Tell Them from Me Surveys

There is a system-wide need for data about how students perceive aspects of their education. To maximise the spread of coverage the Department of Education has declared that school participation in 'Tell Them From Me' surveys is mandatory. The survey has provided very useful data for the Ontario Education system, one of the world's leading systems. We agree that wide and broad data are likely to yield more meaningful insights but only if students perceive the survey as a genuine opportunity to have their voices heard. In the last couple of weeks of this term, students will be responding to the shortened version of the TTFM survey in class. Different faculties are managing the process for each year group 7-11. Year 12 has its own exit survey. I hope the school community values this opportunity to have a voice.



Literacy – Parents As Partners

One of the most significant influences on HSC success in courses with writing components is how much reading was undertaken by candidates during their formative years 5-15. Parents can help encourage reading at any time. It is good relaxation away from the demands of academic work. It builds comprehension skills and working vocabulary. It is enjoyable. Parents don't always know what sources of reading that are available. Ms Crothers, our Junior Librarian, has been compiling Quick Read Lists. These titles are available in our school library for students to read or borrow. We have created a link so that parents can connect with this list and make suggestions to their sons. https://sbhs.co/bwq. The School Improvement Plan 2021-2024



High has been engaging in a strategic planning process, led by DP Junior School, Jamie Kay, for three terms. All of our stakeholders were surveyed, and many meetings held. Ideas were crystallised and multiple drafts of aspects of the plan were written and discussed by staff teams. Our School Improvement Plan for 2021-24 was signed off by the Director, Educational Leadership on 16 March. Our vision statement focuses on pedagogy and meaningful programs. 'We strive to be at the forefront of educational practice, pursuing excellence while contributing positively to the world as scholars, sportsmen, educators and leaders.' Unlike our previous plans we have a more bi-directional emphasis. Ours is a collaborative vision which sets out aspirations, initiatives, strategies, targets and responsibilities for students and staff. We are held to the same high expectations, measured against our agreed values as benchmarks, as

those we require from students. Our three strategic directions are: student growth and attainment; nurturing personal wellbeing and closer reading, clearer writing. Each strategic direction is informed by purpose, stated initiatives, improvement measures, success criteria and an accompanying evaluation plan. The improvement measures have system negotiated targets specified for each year of the plan. The accompanying evaluation plan for each strategic direction sets out the evidence sources that will be used to analyse our progress towards our targets. Our School Improvement Plan has stretch targets that are demanding. During the next three years, we need to work together as a school community to support progress in each direction of the plan to nurture higher achieving, more involved and happier, students and staff. 




Alliance Française French Film Festival

2021-22 MIC Tennis Report

The 2020-21 GPS summer season was one of the first full return to sport school programs in the nation. There were 139 Athletes from all age groups (13s-Opens & development squad) in the SBHS Tennis program. Unfortunately, this year there were many washed out matches, however, Sydney Boys High performed very competently with a winning percentage of fifty-nine across all groups. It has been a pleasure to witness, hear and read of the progressive improvements of the students Tennis, personal development, great training & fixture attendance, and fun experiences throughout the season. For the program to improve more students need to be taking advantage of the physical development programs (Weights Room, Speed & Agility courses) offered yearround at the school.

The GPS Tennis program began in the last week of Term 3 2020 with the prospect of restrictions being significantly reduced once fixtures began in Term 4. After the experiences we all endured early in 2020 and with the running of the Athletics program during May-July 2020 with many restrictions and changes, I was happy to at last be able to run the Tennis program with fewer restrictions. I also believe the students were happy to get involved in Tennis and be surrounded by their friends. It was also pleasant to inform parents they could watch their son(s) at Saturday fixtures after a winter season mainly consisting of drop offs only.

Tennis at High has always been competitive across all groups. In recent years we have won 1st & 2nd Grade premierships and have not placed lower than 2nd in the past 6 years. This year we saw a drop in our standings in 1st & 2nd Grade (matches cancelled due to weather did not help), however, I believe there were plenty of lessons learnt from the students and staff. Congratulations to Andy Danis (12T) & Blair Zong (12E) who were both selected and represented the GPS in fixtures vs ISA & CAS. Our overall results were very pleasing and there has been some impressive skill demonstrated across all groups. I call upon all tennis athletes not to be complacent and reliant on skill alone This year we implemented the

post-match evaluation and the most common feedback received was a lack of consistency. If we are to stay in the point/game/set/match longer than our opponents, then our fitness needs to be improved. Sydney Boys High offers year-round free Speed & Agility programs and a weights room with sophisticated programming and professional coaching for a minimal annual fee. Tennis athletes of Sydney Boys High are called to take advantage of these opportunities and improve their physical competency.

When I am asked what I want for the tennis boys at High, my response is that they can all improve as tennis players, athletes, and as a person and that they can use tennis as a life-long physical activity. I am overjoyed when the boys, coaches, teachers & parents comment on an athlete's improvement or enjoyment. I also feel very proud when I witness boys who have organised 'hitting' or 'matches' on courts, particularly the seniors after exams. Thank you to our principal Dr Jaggar for his ongoing guidance and support. Thank you to sports master Mr Marcos for his organisation of fixtures and liaison with the GPS. Thank you and well done to David Deep (Head Coach & Coaching Co-ordinator) for his continued efforts and pursuit of improvement of our tennis program. Thank you to Vince (2nd Grade coach) who has not only coached the 2nd Grade teams over the past few teams but has guided our 3rd Grade squad as they pursue a position in the top grades. Thank you to Monique who coaches more groups than any coach, liaises with many of the group leaders and works with our development squad. A big thank you to all our other coaches Christelle, Khobi, Jared, Dylan & Irina. Thank you to all the teachers involved during sport time for their supervision and care. Thank you to the parents for their ongoing support and for those families who helped with parking duties, you are amazing. Lastly thank you to the students involved, I have learnt from this season and hope you have gotten plenty out of it as well.

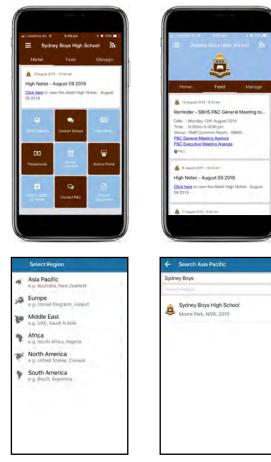

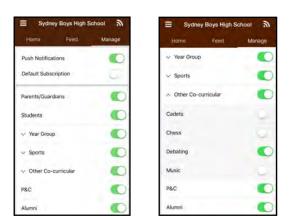

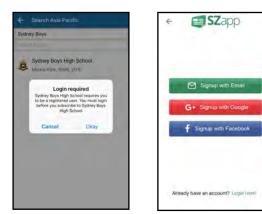

Code of Conduct



Students travelling on Trains, Buses and Trams must: -

- Tap your Opal card when joining and again when exiting the transport. This is particularly important as the data collected from the fare collection system may be used for service planning purposes
- Use school bus specials when provided
