



From the Principal HSC Begins at Last



Our students sat their first round of HSC papers this week after a long postponement. Our COVID Safe Plan required that we split the large candidature examinations and use the Great Hall as well as the UTS Gymnasium. We have invested in securing alternative sites, should our school site need to be closed for deep cleaning. Our students have endured a great deal during two years of interrupted senior school learning. By and large they have been resilient and cooperative in the face of a common danger. Everyone at High hopes the boys have every opportunity to show what they know in the final examination period of high school.

Scholarships Offered at High



SBHS offers only two scholarships/bursaries – the Phillip Day Memorial Scholarship and the Sir Roden and Lady Cutler Foundation Scholarship. All **enrolled or enrolling** students are eligible to apply for the **Phillip Day Memorial Scholarship**. It is a *one-year credit* on the school account for **\$1,500**. The Selection Criteria covers talented boys in an academic area or a co-curricular endeavour. Good all-rounders qualify as do students with special needs – financial or otherwise. There are many boys in the school who would make good

candidates for this award. I urge them to take the trouble to download and complete the application form. The **Sir Roden and Lady Cutler Foundation Inc Scholarship** is a *two-year* award with a *credit at the school account* for **\$1,500** for each Year – 11 and 12. Only boys **enrolled or enrolling** in Year 11 are eligible to apply. The criteria for this scholarship are different. It has an emphasis on a prior record of service to others, to the school and / or the community. Boys with initiative, compassion, a record of school or community service and leadership skills, are invited to apply.

Quo Vadis, High 2022-25?

Ahead of the preparation of the Strategic Improvement Plan, I wrote a piece about planning which I think set a context around our movement into the next Sigmoid Curve in our institutional development. I was attempting to provide a rationale for our necessary change in practice and process. I believe our growth curve relying on brand continuity, a focus on quality, a fostering of pride in culture and our living museum has run its course. The balance between modernity and tradition is a hard one to strike. We have a great tradition and a strong brand identification, but to build our second curve we need to move towards a focus on our product that is sharper than it has ever had to be before. Our product is our student outcomes. Every student's needs have to be addressed.

Technology and the new knowledge economy have revolutionised our context in the two decades that I have been principal at High. Blended learning is now integral to our pedagogy. The upskilling of staff in relation to technological applications has been truly remarkable. Students have access to unlimited information, much of which they used to rely on teachers to supply. Teachers now spend their time teaching frames of thinking, judgement and discernment and methods of applying information to the process of solving problems. The job has evolved from dissemination of knowledge to its manipulation and application.

Our mindset needs to move from the complacency of our reliance on brand to our evidence-based immersion in product, outcomes and growth for every student every year. We need to show that our product is high-quality, reliable and evolving. We must be agile, flexible and responsive to the needs of each individual in our care. Technology has made the dream of the personalised curriculum very close to a reality. It is a reality that we must challenge ourselves to reach towards. Technology has also enabled the Department to monitor and analyse our performance closely. We are being scrutinised in our work as never before. Our responsibility and our accountability have risen sharply. There is a worldwide trend for employers to want more from those on salary and less from those paid by the hour.

If we want to do more than reproduce ourselves in our traditional image, we need to keep challenging our comfortable culture. How good is the quality of what we are producing in student outcomes? How well do all our systems, policies and processes work in supporting each student to reach his maximum potential? Where could we improve? Are we identifying and meeting student learning needs? How do we know whether our consumers – students, parents, Old Boys – appreciate and respect our endeavours?

In the last two years, we have implemented a Learning Management System, changed our Student Information System, and modified our School Reports. We have improved blended learning and reduced our reliance on others to supply us data and information. We will soon move our calendar, our Student Award Scheme, all our wellbeing data and our timetable onto Sentral. Every teacher will have immediate access to all the information we hold on each student. When you know your students better, you can meet their needs better. Your work with them will improve in its effectiveness; their knowledge and confidence will develop and their outcomes will improve.

The success of the second curve will be underpinned by rapid changes in technology and expanded sources of information available to teachers. There will be disruption and anxiety as the old curve fades away and the new curve gains traction. The capacity to provide unprecedented attention to individual students will fuel the second curve's momentum towards personalised pedagogy.

Mr M Ormsby (Student Support Officer)

Describe a little bit about yourself and your role at this school.



My role at High (Student Support Officer) is a new position and part of the wellbeing team. My role is essentially a youth worker or positive mentor for students. I am someone you can talk to about anything that is happening in your life. This might include your interests and achievements as well as

any challenges that you might be facing at school or in your personal life. You'll also see me involved in Values Education classes, co-curricular activities, sport and coordinating wellbeing programs across the school. Additionally, parents/guardians can contact me for wellbeing related information, guidance and referral.

