The Corlett Family & 1961 Old Boys Bursary Program

We recognise at High, that there are several families in each academic year suffering financial stress. Family illness, separation, unemployment, misadventure or enforced home care duties, can constrain a particular family severely when it comes to finding money for school contributions, uniforms, camps, excursions, sporting trips and co-curricular activities. Despite the strain and hardship, some students really want to keep involved in school life. These students, who embody the spirit of High, need our help to maintain their involvement.

This year, we managed to identify and support four students. Each boy received a credit of \$2,500 on his school account to pay for the necessities of a full student life at High. The intention of the Corlett Family, who endowed the bursaries, was that worthy but needy students should be helped to participate in school life. They made a commitment to fund four bursaries for six years. The program has been broadened, as other Old Boys from 1961

learned of the purposes of the bursaries. Hence, a second category of bursaries 'The 1961 Old Boys Bursary' will be awarded to an additional four students in 2019. Our target is to alleviate financial stress for eight families during next year – even more, if funds allow.

I will be making occasional reports to the Corlett family and the 1961 Old Boys, without naming any of the recipients, to apprise them of the contexts inspiring their philanthropy. Once the students leave school I will facilitate their wishes to contact and thank their benefactors if the beneficiaries reach out to the school to do so. Rather than keep this impressive program confidential, I want to make two different groups aware of its existence. First, I would like to encourage Old Boys and Friends of High to add to the pool of funds in the 1961 Old Boy Bursary Program or recruit a few friends to fund a separate bursary under the name of their graduating year.

In addition, I would like to reach out to current parents and carers who might find that their circumstances are overwhelming and that they would struggle considerably to make all or some of the charges associated with their son's education. If your circumstances are seriously necessitous, I invite you to write to me, marked 'confidential', sketching the particular context your family is experiencing. As bursaries become available, I will then have a number of families in need from which to choose additional worthy recipients.



Sydney Boys Team Travel Fund - ASF

We have an *Australian Sports Foundation* Project – the team travel fund. The idea is intended to defray some of the costs of our extensive sporting travel costs – to Armidale, Melbourne, Wingham, Canberra, Taree, Grafton, Terrigal, Port Stephens or the Gold Coast. If your son represents the school in any sport and is likely to 'go on the road' then it may

be possible to work with your MIC to reduce the cost of these sporting tours considerably via a tax deductible donation. Old Boys and friends of High are invited to make a contribution to this Fund also. If you have an interest in sport and would like to give back something to help our boys experience the fun of sporting trips while they are at school, then do as I did and donate direct to ASF at www.asf.org.au/make-donation/sydney-boys-team travel fund/ Last year the basketball teams that travelled to Victoria for the National Schools Championships were subsidised from the fund. Ask your MIC about organising a future sporting trip to take advantage of the ASF Team Travel Fund.

Even students in Year 9 are vulnerable, because the stage 5 curriculum is compressed in Year 9 for history and geography. Our goal in enforcing accountability for work assigned is to make sure students do not have holes in their learning that might have the potential to restrict them from reaching their potential in the HSC. Every student has a responsibility to complete work assigned by his teachers to the best of his ability.

The Junior Library does not just purchase baby books for our Junior students. We purchase books to push good readers in this Selective school. We have many books that Seniors and Juniors can both share.

"Worlds in upheaval" HSC ENGLISH EXTENSION TOPIC. "Texts and Human Experience" HSC topic

From now on our library will be using these phrases as a tag term on any resource we think they would suit. This will apply to *ClickView* resources as well as fiction books. To search our library for any topic you just go to the Front Page of Oliver and "Google" your request under subject. So you would put in these whole phrases.


However it is worth learning how to search all libraries using similar terms and thinking a little about how to research topics like these which are new to all library systems and might not be readily available under these new headings. "Change" might be a useful search term.

For "Worlds in Upheaval" you can think of searching the Junior Library's genres. All "Speculative Fiction" could be related to worlds in upheaval. All "Dystopian Fiction" is about worlds in upheaval. All fiction about "War" is about worlds in upheaval. In some ways "Crime Fiction" is about civil life in upheaval. All books about "Terrorism" are about worlds in upheaval. Quite a lot of "Historical Fiction" is about worlds in upheaval – Wars of the Roses for example. I put all Junior Library Espionage into "Action Adventure". So anything about world threats are about worlds in upheaval.

