Winter Sports Assembly

Special guest Michael Diamond (SHS 1952) spoke about the great benefits that his co-curricular involvement while at High had on his life after he left. His career in fencing stemmed from his part in a musical production. At

university James Wolfensohn remembered him as a pirate in the play and introduced him to fencing. At two job interviews later in life, his extracurricular activities at school and university had more to do with him getting the jobs than did his academic credentials. His lesson to the boys was to grasp all the opportunities that they could while at school. My speech to the assembly is reprinted below:

Special Guest Mr Michael Diamond (SHS 1952), coaches, parents, staff and GPS representatives, welcome to our winter sports assembly for 2016. Boys selected for GPS teams in Rugby, Football, Volleyball, Cross Country and Fencing are being honoured today. I would like to thank the dedicated sports staff, headed up by HT Sport Mark Pavone, who create the environment in which our boys train three times a week and compete on Saturdays. I want to thank our great team of teachers, parents and our Old Boy contributors, paid and volunteer - our co-curricular program just wouldn't function without you. I thank you on behalf of the boys.

Our Fencing MIC, Dat Huynh (SHS 2004), has expanded the fencing program and included an inaugural celebratory dinner at the end of the season.



High boys compete in foil, épée and sabre. Our teams have recently been successful at National School Team Championships in various disciplines. John Tian and James Siu are very talented competitors representing Australia in international competitions and winning at that level. Our new Head Coach, Feng Yeng (SHS 2000), won a NSW title in 2009 and earned a gold medal in Senior Men's Team Open Foil at the 2010 Commonwealth Fencing Championships. Dat has been Coordinating the Coaching as well as assisting in the coaching of foil. Thank you to Mr Dean Nguyen for his assistance in creating a dedicated fencing website and developing a Fencing Committee. Thank you to our coaches for raising the standard of our fencing and to the parent supporters of the sport.

Cross country running is now a very successful



sport at High, with the U16s winning the Intermediate GPS point-score championship last season. Thank you to Rebecca Dam again for her efficient and enthusiastic organisation and management of the sport and to her staff Clay Kesting (now retired) and John Prorellis.

Thank you again to Head Coach, Dani Andres, for his coordination of the coaching program and to his coaches Kenneth Liu (SHS 2014) and Jason Garrett (SHS 2014) for their assistance, particularly with statistics. Thank you to Glen Schofield for his advice and support with record keeping and performance statistics at GPS / CHS events. Of great help at the holiday camp were parents Mrs Nancy Zhang, Mrs Pei Hong, and Jennifer McGrane.

Football is growing even bigger in the school this year with 40 teams. Thank you to MIC Geoff Tesoriero for his great dedication and passion for developing the sport. Thank you to Tony Dunn who has returned to coordinate our program again as Head Coach. Thank you to the coaching staff: Jason Hayhurst (first grade), Finch Twarlow (second grade) and Stephen Birch (third grade). Thank you to the parents of the 1st and 2nd XI who supply such great catering for the boys. Thank you again to the teaching staff who contribute so much to the Saturday competition program: Julie Eggleton, Kety Manolias, Ingrid Pepe, Mina Genias, Madeleine Rigby, Rosy Tracey and Natalie Luu. Thanks again to Tony Nimac for his continued input into the administration and development of the football program at High.



Volleyball is again a highly competitive sport, thriving under the guidance of veteran strategist, Michael Kay. The boys took out both first and second grade GPS Championships last year and the 16s were successful at national level in Melbourne. Despite the growing competition from GPS schools and the occasional knockout performance by one or two state schools, High has been dominant in this sport for a decade. Thank you to our Old Boy coaches and staff for making the sport the powerhouse that it is.



Matt Cotton has worked conscientiously as MIC of rugby and has brought enthusiasm and a changed style to our rugby administration. Andrew Walters (SHS 2003) is taking first and second grade, with Sam Gribble (SHS 2006) and David Knox's support as backs and skills coach. Thank you to George and Con Barris who are managing the 16s. Our Junior program is managed very well by Mick Aldous, Paul Scrivener and Geoff Stein. Thank you to all the supportive parents in the Rugby Committee: particularly, Tracey Whittaker, Eddie Dorahy and Julie Fox, for giving their catering, administration and organisational support to High Rugby.

