome that each year some newspaper does a story on how much money is collected by particular state schools. Sydney Boys High is in a unique position as a six-day government school with commitments to engage in weekend sport and after hours' activities as a consequence of its membership of the AAGPS. Sports and co-curricular activities are offered in depth to our students. These activities are expensive and funded by our engaged and supportive parents. The particulars of our fundraising needs and expenses I am not prepared to disclose to the SMH. To support our belief in equal opportunity, charges and levies for those families in necessitous circumstances are written off and absorbed by the school community".

#### COLA Refurbishment

Our COLA has had a complete makeover. The artificial grass has been replaced. Repaired or replaced netting has been suspended from chains to do away with the metal poles we had before. In order to preserve our refurbished asset, I have decided to engage in a community use agreement with Sydney Cricket Academy to operate the COLA for an initial period of 12 months. Darius Visser, the proprietor, is well known to our cricketing community as a cricket coach. Training times will be reserved for cricket and fencing at no cost to the school. We expect that the security and maintenance of the COLA will be enhanced under the management of a commercial operator.

#### **ANZAC Centenary Project**



On Monday 25 June, the Anzac Memorial at Hyde Park hosted a small yet significant event in regards to its Anzac Centenary Project, which

aims to revitalise the memorial as a centre of historical education and national commemoration. As part of the efforts, artist Fiona Hall proposed an art project to be built beneath the memorial, showcasing a plaque for every town, suburb and locality around NSW that enlistees for the First World War gave as their place of address; alongside a sample of soil collected from each area.



Robert Hoang (12T) and Dinan Pingamage (11T) were fortunate enough to attend this event, which consisted of a number of attendees including school students, council

members and military veterans. The event was hosted by David Elliot, Minister for Veterans Affairs, who took a sample of soil from the Anzac Memorial in Hyde Park, the last of 1,701 soil samples comprising the Anzac Centenary Soil Collection Project. We had the pleasure and opportunity to contribute to this soil sample.

The revitalised Anzac Memorial at Hyde Park is due to reopen at the end of this year, and will showcase the new art project designed by Fiona Hall as well as an upgrade to the existing Pool of Reflection.

#### Sydney High School Cadet Unit

From the 7<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> of July, over 170 cadets attended the 2/2018 promotion courses conducted by HQ NSW ACC BDE at Singleton Military Area. From SHSCU, CDTSGT Andy Li, CDTCPL Alan Jessup, CDTCPL William Cui and CDTCPL Kevin Tran attended the Senior Leaders Module One course (SLMOD1) as trainees, with CDTSGT Andy Li as one of the many directing staff. The purpose of the course was to provide skills and knowledge required to fulfil the role as a senior leader within the Australian Army Cadets (AAC).



Lessons were taught by experienced staff members, covering topics such as 'leadership styles', 'designing a training program' and 'duties of a senior leader in the unit and field'. Major assessments included conducting a period of instruction, operating in a command post, delivering platoon orders and supervising a navigation exercise. As a directing staff member, CDTSGT Li assisted in organising periods of instructions, taught lessons and administered practical activities such as camouflage and concealment.

Living in a barracks environment for a week with minimum technology, sound catering and poor accommodation doesn't look like the ideal way to spend the holidays but looking back at the experience and knowledge gained it certainly weighs out. Surrounding yourself with completely new people in an unusual environment is a great way to develop leadership and promotes the value of teamwork. Coursemanship was greatly encouraged, making sure everyone else passes the course, helping

fellow corporals in areas they require assistance and having a positive influence. I am pleased to say that the trainees from SHSCU achieved all competencies of the course without retest and are recommended for promotion to CDTSGT.

#### Ruse Bivouac 2018 Report



From the 30<sup>th</sup> June to 1<sup>st</sup> July, Sydney High School Cadet Unit (SHSCU) attended a joint bivouac with James Ruse Agricultural High School Army Cadet Unit. This camp took place over the course of a weekend. Starting early Saturday morning, 15 cadets from SHSCU boarded the bus at High on our way to Marramarra National Park. On the way, we stopped at James Ruse Agricultural High School to be reunited with old friends and to organise the distribution of rations for the next two days, as well as to form the cadets into two companies.



Upon arrival at the national park, we prepared ourselves for the first challenge of the bivouac: a 3km hike to the night location. When we had successfully completed the hike, we began preparing our hutchies for that night, as well as helping James Ruse recruits to set up their hutchies. After that, the recruit company and the cadet company split off into two different activities. The recruit company began with bullring activities that included the setting up of an RTF200 radio set, the revision of first aid in the field and a camouflage and concealment activity. After all the sections had an opportunity at all the activities, the recruits proceeded to have lunch and begin

their navigational exercise. The navigational exercise was to be a test of the recruits' abilities to lead a section, carry out radio procedures and navigate from one checkpoint to another. Overall there were around 20 checkpoints, so this activity took up most of the afternoon. When we had gotten back to the night location, exhausted from the NAVEX, we moved on to the night activities. One of the night activities was a game of lantern stalk that required the recruits to find their way from one end of a field to the other and back without being spotted by any of the patrolling NCOs. It was a game that required patience and proficiency in tactical movements. The other night activity was drama skits and trivia, organised by CDTWO2 Jason Zhang and CUO Robert Hoang. After the cadets had shown off their creativity and knowledge, everyone headed back to the night location to go to sleep.

On Sunday morning, everyone started off with some physical training that included tai chi and running. After everyone had breakfast and packed up their hutchies, we all prepared for a whole day of a modified game of king of the hill. The recruit company and the cadet company were competing against each other to gain control of checkpoints that were scattered throughout the park. These checkpoints were discs that had codewords written on them. These codewords were to be radioed in to headquarters to gain control of the checkpoint. Every gained checkpoint added to the respective company's points, as well as holding the checkpoint for a prolonged period. There was also an element of ambush involved in the game. All sections were equipped with two water sprayers and these could stop another section for five minutes if shot at the section commander. This was an interesting element, since the ambush could be foiled if anyone was spotted hiding in the bush. This meant that the cadets had to apply the lessons that they had learnt in camouflage and concealment.

After a couple of hours, the game was announced finished and everyone prepared to leave the park. The Sydney High cadets said their last goodbyes to the James Ruse cadets, as we got onto the bus, heading back to school.

# 7-9pm 28 August 2018 Sleep for Better Health, Resilience and Performance

Do you worry that your son is not getting enough quality sleep? Is your son staying up late at night either completing H/W or assessment tasks or gaming? Does your son find it difficult to get to sleep? Does your son find it difficult to get up in the morning or complain about feeling tired?

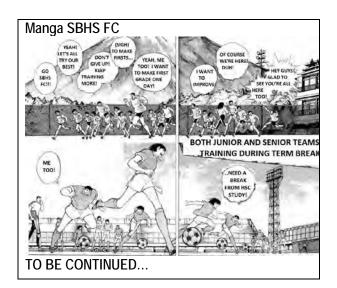

There is nothing wrong with their seeds. Only society never gave them a base to grow on."
