From the Principal High Talent

NAPLAN

The school shares parental concerns and student frustrations surrounding the online administration of the NAPLAN tests last week. Ms Evans and the teaching staff have done a great job in managing the administration of the tests in terms of facilities, hardware and supervision. We have received numerous complaints from parents about software issues - dropping out and black screens. I want to reiterate that our school has no control over the software used by NESA. I thank everybody for their civility and patience about the issue of individual disadvantage. On Tuesday, May 28, there will be an opportunity to re-sit NAPLAN writing and reading for those in Year 7 who had their tests disrupted, due to software delivery issues.

Driving On School Grounds

Students move around inside the school grounds very frequently, presuming they are safe. They frequently do not attend well to their surroundings, being distracted by their friends or technology. They may run out from behind a parked car or across a driveway. In the area in front of the UTS gymnasium there is a great deal of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Several cars driven by parents have been observed travelling towards the school building at speeds well in excess of 10km/hr. They also execute three point turns in the bus bay area where visibility down the hill is poor. We ask parents to respect our speed limits and to use designated drop-off zones. In addition, parents have been sitting in cars parked in the staff car park, thus preventing staff from being able to park their cars at a convenient location. Please vacate parking spaces promptly when asked to do so by a member of staff.



Parking is **rear to wall or rear to fence** to maximise driver views of the roadway. There have been several tragedies involving SUVs and small children in recent years in schools. In the interests of providing the maximum possible safety for our students, staff and visitors, please be careful when parking and when exiting the site and please drive slowly in school grounds. Try to enter by gate 1 and exit by gate 2 whenever possible.

Interpreting Year 9 Reports – Semester 1

All Year 9 boys should now have their reports. Parents should be aware that students have fewer compulsory subjects in Year 9: English, mathematics, science, history, geography and PDHPE. They have added two electives to the core group. All of the stage 5 requirements for history and geography are completed in Year 9, so there is plenty of content and many skills to learn. The cut-off points' standard for Year 9 is 24 (or 8 subjects at credit). Parents are cautioned that large fluctuations in points earned and rankings in the cohort can be caused by a few marks more or less at the cut-off scores for HDs, Ds or credits. Sometimes boys underperformed last year in subjects they knew they did not have to continue. This would cause a recovery in their rank this year if they tried harder in the subjects they chose. Conversely, the additional challenge of stage 5 work or a mistaken elective choice, could impact on a student's ranking negatively, particularly if he were good at the practical subjects in Year 8. In Year 9 students are expected to be developing some autonomy. They should be responsible for managing their personal workload and thinking ahead about what commitments they have in the near future. Ask to look at their personal organiser electronic or paper, to see how well they are managing their time.

Dear Parents, Guardians and Carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. MINI CHANGES THIS YEAR

Online classes in the Junior Library. With an interesting expansion of learning options for our Selective School students into Online Learning a new role for our Libraries has emerged. As our Junior Library is not full of spare period students and classes without teachers it was the obvious solution to where to house Online Learners. Libraries are a perfect place for Online Learners. Thanks to the dedicated oversight of these additions to our Library by Mr Cippola, our Careers Adviser and Mr Rich from PE, these students appear to be working very well in our Junior library. Congratulation to our flexible learners for taking up the challenge of supervising yourselves.

The Maker Space Library – When a new Maker Space room was created out of a small class space this year our library was disappointed that it might not be regarded as a possible Maker Space. However, the donation of Mick Kay's Lab to a Junior Science class, and his request to use our class space as his Physics class area, has turned our Junior Library into a Maker Space after all. We have been very intrigued to see robotic vehicles scampering along our tables.

A lessening of the use of our PC area – Last year use picked up in the later stages of the year so curriculum might mean this happens again this year but last year's use did indicate that laptop use was replacing PC use by class teachers. This has led to our library's conclusion that we need to make out PC area more adaptable for laptop use as well as PC use. *So a huge thank you to Ziqi Xia from Year 9* who put a considerable amount of voluntary time into drawing up a re-vamp of the Junior Library including an update of the Workroom, Circulation Desk placement and Computer Area laptop re-structure. His CAD drawing explained very clearly what was possible by re-designing our Junior Library computer and workroom space. I would love to show you his drawings. We do have very special students.