Often in sport, we experience moments of exhilaration when we are successful and despair when we are not. In either case we must be wary of what Alan Jones called taking a snapshot of the moment and crowding around to look at it while the game carries on in the background. We need to immediately refocus on the next play or moment in the contest. Often just after such moments of emotion we are at our most vulnerable. We tend to make additional errors. We are accessing our emotions instead

of focussing on the task. We have all seen that turning point moment in sport when success or failure determines the outcome of a campaign.



Noted biographer, Peter FitzSimons, praised the strong focus that John Eales brought to the victorious World Cup rugby team of 1999. In that competition there were several high-stress moments that could have gone either way. In the semi-final against South Africa the scores were tied at full time after a last minute penalty goal kicked by Jannie de Beer. The sides were still locked together after 17 minutes of extra time. The Wallabies stuck to their game plan but couldn't break through until Stephen Larkham kicked a 48m dropped goal to seal the win – his first success at drop goal in his representative career. What a moment to choose to attempt it! In the final, despite suffering eye gouging and very robust defence, the Wallabies held firm with their discipline to beat the French 35-12. Australia won the World cup because each man knew his job, did it well and served the team in the way the coach planned for him to do it.

The next year in Wellington, the Wallabies played the All Blacks and were down 21-23 with little time left to play when they were awarded a penalty. The team kicker, Stirling Mortlock, was on the sideline, injured. John Eales had to take the kick from 30 metres out and 15 metres in from touch. He carefully rehearsed his kicking routine – three steps back and 2½ across. He visualised his approach and strike of the ball – 'head down, slow, follow through to the posts'. He followed the teaching of the great All Black kicker Grant Fox. Eales kicked the goal and retained the Bledisloe Cup for Australia. Focus, visualisation, rehearsal, execution.

You perform the way you train. Attend and take training seriously. You need to make the right decisions at the right time while distracted by stress. Great self-regulation, strong visualisation and sustained focus will ensure you and your team perform to your abilities. Standards – ethos – tradition. Play for yourselves, play for each other, play for High! I congratulate all the boys who have been selected for GPS competition. You are deriving the benefit from participation in team sports that will be enduring in terms of skills learnt, dispositions acquired and memories retained. Good luck in the contests ahead.

From the Junior Library



We got a little distracted by Genre issues and forgot to shout very loudly that we have purchased a very good eBook deal from one of our eBook suppliers - Wheelers.

Our boys can now access over 900 eBooks from Wheelers - so have a look at the Website on Oliver Front page and download one of these lovely books. These books are not on Oliver until the Education Department clears us to put them onto our system, but they can be borrowed by our students and our clever IT guys can figure out how many have been loaned. Some of these books are already in our library as paper based books and some are classics. They are a mix of books to stock up our beginners' eBook collection.

As of one month ago when I chased down our eBook figures from our two suppliers, our students had borrowed 1031 eBooks from OverDrive and 59 books from Wheelers. This was $\frac{1}{4}$ of all the books borrowed from our library in the 9 months since eBook borrowing became possible.

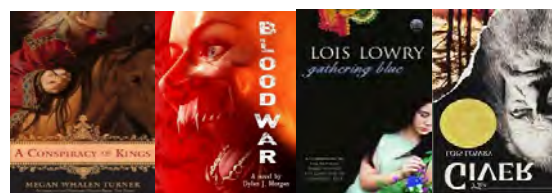
Richard Ding our Junior Library Prefect who works for our library for no Award Scheme Points has written an article at our request about our new eBooks:

Library News

Hello everybody, this week's article is about eBooks. In addition to the library's massive collection of physical books, there exists an even larger selection of electronic books floating around in cyberspace, waiting to be read. eBooks are becoming quite a significant medium for reading. A quarter of books borrowed last year from our libraries were eBooks – that's hardly surprising. eBooks can be obtained almost instantaneously online, they don't need to be carried home and can easily be read on the laptops/other devices you carry every day. Additionally, you can highlight memorable passages and make notes. There's also ease of returning the book when you have finished reading it – just a couple of clicks and you're done.