We are currently discussing what will be required for "Texts and Human Experiences" and will write another High Notes article on this.

Two lovely books related to "Worlds in upheaval" have just arrived on our shelves and I would like to briefly

recommend them especially to HSC students. (Normal loan periods apply – loans are not full year)



The Stolen Bicycle by Wu Ming Yi has just arrived onto our library shelves. It is a charming book about Taiwan during and after World War 2 when Taiwan was taken over by the Japanese and it was written by a Taiwanese and translated into English. It will join our Asian Literature Collection and its Genre is Historical Fiction.

This book really puts our modern lives with cars, supermarkets, drones and aeroplane travel into perspective by its fascination with vintage bicycles which were once as important to families as obtaining a car. The book traces a particular bike through the bicycle invasion of Malaya by the Japanese bicycle army and also brings in captured elephants who acted like tractors for the Japanese army in this campaign. It tells many heartbreaking but also charming stories of love and loss and discusses many fascinating features of Taiwanese commerce such as butterfly paintings and the industry which drove them. While this world was in turmoil the resilience and emotional support the Taiwanese people offer one another is surely the outstanding message to all of us in a world of rapid change. It is also interesting to ruminate on this novel as an example of texts and human experience. How would today's society understand modern Taiwan if it did not appreciate its past history? If this text had not been written this unique and very charming perspective would be completely lost.

The second book we have just put out on our shelves was Long listed for the Man Booker Prize and depicts the upheaval experience by young *Muslim* migrants in Brexit obsessed Britain.



Home Fire by Kamila Shamsie tells the story of the effect on children left in a non-Muslim country when a parent or relative becomes a jihadi. In this story both the father and the son become involved in fighting for strongly held Muslim values in another country.

The families left behind have to live their lives being very careful they do not show any indication that they will follow a terrorist path. The daughters of the family find it difficult to get an education. Money is in short supply. The son of the family becomes a target for revolutionary recruitment to fight the war in Syria and finds himself banned from returning to his home country – Britain. He is executed by his handler on the steps of the British consulate in Turkey.

Very significantly a Muslim politician who tries to tread what he believes is the correct path for British Muslims faces the tragedy of his son paying the price for his abandonment of traditional Muslim beliefs by being trapped in a Pakistan park with an explosive vest secured to his body. This is indeed a world in upheaval.



Taking tons of momentum from our victorious Round 1 clash against reigning champions Riverview, the 1st XI was keen to knock off Shore College, a side tipped by most to take out the competition.

Unfortunately, we lost an important toss and were forced to bowl on a flat McKay deck. We got off to a decent start, with Shore rarely exceeding 3 an over before lefties Anish Joseph (Year 10) and Menuja Goonaratne (Year 10) ripped through the top order to leave them 3-80 at lunch.

However, the Shore middle order proved to be stubborn before Hunar Verma (Year 11) and Cameron Pereira (Year 11) struck to leave Shore at 5-150. 


Captain of Boats Report

Validation of clinical tools for central blood pressure and vascular stiffness assessment in children

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CAREGIVERS

Introduction

You and your child are invited to take part in a research study into cardiovascular health in children. The objective is to investigate whether non-invasive tools to measure cardiovascular health in adults can be similarly effective in children.

The study is being conducted within this institution by Associate Professor Michael Skilton and his team. Mr Tommy Cai, Ms Hasthi Dissanayake, Ms Alice Meroni and Dr Melinda Phang will be undertaking the investigations under the supervision of Associate Professor Michael Skilton.

The study is part of a national collaborative study coordinated by Australian Researchers at the University of Sydney, Macquarie University, Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, and the Childrens' Hospital at Westmead.

The study is being supported by a Research Development Project Grant from the NSW Cardiovascular Research Network.

Study Procedures

This study will take place on a single visit and require no more than 2 hours. If you agree to allow your child to participate in this study, you will be asked to sign the Parent Consent Form.