REMINDER TO YEARS 7 & 8 TO READ TOWARDS THE PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE - START RECORDING YOUR READING ON THEIR WEBSITE **NOW.** Our libraries would love to perform much better in this challenge this year. Any student who reads the 20 books required will get 3 Award Scheme Points for representing our school in the challenge. Boys entering may use their reading of books from their local library or paper books or e books from our library, or books they purchase to count towards the 20 books. However, proof of borrowing is required by me if I am going to declare that you have read the books. So please send me your local library borrowing record. (It can usually be provided online) If you are reading books you purchased or purchased as an online e book I need an email from your parents to say they saw you reading that book THIS

YEAR. I also require one tricky multiple-choice question about each book you claim to have read so please collect these right after you read the book in question and save them on your laptop to send me 20 questions. OLIVER /SOFTLINK LIBRARIES CONFERENCE LAST FRIDAY – EVIDENCE SBHS LIBRARIES MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

The current DET message for librarians from this conference is to collect evidence of teaching and learning on the part of our libraries. Libraries were to fill attainment or organisation gaps they had found in their schools and collect stats to show their school communities their collaboration and success in attempting to fill these attainment or organisation gaps.

SBHS gaps are easy to find – our two libraries use their spaces to make up for gaps in our class accommodation, supervision for senior classes without teachers, our online class accommodation, our class PC needs and to improve our literacy especially our reading literacy as identified by Naplan and our reporting of borrowing (reading) on school reports. We do teach Introductory lessons on the School Portal and how to borrow e books, how to print, to use ClickView, find Oliver resources in our strange genre-based library and obtain State Library membership for Senior Students and teach them what resources they can find on State Library Databases. Luckily both our libraries do collect stats on many things right now which are evidence that our libraries make a difference.

Term one figures on numbers entering the Junior Library from our gate counter show us that 23,221 boys walked through our library doors in Term 1. Over the last 3 months there have been 610 Wheelers e book transactions in the last 3 months which is evidence of e reading in 2019 (access taught by the libraries). 1960 resources were loaned by our two libraries so far this year according to the Oliver report I just ran. (We select resources and teach students how to locate and borrow these) 1370 videos were viewed from ClickView, 57% by students, 783 and 43% by staff. (We teach students how to borrow this and we put videos on a special SBHS resources section for our boys to access - this is evidence they are accessing them. This is an interesting bit of Self-Directed Learning. It also indicates good staff use of ClickView. Year 7 led the charge, borrowing 42% with interestingly Year 10 borrowing 19% of the videos. Class use of the Junior Library in the last three months was 268 periods and of that 44 periods were online classes. Break time use of our Junior Library is a wonderful indicator or how our selective school students

need their libraries as no-one holds a gun to their head to come in. **7389** students used our Junior Library during **break times** in the last three months. 2789 of those boys were engaged using their laptops to complete work. Other boys were using a combination of PC's, pen and paper and phones. Game use of phones or computers is discouraged in our libraries.


These are just some examples of the statistics our libraries gather on the work they do and they show ample evidence that libraries make a difference to our students use of resources, overall feeling that they belong and have a place they can call their own and where they can feel free to work hard at academic tasks and inspire one another. Our resources also underpin literacy acquisition and we report on this. We think it would be a dreadful mistake to attack or undermine the libraries or remove libraries or books from any school and certainly from Sydney Boys High School. Our libraries use The Record as a type of Annual Report of all our statistics and this is very comprehensive.

READING ON REPORTS

Apologies for not putting reading on reports for this semester my Long Service Leave prevented my gathering the information on time. However, I will report to English Wide Reading teachers and you can discuss your son's Wide Reading with them on Parent Teacher Night. Hopefully evidence of reading will be on your son's final reports at the end of the year.

READING LISTS FOR SELECTIVE SCHOOL STUDENTS.

The Junior Library has always attempted to collaborate with the English Wide Reading Program by producing reading lists for different age levels. This year I have tried for a targeted approach by creating an "Introducing Young Adult Literature" list which was designed to move Year 9 (and 10) students past Primary Level reading and onto slightly older adolescent reading. All the books on these lists are new purchases and some writers still need time to become famous. I would recommend using this List search in Oliver to all Year 9 and 10 boys looking for a trendy, up to date author. At the same time I decided to produce a list for Advanced Readers in Year 7 & 8 and this can be searched in Oliver under the List term "Extending Junior Readers". I would recommend this list to juniors reading above their age level.
