From the Principal **High Talent**



Results from the NSWFL Epee Teams Premiership were very encouraging. U19-SBHS won gold; U16 SBHS earned silver; and U14- SBHS won gold. A great effort from our Epee teams!

Caught Doing the Right Thing

I was pleased to receive this email from a commuter last Friday complimenting our boys on their behaviour while travelling on public transport. 'I am a regular commuter on Sydney trains (particularly Macarthur-City line). I have noticed recently six boys from your school on my morning train, whose behaviour is worth commending to you. I am impressed that these teenage boys can sit quietly & respectfully, not disturbing the peak time commuters. They do not swear or carry on. They are credit to themselves, their parents & their school. ' Keep up the great standard of behaviour, boys!

Results from the Tell Them from Me Survey

From a healthy sample of our students (n=766),



there were some heartening positives in student perceptions of their educational experience at High. Positive behaviours and a sense of belonging were both up 2% to 98% and 86%, respectively. Having high expectations for success was marginally higher at 8.4 (up from 7.9). Self-reporting a growth orientation improved by 6% to 76%. Perseverance rated at 92% with school pride at 82%. In classrooms well organised instruction improved to 7.2 (from 6.4) as did a positive learning climate 7.0 (up from 5.6). In the wellbeing area, 91% of students affirmed that they knew where to get help if they were being bullied. We are still messaging students to be upstanders and not bystanders when they encounter any incidents of bullying or attempted intimidation. Students feeling that they had someone to be an advocate for them improved from 6.0 to 7. We are working on getting students to feel confident about approaching teaching or non-teaching staff for help when they are not ok. Our advice is to reach out to peers, teachers, or our school counsellors if you are not feeling OK. Everyone learns better and operates more effectively when they feel safe. It our collective responsibility to make this a feeling for everyone.



Booking interviews with your son's teachers

We use a web based electronic scheduling system for arranging interviews. This produces better results for all participants, especially more compact time schedules for both parents and teachers. The system works as follows:

- By **6pm Friday 11 June**, **all parents of boys in Years 7 and 11** will be sent details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered via email (N.B. Parents of boys in Years 8 and 10 will receive their codes via email at the very start of Term 3).
- This scheduling email will be sent to the address currently held by the school. If you have
 not received this email by the morning of Tuesday 15 June or if your email address has
 changed from what had been previously advised to the school, you should notify the school
 at office@sbhs.nsw.edu.au. Please indicate your son's name and roll class or date of birth
 so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview (if you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown). At the same time, you can indicate your availability between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm. You should provide this information by 6pm on Thursday 17 June.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from 6pm on Friday 18 June.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all years will be dismissed from class at 2:35pm each day. The light rail will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these services.
- *Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration.* If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date or communication by telephone arranged.

Similar arrangements will be in place for Years 8 and 10 interviews on Tuesday 20 July.






Stan Jones Cup

E-Cigarettes

What you need to know as parents.

If you, or a parent you know, is concerned about the risks of electronic cigarette use in teenagers, the following information provides you with the facts.

WHAT ARE E-CIGARETTES?

Also known as cuvies, stigs and vapes an e-cigarette is in simple terms a device that heats a flavoured liquid (popular flavours include; strawberry, watermelon, peach and creme brulee) to an aerosol which can be inhaled. The device can be disposable (often allowing for up to 600 inhalations) or it can be reusable by refilling the device with e-liquid or a pod (containing e-liquid). Recent data shows an increase in use of e-cigarettes over the past three years, with one in five students aged 16–17, trying e-cigarettes.

HOW DO THEY WORK?

E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by using a battery to heat a liquid. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid." The liquid used in e-cigarettes is made up of flavours, chemicals and often contains nicotine.

Users inhale e-cigarette aerosol into their lungs. Bystanders can also breathe in this aerosol when the user exhales it into the air.

WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

E-cigarettes come in a variety of shapes and sizes. They can be as small as a USB and even look like one, they can also look like pens, highlighters or cigarettes.



WHY ARE THEY UNSAFE/RISKY/DANGEROUS?

E-cigarette liquid is made up of different chemicals. These chemicals can include:

- Nicotine (although illegal without a prescription in Australia, many disposable devices that youth are using contain nicotine.)
- Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
- Volatile organic compounds
- Cancer-causing chemicals
- Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead

Studies have also shown that kids who use e-cigarettes are more likely than their peers to go on to smoke cigarettes.

Effects of nicotine on youth:

- Nicotine can harm the developing teenage brain.¹ The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
- Using nicotine as a teenager can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.¹
- Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections or synapses are built between brain cells. Young people's brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- Using nicotine as a teenager may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.¹

WHAT CAN I DO AS A PARENT?

The KEY is talking about e-cigarettes with your child, preparing yourself with the facts and role modelling with a smoke and e-cigarette free environment. KEY considerations for talking about e-cigarettes:

K: Know the facts or where to find them from a reputable source

- E: Engage on the topic in a relaxed and easy way. Use the cues around you, a note home from the school, a person using a device, a story on the news as the way into the conversation and the way to keep talking about it ongoing.
- Y: You know your child, communicate with them in ways that work for you and allow you to provide them with the right information to make healthy decisions.

Important note – if you are concerned that your child may be experiencing nicotine withdrawal please speak to your pediatrician or doctor.