Some of my interests and hobbies include swimming, hiking, camping, surfing, cooking, travel, volunteering, movies, politics and gardening (growing veggies).

Describe a little bit about your background in education and how you came to be a Student Support Officer at this school.

I've worked in a range of different education related roles across my career in higher education (universities) and in community / not for profit organisations. Some of my roles have included leadership development, wellbeing, teaching mindfulness, youth mentoring, sports coaching (swimming) and supporting young people with their transitions from school to university.

A few of my friends told me about the Student Support Officer role last year and I knew instantly that this was something that I wanted to do. I am really passionate about supporting young people to grow and thrive and to discover their purpose, strengths and values. I'm excited to be at High and grateful for the opportunity to be your Student Support Officer.

I run the Peer Mentoring Program and organise the International Mathematical Modelling challenge (IMMC) for selected students.

I enjoy cooking and watching cooking shows.



Mr O The (Science Teacher)

Describe a little bit about yourself and your role at this school.

I'm one of the many science teachers in the Science Faculty, and for the last few years I've been teaching Physics in the senior years. I became a teacher a

little later in life, I've worked as an engineer in Germany, in academic research in Sydney, amongst a variety of other jobs in a few different industries.



What do you find unique about teaching at SBHS?

In my teaching career, I've found that the students at high tend to be far more studious and well-mannered than in a few of the other schools I've taught in. The questions that get asked often, require a certain level of mental agility to guide students down the correct path. And SBHS is a busy school! Most students are involved in the many sports, co and extra-curricular programs the school offers

What did you do during the lockdown that kept you and/or the students busy?

As much and as practical as possible, I tried to run little science experiments and projects within the limits of the various stages of lockdown. In some classes we made a sourdough starter, in others we practiced some "kitchen sink" chemistry with household items. My Year 10 class participated in an egg drop challenge and created videos to explain how the various COVID vaccines work. To keep myself occupied, I explored as many rock faces of my 5km radius as I could!

Do you run any co-curricular/extension programs at this school, and if so, what are they?

I currently am the coordinator of the SRC and run the Physics Lunchtime classes for the year 12 students on Fridays. After a few years of disruptions, the SRC is eager to get back to work.

What is a fun fact about you?

In years gone by, I was involved in designing, maintaining, and racing a full-sized solar race car and team. I personally have participated in a few of these races around in and Australia

COVID AND THE 2LIBRARIES

During the COVID lockdown the library team continued to deliver high quality library services to the school community. Although physical book borrowing did not occur, students actively accessed e-books and resources during the lock down. In August alone, the number of ebooks borrowed on wheelers almost doubled with 245 loans compared to 156 loans in August 2020.

Every-one of our staff made significant contributions by working on huge clean up jobs and adding new resources on our Oliver library database. These ranged from reducing our reading lists to a more user-friendly number to endeavouring to clean up blue screens – which is an endemic problem on this SoftLink system.

In addition, the Teacher-Librarian in the MacDonald Library, Mr Wiramihardja, held the fort during COVID as the teacher supervising any boys at our school who were unable to lockdown.