- 1. Complete some questionnaires. These seek information on your child's medical and exercise history and your medical and pregnancy history. You and your child will be asked to complete two questionnaires a Participant/Maternal Medical Questionnaire and a Physical Activity Questionnaire. <u>If possible, we ask that you bring your child's blue book to help complete parts of the Medical questionnaire.</u>
- 2. Blood pressure analysis. Using a non-invasive painless technique called applanation tonometry, which uses a pencil shaped probe placed on the skin above the pulse at your child's wrist, neck and arm. With this we are able not only to measure your blood pressure, but also the shape of the pulse at different locations as the heart pumps blood through the body.

- 3. Blood flow speed. Using a blood pressure cuff on the thigh and a pencil-shaped transducer on the skin of at the neck, we are able to measure the speed at which blood travels through the abdominal aorta (the main blood vessel in their tummy). These measurements are quick, non-invasive and painless, and well allow us to study the main vessels of the body. This procedure will not require undressing.
- 4. (Optional) Manual measurement of blood flow speed. Use of a pencil-shaped transducer on the skin of the thigh and the neck, as well as three ECG leads attached to the chest, will be used to manually measure the speed of blood through the abdominal aorta. This procedure will require partial undressing for placement of ECG leads on the chest and to access the main artery in the upper thigh.
- 5. Blood pressure control with exercise. A blood pressure cuff with an infrared light detector will be placed around your child's wrist, and a 3-lead ECG attached to your child's chest to measure their heart rate. We will continue to measure this blood pressure before and during a short period of physical activity (ie. Exercise bike) over a period of 20 minutes. <u>Please bring a comfortable pair of sneakers for your child for this part of the study.</u>
- 6. Ultrasound of the heart and blood vessels. This involves a safe ultrasound test to image your heart, abdominal aorta (the main blood vessel in their abdomen) carotid arteries (blood vessels in the neck) and brachial artery (blood vessel in the arm). This test uses a similar machine to the ultrasound used during pregnancy. When looking at the artery in the arm, we will inflate a blood pressure cuff over the area for 5 minutes, which may cause slight discomfort, but is otherwise harmless.
- 7. Body dimension measurements. We will measure your child's height, weight, hip circumference. Furthermore, we will use a device (BODPOD) in order to characterize your child's body-fat percentage. The BODPOD is a capsule-shaped device in which your child will sit. In order for the BODPOD to measure body-fat percentage accurately the participant must not be wearing loose-fitting clothing (appropriate clothing include swimwear, lycra exercise clothing, etc) and be wearing a swimming cap (which we will provide) for this part of the study. We will ask that you bring such clothing on the day, if available.

Risks

There are minimal risks of participating in this study, including:

- The sensation of the ultrasound gel and transducer on the skin, and the inflation of the blood pressure cuff around your child's arm, can cause some discomfort.
- Manual measurement of blood flow speed (optional). This is a non-invasive procedure that will not cause any harm, but will require partial undressing to uncover the chest and femoral artery in the upper thigh.
- For one of the ultrasound measurement, it will be required that we inflate a cuff on the arm for a short period of time. This will temporarily reduce blood flow to that arm and may cause slight numbness and tingling for a short

period after the measurement.

Benefits

While we intend that this research study furthers medical knowledge and may improve the tools used for early recognition of cardiovascular disease in children in the future, it will not be of direct benefit to you. However, if you wish, we can provide you with a copy of your child's body composition report at the end of the study.

Costs

Participation in this study will not cost you anything, nor will you be paid. However, you will be reimbursed for your travel expenses for study visits. As gratitude, we will offer you movie tickets at the end of the study.

Voluntary Participation

Participation in this study is entirely voluntary. You do not have to take part in it. If you do take part, you can withdraw at any time without having to give a reason. Whatever your decision, please be assured that it will not affect your medical treatment or your relationship with the staff who are caring for you.

We estimate that this study will take approximately 2 hours to complete. During this time your child could get distressed or upset. Please note that you have the right to cease participation or withdraw from the study without any consequence at any time.

Confidentiality

All the information collected from you for the study will be treated confidentially, and only the researchers named above will have access to it. The study results may be presented at a conference or in a scientific publication, but individual participants will not be identifiable in such a presentation.

Further Information

When you have read this information, Dr Melinda Phang, Ms Alice Meroni, Mr Tommy Cai or Ms Hasthi Dissanayake will discuss it with you further and answer any questions you may have. If you would like to know more at any stage, please feel free to contact Dr Melinda Phang on 8627 1924.
