From the Principal Welcome Back To Term 2



After what I hope was a relaxing break, I welcome staff, students, coaches, parents and Old Boy employees to what is always a hectic term two. Our newly appointed Deputy Principal, Junior School, Mr Jamieson Kay took up his position this week. We welcome back Jamie, formerly a social science teacher and Head Teacher Student Welfare at High, after his tenure at Northern Beaches – Manly Selective – as Head Teacher of HSIE. In English, Vivian Paul (SHS-2002) is replacing Anna Hitchcock for Term 2.

This week Year 9 had their half-yearly examinations. They will be followed by Year 8 next week. Year 12 reports will be collated next Friday for distribution and discussion in week



three. From Tuesday of week 3 until Monday of week 4 (14-20.5) Years 7 and 9 will be having their NAPLAN tests. Students need to make sure they know when and where their testing will occur as the exam periods are

staggered to accommodate online delivery. Year 7 exams commence immediately after NAPLAN on May 21. Year 11 have their exams beginning in week 6 (3.6). Year 10 exams begin on Friday 7.6. Year 12 examinations commence in week 8 (17.6).

In term two, students need to be well organised and must plan for all their commitments – academic, sporting and co-curricular. It is easy to fall behind if you do not allocate your time and

anticipate the time demands that will be placed on you for each week. I urge parents to get involved and to discuss personal organisation with their sons.

High Talent

Dean Nguyen (9S) was awarded a gold medal and perfect score in the National Latin Exam this year. A marvellous effort, Dean! Congratulations to Isaac Ayoubi (9F) and Izak Taylor (9F) on their selection in the NSW U15 basketball team. Well done to Lachlan Ho (11T), Ethan Kwan (11M), Adrian Leong (11F) and Matthew Pellen (11R) who represented Australia in the Oceania Cadet Fencing Championships in Wellington, New Zealand.



Lachlan won gold in the teams' event and bronze in the individual foil. Matthew won silver in the teams' epée event. Adrian and Ethan won gold in the Men's Sabre Teams event, while Adrian won bronze in the individual event.

Ground Improvements

During the holidays, guite a few areas of the school were concreted. The long jump pit next to the barbecue shack was filled in to make the area more usable. A pathway and drain were installed beside the COLA up to the shower/toilet steps to prevent gravel from being dragged onto the new artificial grass and to facilitate drainage in major weather events. A pathway was laid around the gate leading to The Flat, to make access easier and to stop erosion of the bank caused by heavy pedestrian traffic. The new electric boom gate was protected by a bollard set in a concrete pad. The UTS gymnasium had the exhaust fans replaced in the second week of the holidays – a major undertaking. Conditions for players in the gym will be much improved. On behalf of the High community I want to thank UTS for the improvements made at considerable expense.

Student Awards Scheme - NAPLAN Results Bonus Points

Boys in Years 7 and 9 sit the NAPLAN tests this month. The idea behind NAPLAN is for all boys to try their best in each test to prove to themselves that they are progressing well at school, from Year 5 to Year 7 or from Year 7 to Year 9. They can demonstrate growth. Regrettably, often boys do not treat the tests as seriously as they might - rushing through just to finish early or working carelessly because the results do not count on their reports. We need to convert more Year 7 Band 9 results into Year 9 Band 10 results. Our policy is that we do not teach to the test. Skill development is supposed to be included in our subject programming. However, some boys need help refining their skills. There are many suggested activities and resources available on the NAPLAN website to help boys to help themselves to improve their basic skills. Go to www.nap.edu.au/naplan/the-tests if you would like to do some preparation or to hone your skills.

We decided to incentivise wholehearted student performances in NAPLAN tests. We offer up to a maximum of 20 *Student Award Scheme* points for the **four** tests – 5 points each. Students maintaining their expected growth trajectory will receive three points and those exceeding it, five. We want to give boys an extra reason to try hard, to progress to the highest level possible, to use all the available time and to check their answers for careless errors or mistakes of logic or judgement. In short, we want to nurture the process of performing to your best ability under pressure. We want to make your growth as a learner **visible** to you.






FROM THE JUNIOR LIBRARY IT IS SUCH A JOY TO FIND AND READ A GREAT BOOK


One of the best things about being a school Librarian is that you come across fabulous books and you can regard it as "homework" to try them out. Last school holidays and this term I have been lucky enough to have read one fabulous book after another.






After reading *A Prayer for Owen Meaney* I thought John Irving was very worth following and I have embarked on *The World According to Garp.* In his novels Irving explores controversial issues for his time such as unmarried single parents and very thoroughly examines the pervasive role of religious belief in small town America. On the way his comments on various current political issues over a lifetime give us an insight into our history and an analysis of American politics and foreign affairs. His characters are hilarious. This book could be read by advanced juniors as the main character is a child but is a senior fiction. Year 9/10 readers would also find it is very relevant to their experiences.

On totally another tack and on another level I would recommend Robert A Heinlein's *The Moon is a Harsh Mistress*. This classic Science Fiction is also hilarious. It examines the idea of political revolution, colonial attitudes, and traditional marriage all while taking us on a wild ride with the first group of lunar inhabitants – amusingly called Loonies. This book would suit good junior readers, the mid school and seniors.