Our library has two systems in place for borrowing eBooks – Wheelers and Overdrive (check both out, they contain different collections). They can be accessed via Oliver. Last time I checked there were:

- 925 titles in Overdrive; new books include: A Conspiracy of Kings, Blood War, Gathering Blue, The Giver



- 1100 titles in Wheelers; new releases include: North Face, the Nest and the Way We Roll



Wow! That's over 2000 books in total! It's really easy to pick a title you think you'll like. You can select many filters: your favourite author, genre, new releases or popular books.

Read, my fellow students. Take advantage of the infinitude of free information within these metaphysical treasures to improve your mental faculties. If a human being starts off as a humble acorn, then books are the nutrients and water in the soil which enable it to transform into a towering, formidable oak tree. Grow to become young men capable of facing any challenge the world decides to throw at you. Build the foundation to support your endeavours as you reach for the apex of the mountain of success. As Napoleon Bonaparte, Emperor of the French, put it best:

"Show me a family of readers, and I will show you the people who move the world."

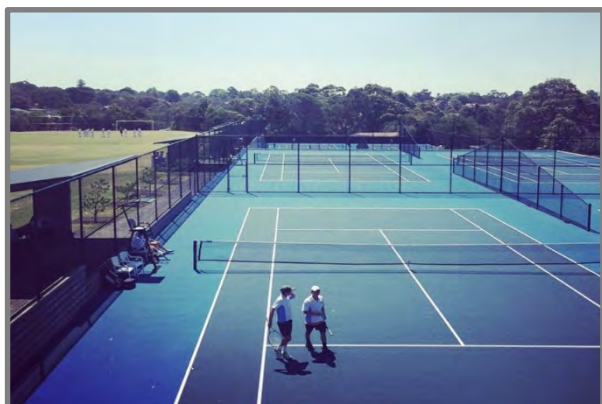

Stan Jones Cup 2016

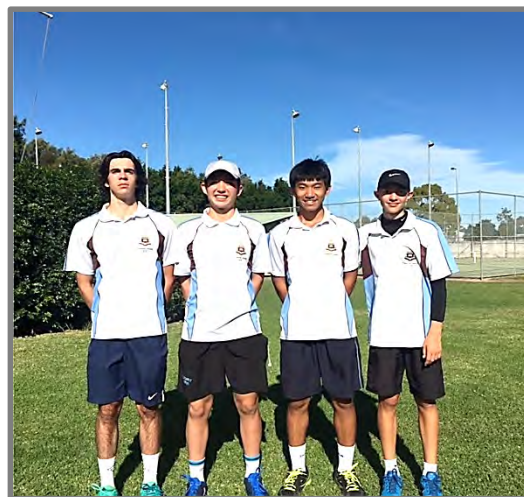

RIFLE SHOOTING

Cessnock Shoot 2016

On 21 May 2016, 16 Shooters consisting of Ciaran Farrell (12M), Julian Tu (12E), Kentaro Takahata (12M), John Huang (12R), Denny Fu (12M), Daniel Tian (11E), Nathan Wong (11F), Tom Nguyen (11S), Wentao Ruan (11F), Dallas Yan (11E), James Jiang (11F), Henry Deng (10E), Ricky Li (10F), Kai Mai (10R), Alexander Tan (9F) and Frank Zhou (9M) assembled outside Malabar Rifle Range. They were raring to go; ready to make the arduous 5 hour trip to Cessnock Rifle Range to compete in the annual Cessnock Open Prize Meet. After arriving at the Cessnock range, they put up their own tents, relying only on their camaraderie and plastic mallets. After idling around and eating dinner, we went to sleep to the sounds of a rave far off in the distance which played well into the night and the morning after.

We woke up early and immediately packed our tents up, so that we wouldn't have to do so later in the day. We also set up our rifles for the shoot, which was to be 3 matches of 2 sighters and 10 shots, at 600 yards, but after some technical difficulties with the electronic targets the first match was declared invalid.

