Foundation Day Assembly

My speech to the assembly is reprinted below:

Special guests: Geoff Glover (SHS-1968), former Principal Bob Outterside, Life Governor George Lewkovitz, Emeritus Professor Geoffrey Kellerman (SHS-1942) Professor Ron Trent, President P & C and SBHS School Council; School Captains Ben Wilcox (2012), Hugh Bartley (2017), Vice Captain Vishal Karanamadakala (2016); Senior Prefect Dharmesh Sharma (2017) distinguished Old Boys from the Class of 1968, staff, parents, Prefect Interns and students, welcome to our Foundation Day Assembly for 2018.

It is our pleasure to host 1968 Old Boys to celebrate Founder's Day with us this morning: Geoff Barnard, Ross Feller, Ian Gilbert, Ken Ho, George Minucos, Gary Nairn AO, Boris Patkin, Richard Sleeman, Geoff Symonds, Dave Whyte, John brand and Norman Yee. Thank you so much for coming. We gather again today to celebrate the opening of the School on October 1, 1883. It is an annual rite of passage to remind ourselves, and our student leadership group, about what the school was established to achieve. Our foundation principle was to develop our students to qualify for entrance to university. In addition, our membership of the AAGPS since 1906 is celebrated. Our school nurtures scholar-sportsmen. It provides opportunity for excellence.

We honour the impressive student leadership traditions that have developed over 135 years since our establishment. The investiture ceremony for Prefect 'Interns' restates our belief in our core values, preserves our past traditions of service, revives the stories that bind us to our understanding of those traditions, and reaffirms our vision for the future. Modelling cultural values through leadership is, and has always been, an integral aspect cultural sustainability.

In January, 1968 Harold Holt went for his last swim at Portsea and John Gorton was sworn in as Prime Minister. In April, Billy Graham the evangelist toured Australia. In April, Sydney's water was fluoridated. In July one hundred students were arrested in during anti-Vietnam War protests. In October, mail deliveries were cut from two per day to one. At High, the first XI of 1968 were co-premiers in cricket with Scots. High has won the GPS first grade cricket only three times since then.

Campbell, Glover (1st) and Brand (2nd) were selected in the combined GPS sides. Geoffrey Glover took 12-44 in High's outright win against St Josephs a rare occurrence in our history. Ross Miller and Mick Wheeler were selected in the combined GPS first XV and John Brand in the 2nd XV.

Derek Luxford, in his 1968 School Captain's message, wrote that "Sydney High depends very much on people who have either left the school or never attended it". He called on students to show equal support for the school from within as the Old Boys and parents displayed from without. The reputation and traditions of the school depend for their maintenance and enhancement on the participation of current students. Students, he concluded, "have inherited from the past, and must use the present wisely to provide for a worthwhile future." The leadership group in our school are the custodians who must ensure that current students contribute fully to the accomplishments of the school in 2019.

Fifty years on, I can reiterate confidently the sentiments of Murray Callaghan, Headmaster (1964-73). He wrote in The Record in 1968, 'I know of no school, of any type that offers to its students more opportunities than does Sydney High School! He listed: first-class teaching and resources, guidance in study, personal problems and future career, physical development in the gymnasium, mid-week and weekend sport, interest and social contact through interschool and intraschool activities and service and leadership opportunities through Cadets, Prefects and School Union Committees. He challenged his readers to ask themselves whether they were taking advantage of all that was offered to them. His challenge has been repeated often by Principals and School Captains since 1968.

High has held steadfast in the intervening years to its ethos of providing opportunity. We also want to facilitate those students who want to pursue excellence in one or more areas of school life. Our visitors from the 1968 graduating class will relate to the current ethos of the school. Fifty years ago, there was less organised competition in co-curricular activities such as chess, so many boys with common interests formed themselves into clubs to share them. We provide more structure, supervision and resources than were available 50 years ago, but what is common to the activities of 1968 and 2018 is the necessity of effective student leadership to get things going and hold them together. Committed participation is necessary.

Turning to those who will carry on the fine leadership traditions at High, I expect our Prefect Interns to be great role models and demonstrate high quality leadership. Each one of you must pledge to uphold and enhance the traditions of this fine school. You will have to maintain a high academic standard, in state terms, throughout your internship. You will need to participate in two GPS sports in your final year, starting with summer sport in term 4. You will need to earn 100 Student Award Scheme points and qualify for an Award in this current year and in 2019. You will need to demonstrate to all your peers by your dress, demeanour and self-regulation that you believe in the ethos of the school. Your behaviour, attendance and punctuality will need to be exemplary. We have set a stern test. Some of you may not pass it. You have all shown that you have the makings of a School Prefect. Your Internship will be successful if you can reach the standards required with dedicated effort. I congratulate all Prefect Interns who will be inducted here today. I trust you will uphold and enhance the Foundation principles of the school.