Burial Rites by Hannah Kent has won a lot of awards. I decided to risk Scandi Noir depression and see how I coped with a terrible story of an abused woman in harsh 1800's Iceland. While this was a story of the harsh life of the north and the dreadful fate of children born outside marriage Agnes the woman sentenced to death emerges as a blazing force. Apart from Agnes and her wonderful passion the issue being examined is really the dangers in the behaviour of Natan Ketilsson and anyone with his mischievious behaviour to people around him – sexual partners in particular.

Students selection will be based on the top 10 places from the previous year's cross country event and a further 10 competitive students who would like to register and compete in this year's event.

Directions:

- Students are to attend regular classes for periods 1 & 2 (recess). Students leave for Centennial Park at the start of Period 3 for the Cross Country CHS Trials.
- On the day of the carnival, Year 7 students are to wear either PE gear or sportswear for the day.
- Students are to cross the road at lights only.
- Runners should eat their lunch at the recess break, so not to get sick while competing in the race.
- New students will have a pre-race course walk to familiarise themselves with the course.
- Stay in supervised viewing area and watch the other years until your race is called.
- When your race is called go to the starting area.
- At the finish you will be given a place ticket.
- If you are in the first 15 places you go to the first 15 table to have your position recorded, and then proceed to your House Roll Table.
- All runners to proceed with finish ticket to your House Roll Table to have your attendance marked.
- Tell the teacher your name, roll class and finishing position.
- After the race you will be dismissed by a teacher.

Rules:

- All Year 7 attends and must compete <u>unless you have a doctor's medical certificate for illness</u>.
- Students with a Medical certificate must hand it in to Ms Dam by 9am on Friday morning.
- You must run in shoes.
- Stay on the course and follow directions from course marshals.
- Spectators must stay within the viewing area and are not permitted on the course.
- Winning house determined by the lowest total of the first ten runners to finish.
- To qualify for the Award scheme you must compete & finish.
- Top ten runners will comprise the provisional school team to compete at the zone.
- Only the first 15 places will be timed.
- Cross Country Champions will be selected from this event.
- Any MIC ruling is final.

Additional Info:

The School Cross Country is the first qualifying event within the CHS Competition.

The first 10 runners for each age division will make up the school team for the Eastern Suburbs Zone Carnival. The first 10 runners at the Zone Carnival will compete at the Sydney East Regional Carnival and the first 10 runners from Regional Carnival go on to the NSW All Schools Carnival.

CBD & South East Light Rail Tram testing

Stage 3 safety notification




Tram testing is starting along Alison Road and Anzac Parade between Lang Road and Wansey Road in Randwick and Moore Park.

This marks an exciting milestone for the project. It is important that everyone remains safe during this testing period and are aware of new safe work zones (hazard zones). We will test all functions including vehicle movements, electrical systems and traffic integration in a safe

environment prior to services starting.

Night-time testing

Tram testing will initially start at night between 9pm and 4am. Trams will be operating at low speeds, gradually increasing as we head towards daytime testing.



Daytime testing

As tram testing moves into daytime hours, tram movements will become more frequent with more trams tested on the tracks. **Look up and stay safe!** Please be mindful of your environment and always keep a safe distance from the trams.

Be aware, stay clear of tracks and stops

With the start of daytime testing, construction fencing and barriers will gradually be removed along the alignment, exposing some of the newly completed tracks and stops. It is important to remember that trams are not servicing passengers and that we are still testing the system. Please do not approach stops or trams during this period.



How will this affect me?


- Tram movements
 Trams move quickly and quietly in both directions so always be mindful of your surroundings when near the light rail.
- High voltage wires overhead remember to look up and stay safe. Overhead wires carry 750 volts DC. Always keep a safe distance from the wires and never come into contact with anything in their immediate vicinity.
- Always respect hazard signs.
 Please pay attention to hazard signs along the alignment. Signs have been installed where trams are being tested and warn of electrical and other hazards, including tram movements.
- A height restriction of 4.6m
 (unless otherwise signposted)
 applies to all road users where
 wires have been installed. If you
 operate an oversize vehicle or are
 carrying a tall load, please contact
 Roads and Maritime Services to
 plan your route. For more info visit
 rms.nsw.gov.au or call 13 22 13.
- As fencing and barriers are gradually removed you will begin to see the light rail tracks and stops. Always be mindful of light rail tracks and only cross at designated pedestrian crossings.
- Remember to follow NSW road rules when driving or cycling near the light rail.


What is the hazard zone?

During testing and commissioning of the light rail, hazard zones are established to help identify areas of increased hazards including electrical hazards and tram movements. A hazard zone includes an area three metres either side of the tracks and near all wires and poles. Any works inside the hazard zone will strictly require a **Permit to Work**.



Permit to Work

A Permit to Work is now required for any work that may take place in or around the hazard zone. The hazard zone includes an area three metres either side of the track and near all light rail poles. If you wish to work in or around the hazard zone please apply for a Permit to Work by contacting **1800 684 490** or emailing **SLRcommunity@acciona.com.**