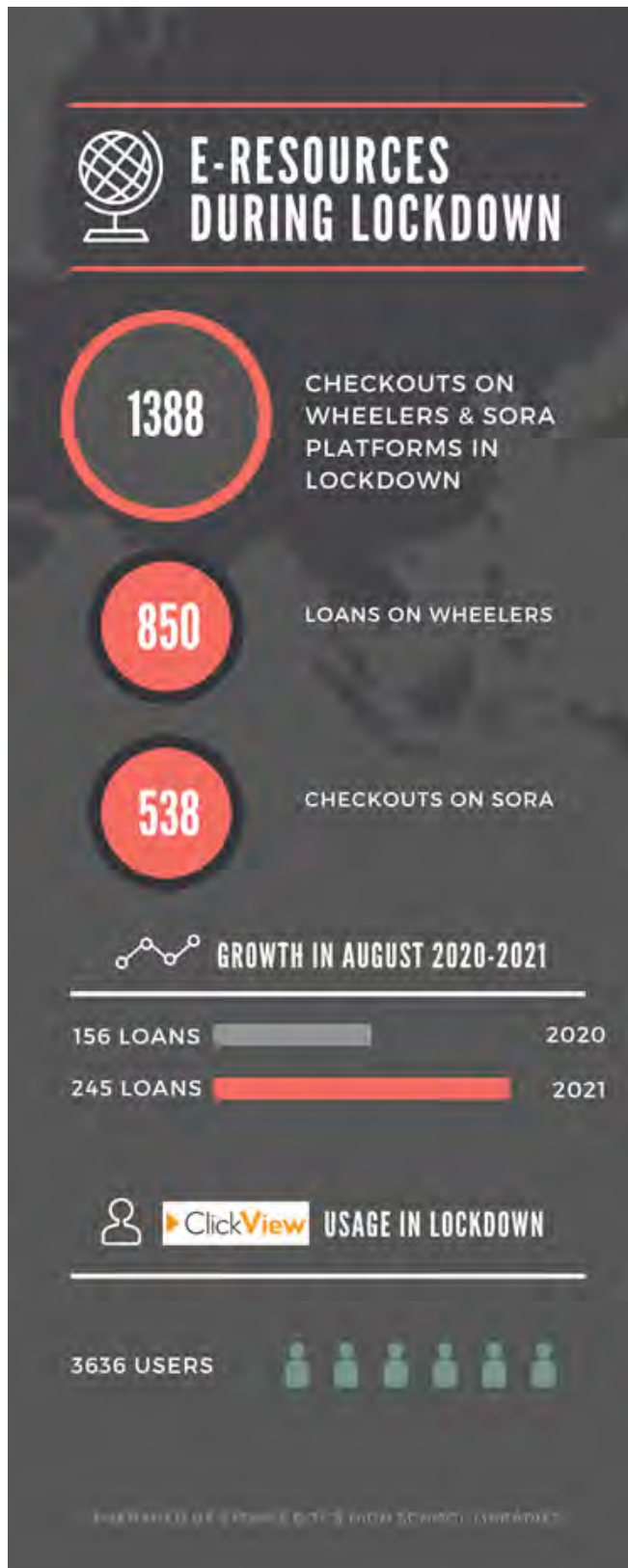
Mr Wiramihardja and I thought we might list our 2Library's CoVid accomplishments as we are very proud of our library staff – Sue Schlederer, Julia O'Hare, Meredith Thomas and of our untried and very new staff member Monique Mills and their dedication throughout CoVid.

Working totally online and communicating online was as new an experience for our library staff as the student and teacher experience of teaching online. Like our teachers and students, we were surprised at how effective we could be - even training new library staff via Zoom and conferring about and establishing new 2Library strategies and initiatives.

Our lockdown accomplishments:

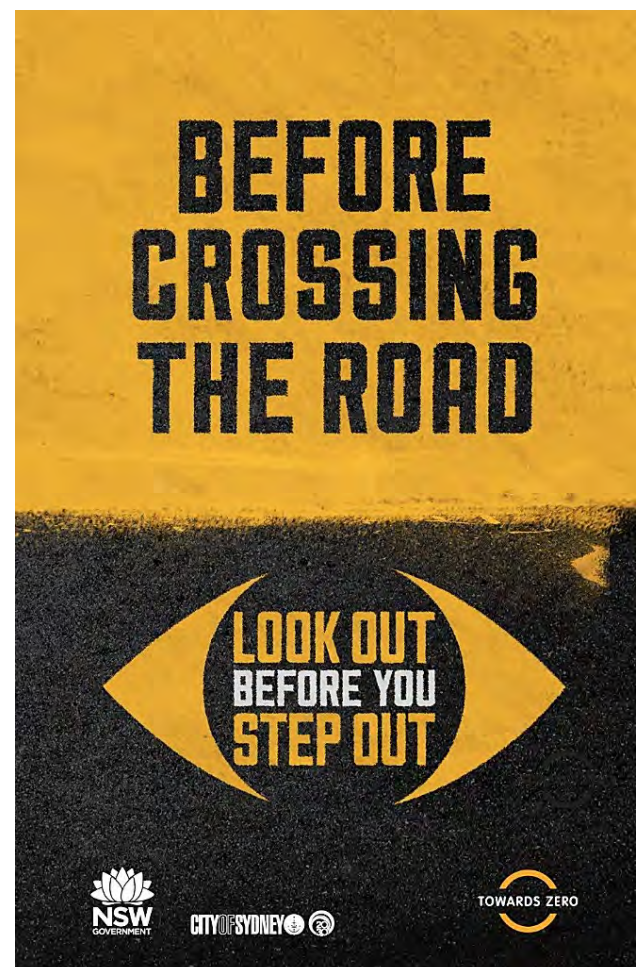
- Culling and re-tagging of all never-borrowed Non-Fiction in the Andrews Library – 1124 resources.
- Conducting the Premier's Reading Challenge online by emailing students - 48 successful student entries (This number is the norm for Sydney Boys' High and we could improve)

