



Game, Set and Match

The School celebrated the opening of its new tennis courts on 13 September 2006.

The four concrete courts are a first class facility for one of the school's most successful sporting groups. They were funded using a ground-breaking public-private partnership model. While the courts are on Departmental land they were developed by the Foundation, which now operates them on a commercial basis.

The project was driven by former Tennis Mistress, Helen Tuthill, who has guided High to three GPS premierships, the last in 2004.

The courts have been sublet to Carl Nielsen who is High's resident professional coach.

Arthur Roden Cutler was a great Australian. He was the Governor of NSW, 1966-1982, the longest serving holder of that office. During his time, he was recognised as the 'people's governor', one who was as comfortable amongst manufacturing workers as diplomats and royalty.

He was also a distinguished diplomat serving as both Australian delegate to the UN General Assembly and Consul General in New York. His first posting, at only 29, was as High Commissioner to New Zealand.

His actions in the Syrian Campaign of 1941 earnt him the Victoria Cross,

the highest military award for bravery. Of the 800,000 Australians who served in WWII only 20 received this decoration.

At High Roden Cutler was a champion swimmer, prefect and captain of the rifle team. His association continued as an old boy. He was patron of the Old Boys' Union and an honoured guest at many functions.

A permanent memorial, the Sir Roden Cutler VC Memorial Gates, has been erected on Anzac Parade. They will form a fitting entrance to the new library (page 8) and a reminder of Sir Roden's legacy of service in all places.

Sir Roden Cutler Charities

Sir Roden Cutler Charities operate in Sydney and assist people who are infirm, aged, incapacitated, disabled, intellectually impaired or delinquent.

Year Eleven was proud to support Sir Roden Cutler Charities on 29 May, 2006, by assisting with the Sir Roden Cutler Wheelchair Roll from Manly to Sydney High. During the day they collected money and raised the charity's profile, operating from Circular Quay through to the SCG. They were co-ordinated by the School's Prefect body and raised several thousand dollars.

The wheelchair roll will be reversed in 2007, beginning at High on 24 May after the official opening of the Cutler Gates.

They were led by Major Richard Knowles, the officer commanding the SHS Cadet Unit. Captain Billingsby diligently performed the duties of team adjutant.

In England the team competed in the Inter-service Cadet Rifle Meeting and the Schools' Meeting matches, competing against cadets from Britain's most established Public Schools.

The boys had a great time off the range as well. They spent a day in London, saw the Fleet Air Museum, were put through parts of the Royal Commando Training Facility and visited Portsmouth.

The team won ten medals, beating many of the best English Public Schools. Justin Hill (02), the school rifle club coach, accompanied the team.

Sydney High cadets

first visited Bisley in 1911, when attending the coronation of George V. Every trip that has gone since has been led by the Officer Commanding of the SHS Cadet Unit. High has travelled to Bisley regularly for the last five years, since the trip was resurrected by the late Captain John Fittler. The Defence Department were key sponsors for the tour.


SHS Cadet Unit currently has a parade strength of 70 and is expanding under the guidance of Major Knowles. Cadets is voluntary and spearheads the school's leadership program.

New Library and Performing Arts Space

A library is the intellectual hub and showcase of a school. At High, the 43 year old KJ Andrews Library is too small for our 1140 students. We need flexible spaces for learning and researching with high speed wireless Internet access to deliver the modern curriculum.

The cultural core of a school is demonstrated by its performing and creative arts capacity. High has a great tradition in debating, music, visual arts and drama. We have no large meeting or performing space to use other than the Great Hall.

Our vision for the 125th anniversary of High is to join the Killip Wing and McDonald Building with a two stage, two level structure that will provide a wireless technology Library and a 270 seat, tiered theatre with a large ground-level stage





area. Road access to the Junior Quad from Anzac Parade will be maintained via a colonnade supporting the raised first floor of the library. The Sir Roden Cutler VC Gates will form a grand entrance.

The project will be financed by the School family. We believe that in combination with the facilities upgrade completed over the

last five years, a new Library and Performing Arts Centre will restore High's pride of place in state education. We have the brains but we need the buildings in which to develop them.

Ken Baret (1921-2006)

Ken Baret (40), was a longstanding director of the High Club Ltd and an officer of the SHS Foundation and OBU. He was also a senior ranking member of the NSW Police Force. At school he swam, dived and rowed. He also played cricket, football and shot-put.

He set a GPS shot-put record in 1939, which stood unequalled until another High boy, coached by Ken Baret, broke it 35 years later. Ken only came to High for three years (38-40), yet, his dedication from graduation to death was testament to his love of the School.





Raymond Leslie Casey Bequest

The School has been fortunate to receive a bequest from an old boy, Raymond Leslie Casey (50-54). The \$130,000 was left to the SHS Foundation Inc.

The funds have been invested and the dividends will be used to benefit individual students and support

School projects.

Mr Casey, who died in December 2005, is pictured right as a member of the 1954 Senior Athletics Team (CHS Champions).

Mr Casey's generosity will be recognised by hanging his portrait and bequest details in the foyer.
