



From the Principal Situational Analysis School Improvement Plan 2021-23

The department of education has allowed several terms for schools to develop their



School Improvement Plans, commencing with a situational analysis. As part of that process, we have consulted our stakeholders on what values we would like to emphasise in our school over the next three years. There was a strong consensus on the chosen four. As a community, now that we have established our values (**Integrity, Respect, Compassion & Dedication**), we need to explore what these values might mean in practice. We are investigating our selected values through a frame of *reciprocal responsibility*. We apply the concept to our relationships. Values will not characterise our culture unless all stakeholders buy in to the belief system. Values can be operationalised through our stated expectations of each other. What do these values look like in practice – in expectations and actions?

We are asking a generic question for us all around expectations. We can examine these in word matrices. What do various constituents of our community expect from each other in terms of these values? In academics, what are the expectations, staff of students, students of staff, students of each other, staff of each other? In administration, what are the expectations, the Executive of teaching and non-teaching staff, teaching and non-teaching staff of the Executive, the Executive of each other and teaching and non-teaching staff of each other. In community relations what are the expectations, parents of students, parents of staff, parents of each other, staff of parents, students of parents? In sport, what are the expectations, coaches of students, coaches of



staff, coaches of parents, coaches of each other, students of coaches, students of parents, students of staff, students of each other, staff of coaches, staff of

parents, staff of students, staff of each other, parents of coaches, parents of staff, parents of students, parents of each other?

The School endeavours to write programs, policies, procedures and processes to address these relationships, but we rarely examine the guiding values that underpin them. 
Summer Sport Co-Payments: Term 4

The rolls for summer sports and activities have now been finalised. In many activities co-payments are levied for the season – in this case Term 4 2020 and Term 1, 2021. Other esports have a policy of fixing co-payments on a term-by-term basis. In either case, invoices have now been posted. For Years 7-10, this means that the summer sport invoice will be included on individual *Clearance Forms*. These forms will need to be cleared prior to boys receiving their reports. The base co-payment for sport for a season is \$176 for 2020-21. Higher charges are levied by individual sports as a result of resolutions passed by the Associations or P & C Support Groups responsible for supporting particular sports. Year 11 boys have been invoiced for Term 4 for their full summer sport, too. It would help the MICs for these sports greatly if families could pay for their sports in the next ten days.


EXTENDED LEAVE







MINI REVIEWS FROM MY HOLIDAY READING – SBHS JUNIOR LIBRARY NEW BOOKS



I could not resist reading Cliff Sims *Team of Vipers*, my 500 extraordinary days in the Trump White House, when it was processed by our library staff, but suspected I might die of disgust before I got very far. Cliff Sims recognised that he was one of the vipers himself. His job in Trump's administration was positive spin – he was Director of White

House Message Strategy. Some of this spin appears to have been creating policies!!!! He lasted in a very privileged position as occasional confidant and man on the inside for 500 days from the beginning of the Trump Presidency. His career background was journalism.

When I began this book I was looking for revelations about Trump and particularly the team that surrounded and protected him. I wondered how he coped with such a responsible job that appeared so difficult for him to comprehend and respect and how his team managed to put up with him, particularly his constant tweeting.


Cliff Sims book is very circumspect about Trump and while it admits his tweeting and his unbelievable comment about women - it does not reveal any scandals or meltdowns. In fact, Cliff Sims has trodden a careful path (for his own future) with this book and maintains that Trump tries to deliver on his election promises. He does do rants and deliberately provokes the press and exaggerates his achievements outrageously (and untruthfully) but does not generally come across as cranky with his staff. Cliff Sims does not attack Trump's family – including Jarrod Kushner and Ivanka or Melania. He is trying to come across as objective.

Sims Trump paints the picture of a shrewd CEO who uses bombast to confound his detractors. He acknowledges

Trump's inability to follow a protracted argument. He also points out that Trump lives up to his father's idea about leadership that there are killers and the weak. He shows that the Trump family are very loyal, and that Melania Trump is an avid newsound who has Trump's back.

What Sims has to say about the team surrounding Trump and the many sackings is interesting particularly what he reveals about leaking and Sara Sanders, that unfazable Trump spokeswoman, and the role played by Bannon. Cliff Sims finally came unstuck by taking a video of himself and Trump and mailing it to himself on email. Under General Kelly, who was trying to prevent leaks and other security breaches, this was a silly thing to do. So, "off with his head"!

Overall, *Team of Vipers* is a worthwhile read on the inhabitants of the corridors of power.



When I purchased this Isabel Allende novel, I questioned my judgement. I have been reading her novels for so long I wondered whether she might be past it. However, I think *A Long Petal of the Sea* is a very appropriate background read for the HSC Extension topic, "Literary Homelands".

Isabel Allende's new novel is a pleasant surprise and as usual for her an informative reading experience. I have never read anything about the displaced Spaniards who supported the communist war against Fascist Spain and their subsequent migration to Chile. I have also very little knowledge of Chilean history apart from the most recent upheavals.

Isabel Allende has made it her mission in life to inform the world about the many regimes in South American our language and Anglo cultural orientation prevents us from learning about.

This novel is a family saga and illustrates the changes in moral and marital focus and gender roles of that generation which experienced World War 2. It is a reminder that the idea of free love and women's liberation did not originate with the flower children of the 1960's. These attitudes were a real feature of that wartime generation. Their free spirits got a bit of a hiding as World War 2 dragged on.


Maggot Moon won Sally Gardner the Carnegie Medal and

the Costa Award. The hero of the book – Standish Treadwell – is dyslexic. He has difficulties with text/reading. Sally Gardner the author of this book is also dyslexic but has achieved these awards for this book.

Perhaps it is CoVid depression, but I found the starkness of the totalitarian state violence in this novel very heavy going. Even the delight of Standish's sometimes amusing and hugely original metaphors could not dispel the horror of the Mr Gunnell, Standish's teacher, beating little Eric to death in a classroom in front of the class because he laughed at his teacher.

Maggot Moon is a speculative fiction about Hitler overcoming Britain's valiant and solo resistance to a Nazi take-over. Sally Gardner's book was a reminder of the horror of Hitler's racial cleansing of imperfect Aryan specimens. Standish was of course imperfect because of his dyslexia. Interestingly in our time of Donald Trump's fake news Sally Gardner combines this dystopian story with the fascist government's faking of a moon landing.

America, to Standish and his friend Hector, is the utopian land of Coca Cola and rainbow hued Cadillacs and movies. The other pieces of light in this otherwise terrible tale are the many resistance heroes, Standish's grandfather, Mr and Mrs Lush and Miss Phillips, the school secretary. Hans Fielder, violent bully, enemy of Standish and the son of collaborators also ended up being so disgusted by the constant violence that he cut off his long pants – the reward his mother got for being a Mother for Purity.



I have to comment. Also, on the progressively more and more disgusting drawings of the rats as the story moved to its ending. These were not amusing and did not add to my comfort zone. I do not feel they made the book suitable for children. I am not so sure I would have awarded the Carnegie Medal and the Costa Award to this book.

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