- Conducting two online Blitz Chess Tournaments – in place of our more normal hands-on Tournaments
- Search tagging resources on ClickView which had not been tagged so that teachers and students can find titles which have little relevance to content. (Over 1000 items tagged)
- Facilitating the changeover of 700 DVD resources to ClickView resources – 500 of these were dealt with. (This is approx. \$5000 worth of new resources added to ClickView) – Search terms added to all of these.
- Full list of Shakespeare's plays on DVD added to Oliver and now available to everyone.
- 1414 Simultaneous Reading and Listening novels added to Oliver Reading Lists.
- Cataloguing online of all new books which arrived just before lockdown - approx. 30.
- Correct report created on SORA loans for this year.
- Creation of list of 90 plus Popular Reading thin Non-Fiction books on a huge variety of very current topics – these to be gathered into a special reading bin for "fictioned-out" boys.
- Discussed proliferation of subject tags, rules for avoiding this proliferation and removed most of the 16,000 unused subject tags on our Oliver system.
- Creation of a textbook loan procedure to alleviate a problem with non-returning of textbooks at year's end.
- Providing support to Senior Teachers – scanning study guides, exam papers, textbooks upon request as students and teachers could not borrow physical items.
- Teaching classes for SOR on zoom.
- Working on finalising research module on Canvas.
- Writing of Literacy across the curriculum article.
- Writing of several High Notes' articles.
- Collating senior library usage data and creating graphs.
- Physical relocation and return of books due to interactive whiteboard upgrade in the senior library.
- Covering and cataloguing of new acquisitions.
- Setting up LearnPath on Oliver and attending LearnPath training