This was great news for some like me who hadn't shot their best but bad for some who had done really well, but nonetheless the shoot went on. With the Open Prize Meet now scaled down to 2 matches of 2 sighters and 10 shots, we knew each match and by extension, each shot, counted even more than before. It was tense as we took the experiences from our last shoot and went down to shoot on manual targets. The difference between manual and electronic targets may seem small, but in practice it can throw many shooters off, especially our new generation, who had only been shooting on the electronic targets. The delay between the shot and the marking can throw off a shooter's rhythm if they aren't used to it, and it also has the potential to make them worried about each shot as they have more time to think about it, possibly ruining their next shots. The wind also fishtailed; it went in two opposite directions at the start and the end of the range. This provided yet another challenge that even experienced shooters had trouble with, and as a result, no A Grader had a perfect score.

Despite all that was against them, our shooters shot marvellously, taking the 3rd to 10th spots overall in C grade. Denny Fu's first competition provided him with a breakthrough performance onto the shooting scene, taking 3rd place in C grade and 5th place overall in our school, showing his passion for shooting and the efficiency of the Sydney High Shooting Program; Denny is technically still in his first year of shooting. Dallas missed out on getting a prize, with a great 4th place finish. Despite often shooting in the centre of the target (90.6), he lost out on overall score to Denny's 91.2. There were also exceptional performances by our shooters in the high-level A and B grade competition. Wentao Ruan took 6th place in B Grade, placing him 1st in the school, followed by Ciaran Farrell and James Jiang who took 12th and 13th place in B grade respectively.

Regarding the matches, many shooters had impressive performances and Nathan Wong had an incredible comeback, shooting a 48.5 during the second match, improving on his score by 9 points. This recovery shows the sheer mental fortitude of our senior shooters, that comes with experience and skill. Another new shooter, Ricky Li, ranked 2nd in his 2nd match in C grade, winning a medal. Despite this being his first shoot, it demonstrates his potential; he ranked above Zhikai Mai, who also won a medal. Zhikai came 3rd with the same score as Ricky, but lost on countback. 4th place was occupied by another new shooter, Frank Zhou, who shot a great score 46.2, improving on his previous score by 8 points. Frank showed his effective adaptation to the multiple changes in the wind which had previously taken him by surprise. A moment of silence for John Huang, who was on track for a possible (a score of 50) but shot three 4s at the end of his shoot, making his score 47.4 rather than 50.4+. During the first match, Ciaran and Wentao showed magnificent scores, with rankings of 4th and 7th respectively, with Ciaran shooting a 48.4 and Wentao just missing out with a 48.3. The highlight of the event however was when Denny Fu won the raffle of a food thermos, coming 1st place in luck.

Overall the shooters had a great time at Cessnock, from the long bus trip to the lack of sleep and even to the large delays during the competition, the shooters took it all in stride and had fun, as this was the first camp out (or even competition) for many of the shooters. This camp and competition allowed them to deepen friendships with their comrades and experience something different, which is what sport at Sydney High, and especially Rifle Shooting is all about.

GIÚP CỘNG ĐỒNG QUÝ VỊ LUÔN ĐƯỢC AN TOÀN

Theo nghiên cứu của chúng tôi, một số người trong cộng đồng quý vị có thể có nguy cơ bị cháy nhà cao hơn và khả năng bị thương cao hơn khi xảy ra cháy nhà.

Máy quang điện cũng ít khả năng phát báo động khi quý vị nấu nướng hoặc dùng vòi sen tắm hơn. Máy có ghi hàng chữ 'photoelectric' (quang điện) trên hộp.

Cơ quan Cứu hỏa & Cứu hộ NSW nay đề nghị tất cả mọi cư dân tiểu bang NSW hãy THAY máy báo động khói nhà mình và dành thời gian giúp xem lại ở 10 nhà bạn bè hoặc nhà người thân để chắc chắn là họ đã cập nhật máy báo động khói. Quý vị có thể nhờ đó mà cứu được họ.