FABULOUS NEW PAPER BASED BOOKS (I READ THIS HOLIDAY)



Colombiano By Rusty Young

I was not sure I was going to enjoy this book about child soldiers. I have read about child soldiers before and I am horrified at some of the atrocities they have committed even though they are abused and often kidnapped children.

However as a society we do need to look at


the circumstances of child soldiers and we do need to treat this issue justly. So I thought I would give this book a chance and I am glad that I did.

Luckily this particular child soldier and purported writer, who was 16 when he joined the Autodefensas in Columbia, has not been responsible for really beastly bloodthirsty behaviour but he has killed people. He did learn in this story to relinquish the opportunity to kill his fathers' murderers. So I found this rather interesting as this was his motive for joining this rightist leaning guerrilla army. The Autodefensas, also paramilitary - fought against the Communist guerrillas in Colombia.

This book outlines the story behind the drug industry in Colombia which the Americans tried hard to disrupt and destroy. Both Autodefensas and Communists used the drug trade to finance their effort to politically control Colombia. The way this corrupted the whole of Colombian society - not just the child soldiers - is what makes this book compelling reading.

While child soldiers do feature in this book the book is really about the South American drug trade. Rusty Young -the author – lived and worked in counter terrorism in Colombia. So the book is not unbiased but we can

speculate on the point of view of the young Autodefensas recruit a boy the age of many of our children still at school. This book is rather naïve in tone. This makes it suitable reading for our boys but I am not sure that the writer should have been aiming at a young adult audience.



The Lucky Galah By Tracy Sorensen

This Australian novel is about the personnel manning the outback satellite dish in Western Australia which relayed the moon landing in 1969. Several movies and TV series are currently focusing on the American Moon landing and their spy technology for example at Pine Gap.

Oddly - while supposedly narrated by a galah - this book tells the story of the unlikely scientists and technologists - "trackers" and their families- who had to deal with this remote locality. Normally I find animal narrators annoying but I guite liked this one. I like the fake non-judgemental way the galah discusses the characters around her. The galah appears to make no judgement of Linda and her affair with the rather smelly Dogger. The galah has no problems with slobby, drunken but child compliant Kevin and his infatuation with the Pauline Hanson derived Kimberly Lamb. The galah does not reveal until the end of the book that his much loved Lizzie is aboriginal. The galah leaves it an open issue whether Evan Johnson suicides after he suspects that Stella is not his daughter. The galah also implies that Australian society is also too lazy and uneducated to be judgemental.

This book is a laid back analysis of Australian social values in the 1960's. As I was a teenager in those years I felt that it was really a book about the 1950's. The author got a few things wrong about the 60's. It is a light-hearted satire notable only for the anger and longing of the frustrated trapped pet galah. There is nothing in this book about Vietnam or Feminism, the pill or the sexual revolution. In our current literature and film both the Americans and ourselves are re-evaluating our values and our technology – perhaps in the light of our mutual shock at the Brexit/Trump era?


Holiday Rowing Report

Our senior 1st XI cricketers recently enjoyed the opportunity to take a break from the books and play some trial matches in the holidays. In a shortened match of 35 overs due to wet weather, St. Aloysius was able to comfortably post a total of 170 for the loss of just two wickets. Unfortunately, our batting effort wasn't up to scratch as we fell just short of the required total with 155. However, the boys will come back from the result, regrouping and identifying weaknesses as a team and coming back stronger for the main season ahead.

This weekend's first trial matches will see us play against St. Josephs College (Joeys) in preparation for the main season in week three against St. Ignatius College (Riverview).


To all parents and players, don't forget to go through the points below:

From 17 September 2018, demerit points for using mobile phones illegally while driving have increased from 4 to 5. During holiday periods, the offence will attract 10 demerit points.

Learner, P1 and P2 licence holders are not permitted to use a mobile phone at all while driving. This includes waiting at traffic lights or stuck in traffic.

Fines will remain \$337 (\$448 in school zone).

The tougher approach to mobile phone usage comes as road toll continues to rise. Between 2012-2017, 175 crashes involving mobile phone usage resulted in 9 deaths and 50 serious injuries.

In the last financial year, 40,000 people were fined for illegal use of mobile phones.