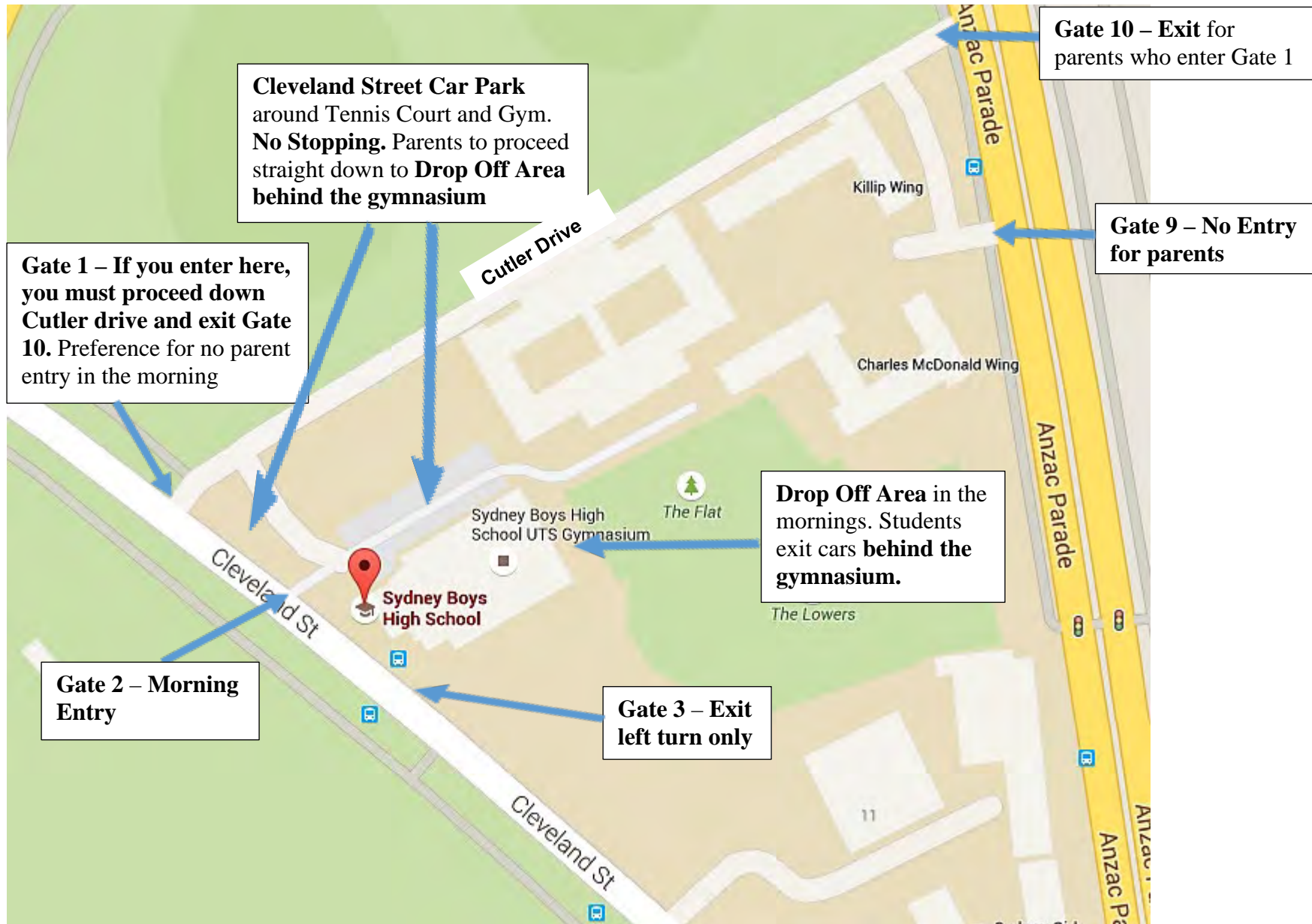

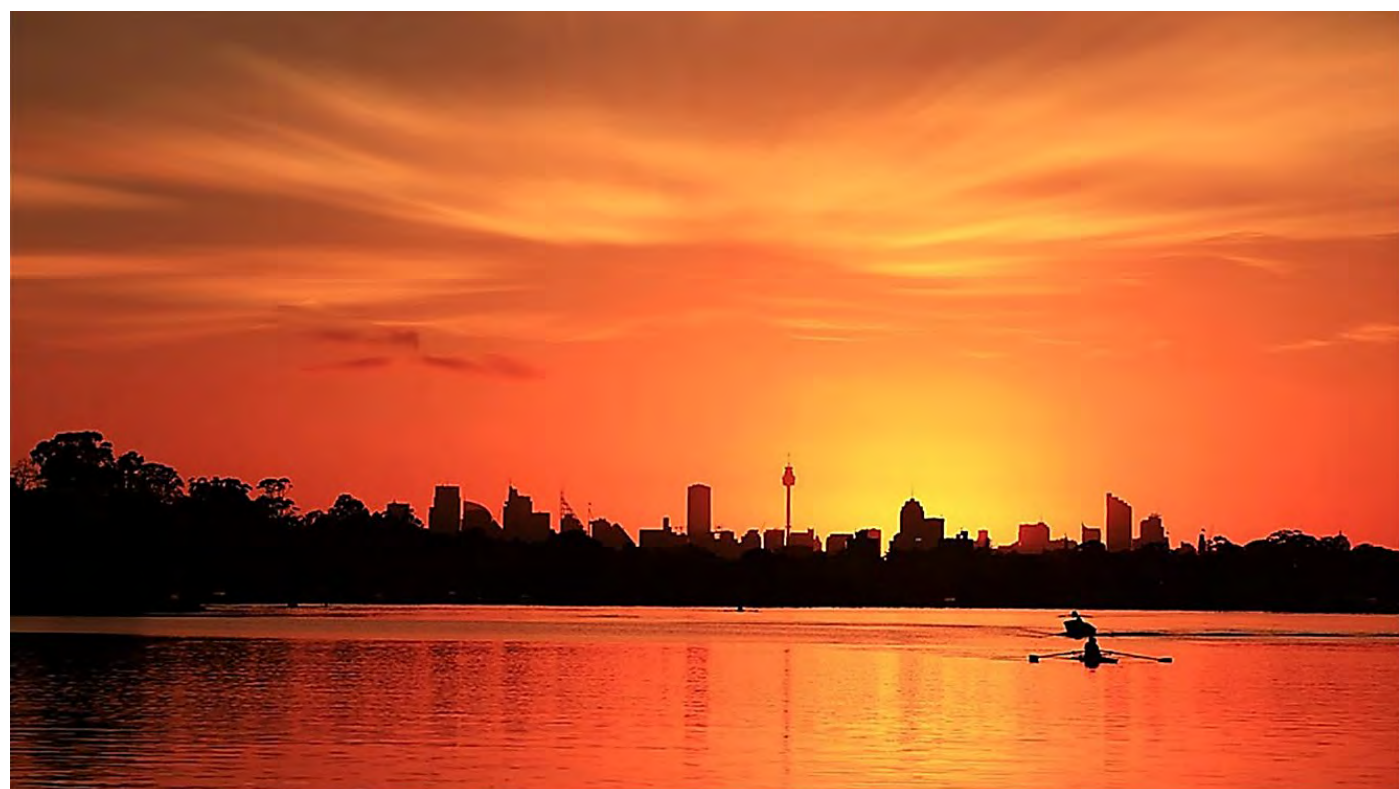
